I have confirmed with Pedro Rosabal of IUCN's Global Programme on Protected Areas in Gland that this project is WCPA's largest volunteer project for a single book product in its history. There were 169 Principal and Supporting Authors who contributed to this effort over a period of two years and eight months. I have estimated this volunteer time to be worth about \$US 2.9 million if the task was completed commercially. Well done to everyone concerned!
