Dear Brothers, Colleagues and Friends

With Collingwood seeming to be safely bundled away by Hawthorn, my finger found itself on our Community television's remote control surfing for an alternative that might provide a suitable Friday evening diversion after a full week. Quite unusually for me, I was nabbed by something on the classic movie channel TCM.

It sounds a little sad, doesn't it? Home alone on a Friday night, sitting in front of a ho-hum Hollywood dud, made fifty years ago, with a clunky screenplay that murdered the novel on which it was based, and a B-grade cast of nobodies delivering their lines in stilted and robotic blandness for three hours. Even Bill Collins would have turned it off and gone to bed. And then to want to write about the experience? But stay with me.

The movie was *The Cardinal*, based on the novel of the same name by Henry Morton Robinson. Do you know it? Maybe not. It is set in the first half of the last century, the main character a Boston priest by the name of Stephen Fermoye. I had read the book as a boy. I guess I was thirteen or so at the time, and I was somewhat captivated by Father Fermoye – in the way that boys of that age seek their male heroes. He was an inspirational mix of someone of intellect, bravery, adventure, principle and faith. He wrestled with a Hobson's choice when having to decide between saving his own sister's life or approving a very late termination of her unplanned pregnancy, he courageously took on the Ku Klux Klan in the deep south, he came face to face with the ugly betrayal of Nazism in Austria, he stood up to abuse of authority in the Church, and he struggled with his own belief, his commitment to be a priest, and a love affair. He nearly starved, he was beaten up and tortured, he was both humiliated and feted, he made the most of opportunity, and finally he got a red hat. A sort of boys-own clerical super-hero.

The movie – which I never knew existed – was a typically smulchy Hollywood sanitisation of what from my late boyhood I recall as rather gutsy and raw novel. There were no tolling bells or angelic background choirs in the imagery that the text evoked in my mind. No hoards of extras on the set, outfitted in everything the costume department's religious section could muster: crimsoned bishops with bejewelled rings, nuns in full-flowing habits, Cistercian monks, and genuflecting women in black mantillas. Lots of Latin and lace. Rather, the characters which I remember most from the book were three very human priests: Fermoye himself; an old and much loved pastor who had been punted to the poorest and remotest rural parish; and a young and resilient African-American pastor taking a stand on racism and injustice. The heroism of each was different but in each case it was done quietly, humbly and selflessly. And it was done wherever each found himself, with the people and the problems of that place.

The Hollywood perception of the Church in the movie was an outsider's view. It caricatured its otherworldliness, its privilege, its mysteriousness, its disconnection, its hypocrisy. The insider's experience was different. It was real, grounded and relational. You and I are insiders. The Gospel ministry which we know – as teachers, as counsellors, as youth ministers, as boarding supervisors, as coaches, as Brothers, as mentors, as nurses, as chaplains, in whatever roles we have with young people in school – is all about the day-in day-out effort to help the Kingdom come, here and now, with these people, in the this place. Largely it is unheralded work. Largely it might be described as ordinary. We in schools – and others in health care, in social welfare, in solidarity initiatives, and in the countless other services undertaken by people who give their lives to make Matthew 25 real – know a Church that Hollywood and the tabloid media never really quite get. Or, perhaps they do understand, but they judge that it won't make them money.

MSol IMMERSIONS WORKSHOP AUGUST 4 – 6



Brisk Mittagong winds did not dampen the energy of the twenty-six of us gathered for the MSA Schools' Immersion Workshop. Seventeen MSA schools were represented and teachers ranged from those yet to lead an immersion to the highly experienced. One goal was to facilitate a process of sharing experience levels with a particular focus on risk assessment, evangelization potential and appropriate staffing selection. With Br Graham Neist as facilitator the workshop covered the planning stages through to implementing and debriefing of immersions.

Br Tony Leon, of the MLF team, energetically introduced stereotypes of the Majority World's peoples and different development methods. Br Allen Sherry of MSol continued with twelve paradigms of immersion ranging from the controversial "Slumdog Tourism" model to our MSA schools movement to "Marist presence". This opened up lively reflection on current practices. We were fortunate to also gain an in country community perspective from Br Brian Kinsella of MSol who has recently joined the team after 6 years ministry in Pailin, Cambodia. At various stages experienced staff formed panels on topics across the elements of the school immersion cycle (a new MSol template) making for informative conversations.

The workshop concluded with a session led by Catherine Hannon on possibilities for former students with Marist Volunteering Australia (MVA) and Nehme Khattar on Marist Youth Ministry (MYM) offerings.

At the completion of the workshop all agreed that the goals were reached and that the experience was highly positive with possibilities for further discussion being recorded. Thanks must go to the team at "The Hermitage" Mittagong led by Br Tony Shears for their care of our group and Br Anthony Robinson's opening night Marist wine tasting.
