### Pilgrims

In preparing a large host of students over many months from multiple schools for World Youth Day, Madrid in 2011, the credo *"I'm a pilgrim, not a tourist!"* was repeatedly impressed upon the young people by the adult leaders. In part, this was to build a robust mindset for the inevitable challenges to comfort, convenience, patience and energy. Of course, primarily the credo was to focus the group on the real purpose of the journey: a faith experience.

After all the careful and detailed preparations, you can imagine the dismay when, two hours after take-off from Sydney, we were alerted by the cabin crew of an order for "Gin and Tonics" by three young pilgrims. Quickly averting delivery, a full investigation was conducted immediately with interviews, written statements and very serious faces accompanied by complex musical chairs as the three culprits were isolated from one another, and the depth of their transgression analysed. The fallen pilgrims were informed they would be on the first plane back home from Dubai if unable to convince the Pilgrim Leaders of their remorse and commitment to more trustworthy behaviour. This was to be demonstrated by lengthy written dissertation, due an hour before landing. After many drafts and much critique, upon descent into Dubai, the verdict was handed down. The fallen pilgrims had convincingly redeemed themselves.

Whilst notoriety among their peers was inevitable, to their great credit all three were model pilgrims throughout the remaining time together. Sincere, thoughtful, and completely engaged, whenever the going got tough they would lead the throng in unison with *"I'm a pilgrim, not a tourist!"*.

Later this month, during the next school holidays, the Marist Pilgrimage will commence involving teachers and staff from across the country. The character of the Marist Pilgrimage, honed and refined over many years, is built on prayer, reflection, learning, fellowship, and encounter with God. Commencing in the Holy Land, under the guidance of Brother Michael Green, Brother Neville Solomon and Ms Liz Falconer, the Pilgrims will trace the steps of Jesus and familiar stories from the Gospels. Jesus will become known in new ways for each of the pilgrims. The second phase of the pilgrimage is spent in Rome, where the pilgrims will experience a sample of the rich diversity of expression of faith and Catholic tradition over many centuries. The final phase will see the pilgrims in France, walking the physical and spiritual paths Saint Marcellin trod 200 years ago, as he answered God's call. Many who have been on pilgrimage will tell you the experience is life changing.

As the well known hymn reminds us, we are all pilgrims on a journey. Over the coming weeks, our Year 12 students will be completing a stage in their own journey. Like the three fallen pilgrims, they will be confronted with all manner of opportunity and possibility, failure and forgiveness. As students who attended Marist schools, may they consciously live a meaningful journey with God, characterised by prayer, reflection, learning, fellowship, and encounter. May their life credo ever be

Weathering some frosty conditions, teachers and school officers travelled to the gorgeous Southern Highlands and temporarily left behind the usual distractions for a few days to allow for some relaxation, Marist wisdoms, reflection and prayer. Ongoing conversions of the heart, that are critical to deepening faith, were exchanged with joy and enthusiasm. All the participants were encouraged by the example of each other and left The Hermitage to go back to their homes and communities to enliven their faith in new ways.



## Get connected to St Dominic's in the Solomon Islands

On August 28, an undersea telecommunications cable about twice as thick as a garden hose and comprising of optic fibre thinner than human hair finally reached Sydney. The Coral Sea Cable System is said to improve development in Papua New Guinea and Solomon Islands and will be connected to an underground land cable which was installed earlier in August.

With only 11% of the residents of PNG and the Solomon Islands connected to the internet, the Coral Sea Cable System is set to bring about a lot of change to education in the region. Most Australian children are raised today as 'digitally literate' through early and constant exposure to electronic devices and this is certainly not the case in the Solomon Islands.

In 2018, Australian Marist Solidarity (AMS) supporters donated \$50,000 to the Solomon Islands to improve school infrastructure and education.

One of the two projects that AMS has in the Solomon Islands is St Dominic's Rural Training Centre in Vanga Point. This school has been generously supported in the past by schools from the Marist Schools Australia network including:

- Champagnat Catholic College Pagewood
- Marist-Sion College
- Marist College Canberra

St Dominic's is a Marist-run rural training centre (RTC), operating since 1971 and offers vocational training in building, mechanics, poultry raising, agriculture and forestry. RTC plays an important role in the Solomon Islands educating youth from rural areas in practical vocational skills that allows them to stay in rural areas and halt the high rate of urbanization. Currently there are 145 students enrolled at the school.



