Lenten Study

This year, Lent begins with Ash Wednesday, which we will observe on March 1, and ends with our celebration of the new life of Easter on Sunday, April 16. Traditionally, Lent is a time for prayer and reflection as we prepare for the journey of Jesus to the cross and then his resurrection. To help us do this, we will be having a Wednesday evening Lenten series based on a thoughtful book called Life of the Beloved by Henri Nouwen. Henri Nouwen was a student of Thomas Merton who has written extensively on the spiritual life and community formation.

The five-part series will begin on **Wednesday, March 8** and end on Wednesday, April 5. We will let you know of the meeting time and place in the near future. Everyone is invited to participate in these gatherings. If you would like to order a copy of the book (\$9.50), there will be a sign-up sheet on the table at the back of the sanctuary. We would like to order the books on Monday, February 20, so that they will arrive in plenty of time.


New Members Class
