Dear Members of the Marist Family

At a Remar recruitment meeting with students at one of our schools recently, a local teacher suggested to the visiting Remar Ministry Team that she doubted whether there would be many students signing up this year. She did not think that the “faith thing” would hold any great attraction for that particular group. As it turned out, she was happily and hugely wrong: the number of students wanting to come on the ‘embarkation camp’ exceeded everyone’s expectations.

Like some other youth ministry programmes, Remar uses peer ministry as its central *modus operandi* – the young evangelising the young. The technique is not rocket science; since the time we were in kindergarten, we have taken cues from our peers for what’s credible and cool. Remar has an additional power in a Marist setting because it draws on the inspirational people and imagery of our Marist story to bring alive the Gospel of Jesus and to help it connect, something with which our students seem readily to connect. It seems to work.

Finding evangelising strategies that seem to work is a perennial task of the Church; for us who work as Marist educators it is a primary responsibility. A favourite recollection I have of the short-tenured “smiling Pope”, John Paul I, was his quip to journalists once that if St Paul were around today, then he would probably try to get a job with Reuters. It was a comment on the effectiveness of the mass media for diffusing a message and shaping world views. Perhaps if John Paul I were commenting now, he may make a similar remark about social networking software such as Facebook or Twitter. He may also have something to say about youth ministry. If he were around at the time of the Reformation he may have suggested that St Paul would have bought a printing press, or in the Medieval period that he may have joined with the Franciscans to paint murals or do stained glass in churches. Or he may have organised great pilgrimages to holy places. Paul would have seen it as trying to be ‘all things to all people’ for the sake of the gospel (1 Cor 9:19).

This is not a matter of gimmicks. It is, rather, simply finding a language that effectively speaks to people – a language that finds them where they are, and a language that will make sense within their frames of meaning but will also call them beyond. When we find that language, we know we are just the medium of the message, not the message itself. Grace builds on nature, Thomas Aquinas teaches us. When we develop media that work with grace rather than against it then the Spirit takes over to do things well beyond our imaginings. There is nothing extraordinary in this. Indeed, there is nothing so profoundly ordinary, for we are all made for God.

Most of us could recall experiences, events, and strategies that have done just this with young people: wonderful liturgies, challenging social justice outreach, enthused youth groups, engaging senior retreats, even a brilliantly taught RE lesson. But we keep on searching for the best and the most effective methods. The last General Chapter of the Marist Brothers put this challenge to Marist educators around the world: if we Marists are to be known for anything in our local settings, it should be as experts in the evangelisation of youth. This should be our characteristic expertise.

At next week’s Marist Principals’ Conference, it is this imperative that will shape most of the agenda. This is core business for us, as one Marist Principal said the other day. It will be an important moment for us as leaders of Australian Marist education to share our wisdom, insights, experience and initiatives with one another.


MARISTS' WORK IN EAST TIMOR CONTINUE TO GROW

Br Allen Sherry (MAPS Director) and Michael Coleman (MAPS Admin Officer) have recently returned from a five-day monitoring visit to East Timor, where Australian Marist Solidarity is supporting a number of community development and educational projects.

Joining Australian Marist Brother Tony Clark, who acts as the in-country manager for our projects, the team conducted meetings and inspections at a number of key sites including: *ICFP*, the Marist Teachers Training College and *Oasis* which is a youth centre supporting over 300 children in the English language, sporting programs, and basic computer skills. They were also formally welcomed with traditional dance and a program at another MSA-supported youth centre, *Ponte Leste*; and at the *Catholic Primary School* at Caicidu, which needs to expand its buildings because of growing demand for local children to access formal education, which is a significant project underway. The team also took the opportunity to visit *Katilosa*, which is a local Timorese NGO and MAPS partner working with over 150 children and young people with disabilities each year.

A new development for 2012 being supported by Australian Marist Solidarity is the construction of new community centre which is to be named *Sentru Halibur*. This space will provide a chance for young Timorese to gather and further promote the local Marist mission in surrounding areas.

The MAPS team is very excited about the growth taking place in East Timor and we recognise that this would not be possible without MSA schools' continuing support.
