A Word from Our Pastors

A Prayer for the New Year

O Light of God, anointed by your morning light I lift my spirit to receive the gift of this new day. Open my eyes to the beauty that surrounds me that I may walk through this day with the kind of awareness that calls forth grateful living. In all of creation let me see the brightness of your face. Shine in my heart and on my life, filling me with joy, creativity, hope, and laughter. Draw me into the radiant glory of your presence and into the small lights of those with whom I live and work. Inspire me to take time for those who are discouraged. May I live with the kind of presence that enables others to feel at home. Great Dawn of God, hear my prayer. Amen.

(from Seven Sacred Pauses by Macrina Wiederkehr)

This prayer is from a favorite book of mine that honors “the hours,” the seven specific times within a day when especially those who live in monastic communities pray. The “hours” are: midnight, dawn, mid-morning, noon, mid-afternoon, evening, and night. And, as you may suspect, the prayer above is appointed for dawn, “the awakening hour.” It is a prayer, however, that is certainly appropriate for another “awakening hour” – the dawn of a new year, the beginning of a new, 365-day journey around the sun.

- *Light of God, anointed by your morning light I lift my spirit to receive the gift of this new day...*We so easily forget that every day – and every year - are, indeed, gifts of new time that we have not had before and will never have again. Today is not a re-run of yesterday, my friends, but God’s new and precious creation. And for us as a congregation, this new year is the gift of new time for ministry, some of it similar to past ministry and some of it innovative and – yes - new!
- *Shine in my heart and on my life, filling me with joy, creativity, hope, and laughter...*The prayer reminds us that we, as individuals, and as a community of faith, are created - in all ways and always - to praise God. While a prayer for strength “just to get through the day” is certainly appropriate, and has seemed to be the one we’ve prayed most often in the past year, I want us to also pray as a community: *fill me - fill us - with joy!* Joy has the ability, you see, “to live with and through the sorrows,” deepening our trust in God.
- *May I live with the kind of presence that enables others to feel at home...* This is, perhaps, my favorite line of this prayer. We cannot, by our own effort, do what we ask for in these words. In our rush to judge, to build ourselves up by cutting others down, and, as a result of the fear that our differences often provoke, we make it difficult for others to find hospitality in us and in our community. Yet, what are all sinners constantly seeking? Community, home, welcome, and rest. If I had to choose just one line of the prayer for St. John’s to pray in the year ahead it would be this one: May we live – in Des Moines, in the ELCA, in the world – with the kind of presence that enables others to feel at home.



As we begin a new journey around the sun, I invite you to save the prayer above and put it with your Bible and devotional books, so that we will be praying it together as the calendar turns, and as our mission to share God's love with others continues. I count it a privilege to be sharing each new day, as well as this new year, with you.

Prepare for Worship

Sunday, January 3, Second Sunday of Christmas

Within the gospel reading's profound words lies the simple message that God is revealed in a human person. Though we may try to understand how the Word existed with God from the beginning of time, the wonder we celebrate at Christmas is that the Word continues to dwell among us. Christ comes among us in the gathered assembly, the scriptures, the waters of new birth, and the bread and the wine. Through these ordinary gifts we receive the fullness of God's grace and truth.

The readings are Jeremiah 31:7-14; Psalm 147:12-20; Ephesians 1:3-14; and John 1:1-18. The hymns will be ELW 253, "He Came Down," ELW 510, "Word of God, Come Down to Earth," and ELW 292, "Love Has Come." At 8:45 Cathedral Choir will sing "The Glory of the Father," by Egil Hovland based on John 1. At 11:00 am Amy Walman Madden will sing, "Nothing But a Child." The assembly will sing "What Feast of Love," ELW 487 during communion.

Sunday, January 10, Baptism of Our Lord – Healing Sunday

The Baptism of Our Lord cannot help but recall our own and all baptismal blessings. We recall and celebrate our adoption as daughters and sons, the gift of the Holy Spirit, and the promised company of almighty God when we "pass through the waters... the rivers... Fire." On this day the heavens open again, for this assembly, and we receive the gift of the beloved Son of God in bread and wine.

