Dear Brothers, Colleagues and Friends

There is an advertisement that regularly appears in the English weekly *The Tablet*. You may have seen it. It is for “Leo House”, a place that offers accommodation within a Catholic milieu in the heart of New York City. One of its boasts is that there is a resident “Chaplin” and that daily Eucharist is available.

It seems that there is a direct connection between the person who is known as “Chaplin” and the celebration of Mass. Is this person a descendant of Charlie? Does the daily liturgy have a tragi-comic flavour to it? Perhaps little slapstick to keep the congregants engaged? Are words used? And does someone play the piano or do they use a backing track?

Excuse the little facetiousness. But it did catch my eye. Once an English teacher, always ... The same thing happens when I see an apostrophe on the wrong side of an “s”, or when someone uses “criteria” or “phenomena” or “alumni” as if they were singular nouns rather than using “criterion”, “phenomenon”, or “alumnus” and “alumna”. And I am quite the pedant when it comes to using the possessive case before a gerund, or following the word “different” with the preposition “from” and never “to”, or putting “to” rather than “and” between the verb “try” and an infinitive that follows it. And doesn’t everyone know that the noun “data” is plural, and requires a plural verb?

I could go on, but let’s return to Mr Chaplin and the Mass. I do laugh each time I notice this little advertisement and its unintended humour. But it’s not a bad association – levity and liturgy. *Sursum corda* is, after all, the invitation to us before the Preface to the Eucharistic Prayer. Sure, there are many ways through which we can have our hearts lifted in liturgy – through its poetic beauty, through the power of its ritual, through music; the Roman liturgy offers something for all five senses.

But what about simple joy?

In our Marist tradition, especially in our schools, we are usually pretty successful at infusing our liturgies with great joy. It is a mark of the way we do it. Liturgy is for us, as it was for Marcellin, something in which we invest much and expect much. And so we look for ways to plan liturgies that can uplift the hearts of all who take part. I had the privilege to attend one such liturgy at St Gregory’s College, Campbelltown, last Friday when they celebrated the College’s 90th Anniversary, and will do so again this coming Friday when Lavalla Catholic College, Traralgon, celebrates its 60th. Both schools know well what it means to seek to touch and lift hearts in their liturgical celebrations.

It’s a Gospel hallmark, joy. Pope Francis, in *Evangelii Gaudium*, suggests to us that it might be THE hallmark of the Good News of Jesus, at least the one that most honestly and powerfully reflects someone who has come into touch with the Divine at the heart of all life. It is a language that everyone understands, joy. In his homily for the canonisation of Saint Teresa of Calcutta two days ago, the Pope reminded people of a maxim of Teresa: “Perhaps I don’t speak their language, but I can smile.” So, too, for us: we don’t always make sense of the “language” of one another, sometimes especially that of the generation we teach. But, if nothing else, let them see us as people of joy. First, as this. Whatever might be our age, our distance from their world, or our misgivings, they’ll understand.

In 2014, Sally created and led the Get Real Alternate Schoolies Immersion (GRASI) Program, which invited Year 12 student leavers to participate in a 2-week immersion to the Philippines, giving them an opportunity to encounter real experiences of global poverty. This is now a major event on the MYM calendar.

This year Sally accepted responsibility for organising and leading our young Marist Pilgrims to France for the International Gathering of Marist Youth in Lyon and WYD in Krakow, Poland.

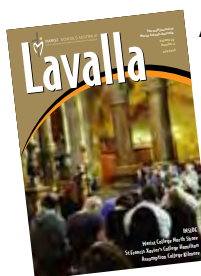
As MYM Regional Co-ordinator, Sally has drawn together a team of energetic young assistants who have helped her in organising youth ministry events during this time.

BEING MARIST CONFERENCE 24 - 26 August 2016

Coming from all states of Australia with a Marist presence, thirty three support and care staff gathered at the Marist Centre Melbourne for the biennial *Being Marist Conference*. Echoing the Holy Year of Mercy, the theme, "Being Marist – The Face of Mercy", was adopted for the conference. Beginning with a review of the hopes and experience of the Holy Year, the conference explored how the role of support and care can provide a Marist face of mercy to those to whom they minister. Reflecting on the experience one participant wrote: I learnt how the Marist charism relates to my role within the school community and gained an insight into how some incidents are dealt with within our school community. I now realise that the question, "What would Marcellin do?" is a good question to ask when dealing with some difficult issues.

RURAL HEALTH OUTREACH PROGRAM IN CAMBODIA GROWS IN POPULARITY



The number of patients accessing the health outreach program in Pailin is steadily increasing with more than 2,000 rural villagers attending clinics in the past five months.

The program, which is now in its second year, is an initiative of the Marist Brothers community in Pailin.

It has been established with the help and support of a lay Marist couple from Mexico—Doctor Estela Rodriguez and her husband, Rodrigo Sanchez, who volunteered almost three years of their time, working in Pailin.

The couple left Pailin in March, handing the outreach program on to a local doctor, Dr Sreyleap Mouen and her assistant, who is a midwife.

The program is endorsed by the Cambodian Ministry of Health and provides first aid and medical services to people from more than 25 disadvantaged communities.

Each week, clinics are held in Pailin and three outlying rural villages. They involve assessing and diagnosing patients, providing medicines and basic treatments, and community education about the importance of health and hygiene practices.

Brother Georges Palandre—the bursar of the Marist community in Pailin—says it is good news that the number of people accessing the clinic is increasing, but there are now concerns about whether the program has sufficient funding to continue.

Our project partners, Spanish funding agency [Manos Unidas](#), have supported the project for an initial two-year period, but Brother Georges is now appealing to Australian Marist Solidarity (AMS) and the support of our generous donors to enable the project to continue.