There are two issues facing the St Dominic's. The first is that there is no dedicated administration building therefore the staff have no area to work. Without this proper infrastructure the staff of St Dominic's have not been able to properly plan lessons, undertake joint-planning sessions and conduct staff/student meetings. Once complete the building will provide office space for the principal and deputy principal, general staff room, department rooms and a bathroom block. The construction of the administration building is

currently underway and is being undertaken by the staff and students as part of their learning.

The second issue of which AMS is actively seeking donations for, will be the fitting out of the administration block with computers, as well as solar power installation throughout the campus. In Solomon Islands, less than 20 percent of the population has access to any electrical power supply, and when electricity is available, it is costly and unreliable.

With funds donated to St Dominic's, together we are actively increasing the quality of education for these students in time for the Coral Sea Cable System and bringing this community together to give the students a strong foundation of learning and provide better opportunities for future generations. 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## MARIST YOUTH MINISTRY BRISBANE

On 7 August, MYM Brisbane held our Year 11 Social Justice Forum. 48 students from six schools were in attendance as we explored what Social Justice looks like in our world today; how it affects us; and what we can do about it. Students had the opportunity to hear what Social Justice is, and how it relates to Catholic Social Teaching.

The students were able to participate in an interactive simulation experience called Basti Life. In the activity they were placed in the scenario of a poor family living in the slums. Within the activity the students had to make tough choices involving their family, all while encountering life situations that were unseeable, unfair and often destructive. The goal of the activity was to place the students in the shoes of real-life families who are severely limited by their situations. It is safe to say that the students gained a lot of insight from the experience.

We were also lucky to have Australian Marist Solidarity come and speak at the forum about what they do. It was great for the students to see and hear about what AMS does for the international community.

A big part of the day was the student forum. This forum was a place that enabled the students to run their own discussions and offer insights into Social Justice issues that they believe are important and relevant to them. This was a huge success as the students freely engaged in conversation and were highly motivated in discussing solutions to issues like mental health and the environment.

### A Message from John Hickey...

Dear Friends, Colleagues and Brothers,

Greetings from Marist Tertiary.

It is that time of year when those of you in our Marist schools are immersed in the 'in between' time – having one eye reviewing the past year and the other firmly focused on the year to come. The same is true of Marist Tertiary.

This year the Marist Educational Leadership course was run out of the Marist Office in Brunswick. A small but high-quality and enthusiastic group worked with Dr Jennifer Elvery and myself in unpacking Marist Leadership and discerning how this leadership 'lens' can be best put into practice in their own school environments. You can view some of the feedback from course participants on the following page.

While only one course was run this year, several staff used the opportunity to seek tertiary accreditation through their involvement in one of the Marist formation programs run through the Mission and Life Formation Team. The feedback from staff involved in these programs has been very positive also.

In terms of planning for 2020 and beyond, an exciting development this year was the implementation of a Marist Tertiary survey. The primary purpose of this survey, sent to all Marist schools, was to firstly, establish how many staff in Marist schools are currently undertaking tertiary study and secondly, to inquire as to how many staff would be interested in accessing the services of Marist Tertiary into the future. Close to 350 staff took

part in the survey so the data that has emerged is substantial and has given us invaluable information for our future planning.



In response to the survey data, things are already being put in to place for next year. Full details will be available in the Marist Programs and Events booklet which will be available in schools during fourth term but details of the main two courses being run next year are located here on the front page of this newsletter. A new development for next year is that for the Marist Educational Leadership course, there will be an option for staff who are not seeking any form of tertiary accreditation, to do the face to face component of the program (2 days) as a stand-alone. In other news, the Marist Tertiary Library, which is situated at the Marist Centre in Brunswick, is taking shape and will be a great resource for anyone engaged in further study next year and beyond. My best wishes to all Marists for a calm and productive final couple of months of the year and I look forward to a very exciting 2020 for Marist Tertiary.
