MSOL IN THE FIELD WITH LOCAL PARTNERS: TIMOR-LESTE

Marist Solidarity is both the name of the international aid and development agency of the Australian Marist Brothers as well as a way of supporting such work. This is Marist solidarity in action.



Br Tony Clark and Br Allen Shery, Executive Director of Marist Solidarity (MSol), reaching an agreement with Maway, founder of the Centru Treinamentu Uailili Lafu (CTUF) the training centre in Wai Lilli, District of Baucau.

Br Allen Shery and Michael Coleman were recently in Timor-Leste working with project partners. At the heart of MSol's work is empowering young people by enhancing their human dignity and developing their capacity to transform their own lives and the communities in which they live. The visit was an opportunity to work with local Timorese project managers and to provide suggestions for operation and planning. Some time was spent with two particular locals, Maway and Rio, both of which have initiated projects based on the need that they see in their communities. Maway, from the village of Wai Lilli, with the backing of his village elders has been supported by MSol in establishing a computer training centre that in 2014 will expand to a carpentry training centre. Rio is a local Timorese man trained in physiotherapy for people with disabilities. MSol is supporting his plan to provide physiotherapy for poorer children with disabilities in a small centre to be called the St Vincent de Paul Centre.

These are but two of many community projects initiated by Timorese and now partnering with us at MSol. Local Timorese such as Maway, Rio and their friends are the driving force for development and your support enables them to build their own capacity for change within their communities.

It is the support of our Australian Marist Schools Australian donors that makes these partnerships and expressions of Marist solidarity possible.