The readings are Isaiah 43:1-7; Psalm 29; Acts 8:14-17; and Luke 3:15-17, 21-22. The hymns will be ELW 448, "This Is the Spirit's Entry Now," ELW 305, "When Jesus Came to Jordan," and ELW 310, "Songs of Thankfulness and Praise." Cantorei at 8:45 and Cathedral Choir at 11:00 am will sing "As Jesus Walked into the Stream" by Susan Borwick for offering and "I'm Going on a Journey" ELW 446 during communion.

Sunday, January 17, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Observed

Throughout the early centuries of the Christian Church right on through the Middle Ages, saints and martyrs

played an important role in forming the faith and piety of Christians, not only be serving as examples but by showing clearly the cost of discipleship. The Protestant Reformation understandably de-emphasized saints in an effort to focus more clearly on Christ as our unique savior and God's only son. Still, we miss something important in our faith journey if we do not acknowledge the price paid by those Christian who paid the ultimate price to bequeath the faith to us: Dietrich Bonhoeffer, no less than Justin Martyr, and Dr. Martin Luther King, no less than Saint Lucy.

The readings will be specially chosen for the day both from scripture and from the writing of Dr. King. The hymns will be ELW 523, "Let Us Go Now to the Banquet," ELW 729, "The Church of Christ, in Every Age," and ELW 720, "We Are Called." At 11:00 am Cathedral Choir will present an extended work written by Moses Hogan in honor of Dr. Martin Luther King, "His Light Still Shines."

Sunday, January 24, Third Sunday after Epiphany

Every week the lectors at St. John's preface their reading with the words, "People of God, listen for the Word of the Lord," to which we respond, "Our ears are open." The readings this week give a vivid example of what that looks like. The glory of the Lord is revealed in the reading of scripture. People stand at attention. People weep. People prostrate themselves in prayer. The unity of the church is another reflection of the glory of God. Most gloriously, the promises of God are fulfilled in the person of Jesus Christ. Gather round. Listen up. Glimpse the Glory of God.

The readings are Nehemiah 8:1-3, 5-6, 8-10; Psalm 19; 1 Corinthians 12:12-31a; and Luke 4:14-21. The hymns will be ELW 886, "Oh, For a Thousand Tongues to Sing" ELW 311, "Hail to the Lord's Anointed," setting by Mark Bender, and ELW 843, "Praise the One Who Breaks the Darkness." At 8:45 Cantorei will sing the offering music. At 11:00 am, the St. John's Cathedral Choir and Chamber Orchestra will perform Joseph Haydn's setting of Psalm 19 from "The Creation," "The Heavens are Telling" for offering and Michael Haydn's "Beatus Vir," ("How Blest are They") during communion.

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Sunday, January 31, Fourth Sunday after Epiphany

The glory of God is often revealed when and where it is least expected. God uses our lips to declare that glory, inexperienced and hesitant thought they may be. God uses our love to demonstrate that glory and so urges us to exercise it. God uses Jesus of Nazareth, water and the word, bread and wine, to reveal God's glory where and when God chooses. Take heed, lest the glory of God slip through our midst unnoticed.

The readings are Jeremiah 1:4-10; Psalm 71:1-6; 1 Corinthians 13:1-13; and Luke 4:21-30. The hymns will be ELW 520, "Dearest Jesus, at Your Word," ELW 676, "Lord, Speak to Us that We May Speak," and ELW 668, "O Zion, Haste." At 8:45 the offering music will be "He Comes to Us as One Unknown," Jane Marshall sung by Cathedral Choir.

Below are examples of some of our efforts to make "faith active in love." What is Healing Touch?

Healing Touch is a relaxing, nurturing energy-based therapy that can be used for ages and works with standard medical care.

The goal of Healing Touch is to restore harmony and balance in the body's energy system placing the client in a position to self-heal. The Healing Touch Practitioner's hands are placed lightly on the body or above the body to clear, energize, and balance the human energy flow.

Body, mind, emotion, and spirit are touched through this therapeutic process, and each individual is empowered to participate fully in his or her healing journey. People frequently report feeling deeply relaxed and peaceful during and after the treatment.

How can healing touch benefit you?


- Reduce stress
