Call to Worship

Leader: The table of peace can take almost any shape. Our table this week is a conference table, perhaps depicting where two or more parties meet to negotiate the terms of a contract, a settlement, or a ceasefire. For Jesus, peacemaking was often found in the act of sharing a meal with people who would have been considered "outsiders." We like to imagine Jesus in perfect harmony with everyone who gathered with him at the table — but perhaps sometimes even he held his breath when he brought people together with opposing viewpoints. Today we come to the table of peace, ready to practice patience and compassion, even when we disagree. Let us stand in body or spirit and sing "Come to the table of peace."

ALL: Come to the table of peace Come to the table of peace This is God's table, it's not yours or mine Come to the table of peace!

Leader: We gather today to listen, to learn, and to love.

All: We are ready to share and to hear what others have to say.

Leader: Though we are all different, we yearn to find a mutual understanding.

Words of Invitation

One: This Sunday we will be sharing together in the sacrament of the Lord's Supper. At St. John's Church, all are welcome to participate in communion. Our table is open to everyone. You are welcome to participate today. Regardless of your faith, your doubts, your age or status, this table is open to you.

//This is a good spot to uncover the elements of communion, setting aside the cloth.

One: Our communion today will be served by intinction.

That means that when we are ready, I will invite you to come forward by way of the center aisle, take a piece of the bread, dip it into the cup, and eat it as you return to your seats by way of the side aisle. If you would prefer to receive communion in your seat, please raise your hand and an usher will attend you.

Our bread is gluten-free and our cup contains grape juice so that all may feel welcome to participate

One: Before we celebrate communion it is our tradition to go to God with open hearts. Sometimes this is known as a "prayer of confession." It is not meant to be a time of guilt, shame, sadness or regret - but a time for receiving peace and grace. We are seeking mercy and forgiveness and we believe that God is faithful and will hear our prayers.

Let us pray together silently for our needs...

SILENCE IS OBSERVED

Unison Prayer of Confession

.One: Friends, let us pray together:

ALL: Loving God, we confess that at times we do not live out the reality and beauty that this meal represents, that we are one body united in Christ. Forgive us when we find it more comfortable to limit who we share our lives with than to risk new relationships and celebrate every person as a gift of God in Christ. Call us back to Your ways, O God, to seek hope and reconciliation, restoration and peace. In the name of the Risen Christ, we pray. Amen.

Blessing of the Elements

One: Let us bless the meal that we are about to receive.

Many: We lift them up to God!

One: Let us give thanks to God Most High!

Many: It is right to give God thanks and praise.

One: Let us pray....

One: Holy and loving God, we thank you for the gift of this sacrament. Bless this food, bless this table, and bless the communion of saints here at St. John's United Church of Christ. Remind us of the power of this mystery. Bless this bread and this cup - that by receiving it we may be reminded of our communion through Christ Jesus - for we are all One Body, at work in the world, for the salvation of the world. Amen.

Words of Institution

One: Let us hear again the story of our faith:

"On the night that he was to be betrayed, and again - following the events of the resurrection in the village Emmaus - our Savior gathered his disciples together and, taking bread, he blessed it.

//lift the bread

After he had prayed he broke it

//break the bread and hold it aloft.

He explained to them that this was his body, broken for the salvation of the whole world, and that each time they ate of it they would do so in remembrance of him.

//set the bread down

Likewise, after they had eaten, he took the cup and blessed it.

//Pick up the pitcher and the empty cup, and fill the empty cup. Set down the cup or hold it aloft.

After he had prayed he gave it to them, explaining that this was the cup of the new covenant, between God and God's creation, for its salvation eternal, and that each time they drank of it they would do so in remembrance of him.

Beloved, all is ready, I invite you to come.

The Children Gather

Scripture September 22: Pat Partridge, Bren Tooley, and Casey Berg Romans 14: 1-12 and Matthew 18: 21-35 (MSG)

Leader: We welcome each other at the table even when we disagree. Coming to tables of peacemaking is hard work. We must be willing to suspend our propensity for making ourselves the judge of others. Accountability AND forgiveness are on the menu at God's table and we are called to sit down and find merciful ways to deal with one another despite our differences. Hear now this scripture advice from the 14th chapter of the Letter to the Romans, followed by a remembrance of what Jesus said in the Gospel of Matthew. Imagine those early Christian Romans gathered at a table, reading this advice from a letter to one another and remembering the words of Jesus:

Reader 1: Welcome with open arms fellow believers who don't see things the way you do. And don't jump all over them every time they do or say something you don't agree with — even when it seems that they are strong on opinions but weak in the faith department. Remember, they have their own history to deal with. Treat them gently.

Reader 2: For instance, a person who has been around for a while might well be convinced that he can eat anything on the table, while another, with a different background, might assume he should only be a vegetarian and eat accordingly. But since both are guests at Christ's table, wouldn't it be terribly rude if they fell to criticizing what the other ate or didn't eat?

Reader 3: God, after all, invited them both to the table. Do you have any business crossing people off the guest list or interfering with God's welcome? If there are corrections to be made or manners to be learned, God can handle that without your help.

Reader 1: Or, say, one person thinks that some days should be set aside as holy and another thinks that each day is pretty much like any other. There are good reasons either way. So, each person is free to follow the convictions of conscience.

Reader 2: What's important in all this is that if you keep a holy day, keep it for God's sake; if you eat meat, eat it to the glory of God and thank God for prime rib; if you're a vegetarian, eat vegetables to the glory of God and thank God for broccoli. None of us are permitted to insist on our own way in these matters.

Reader 3: So where does that leave you when you criticize a brother? And where does that leave you when you condescend to a sister? I'd say it leaves you looking pretty silly — or worse. Eventually, we're all going to end up kneeling side by side in the place of judgment, facing God.

Reader 1: Your critical and condescending ways aren't going to improve your position there one bit. Read it for yourself in Scripture: "As I live and breathe," God says, "every knee will bow before me; Every tongue will tell the honest truth that I and only I am God."

Reader 2: So mind your own business. You've got your hands full just taking care of your own life before God.

Reader 3: Do you remember what Jesus said about forgiveness? Peter asked, "How many times do I forgive a brother or sister who hurts me? Seven?" Jesus replied, "Seven! Hardly. Try seventy times seven."

All readers: "Hear! Hear!"


