Just because the school year comes to an end doesn't mean there are no hands-on arts opportunities for the third- through sixth-grade students (from six Des Moines public schools) served by the After School Arts Program (ASAP). Although ASAP is held at St. John's Lutheran Church during the regular school year, the past five years an ASAP Summer Arts Camp has been held at Evelyn K. Davis Park on Forest Avenue, where it has helped to enrich summer programming for about 100 kids per day.

Jazz will be the featured theme of the 2013 ASAP Summer Arts Camp, which will take place Monday through Friday, June 24-28. Walk-up registration starts daily at 11:45 a.m. Studios are offered in two blocks: noon to 1 p.m. and 1 to 2 p.m.

## A Word from Our Pastors Pastor Bob Speirs

We gathered Saturday afternoon, May 18, to once again begin the process of planting our St. John's Faith Garden – our third year. With the help of Ed and Mary Slattery, and their excellent and generous tilling skills, the ground was prepared for the St. John's gardening team to begin the hard, but satisfying work of planting, watering and laying down newspaper and mulch for our no-weed garden. When we had finished our work for the afternoon and were satisfied we had a great start to what we hope will be a banner year of produce, I was asked to offer a prayer of blessing and

thanksgiving to begin our gardening season. The following passage from John's Gospel came to mind as I thought about what I was going to say:

When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, "Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my lambs." A second time he said to him, "Simon son of John, do you love me?" He said, "Yes, Lord: you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Tend my sheep." He said to him a third time, "Simon son of John, do you love me?" Peter felt hurt because he said to him a third time, "Do you love me?" And he said to him, "Lord you know everything, you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my sheep." John 21: 15-17

After the devotion and prayer, and when our gardening crew had departed for the afternoon, I looked upon the work we had achieved. I marveled at the many ways our St. John's faith community understands, responds and rallies around Jesus' call to "feed my sheep." I believe we realize Jesus' charge on several different levels: to begin with, we feed our neighbors with the word of God and share with them the hope, blessing and promise we have in Jesus Christ, in worship and in our daily lives. At another level, we recognize we are called and directed to attend to people's emotional and spiritual needs in times of illness, loss and grief – being present and walking with them through the care we give and the prayers we offer. Yet, at another level, we also feed Jesus' sheep in the physical sense, and at St. John's we do this in many ways.

The produce we raise from our Faith Garden (and the gardens of others in our congregation who will offer the fruits of their labors) will be brought to the Des Moines Area Religious Council's (DMARC's) Food Pantry to be distributed to persons and families who are having difficulty in affording, or having access to, fresh and nutritious produce. Our Faith Garden offerings are over and above the canned goods and other resources we give to DMARC each year.

On the 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> of each month we provide and serve the evening meals at the Central Iowa Shelter, feeding approximately 210 each night. It takes a lot of volunteers, time and resources to fulfill this commitment, but through our willingness and generosity we are able to succeed.

St. John's plays an essential role in supporting the downtown Connection Café, a midday meal program that serves lunch to more than 100 people a day, five days a week. Many of those served are either homeless or working poor.

St. John's also is committed to working with the Family Promise of Greater Des Moines (formerly Interfaith Hospitality Network), an organization that provides temporary living quarters to families who are in transition between employment and housing. Part of our responsibility, once again, is to bring food but also to provide fellowship, a listening ear and other means of support. We also serve this program by volunteering as overnight hosts available to these families in case of an emergency. So there is a social aspect to feeding Jesus' sheep as well.

We at St. John's support the Coalition in Support of Hungry Children, an organization dedicated to alleviating childhood hunger by 2015. In particular, we supply food for the Backpack Buddies program, another food and nutrition service, which provides school children with healthy meals that they can take home, which helps these children achieve greater academic success.

Consider also the gracious generosity our congregational members provide through our Good Samaritan Fund, which helps our neighbors with rent, utilities and food on occasion. We just concluded another wonderful year of Wednesday evening Beloved Community meals, where we prepared dinner for about 125 people per evening. Then consider the fine ministry we are attending to through our Companion Parish Ministry in Mramba Parish, Tanzania and our support of the After School Arts Program (ASAP), which features a studio where children in the program learn about nutrition and cooking. The list of important food-related ministries we support here at St. John's is ongoing – with seemingly no end.

Food and feeding people is a wonderful and significant part of St. John's ministry. Thank you once again for all you do to live out and respond to Jesus' call: "Feed my Sheep."

## Prepare for Worship

### Sunday, June 2 Time after Pentecost

God hears every prayer – the prayer of the outsider as well as the prayer of the insider. The attentive nature of our God is evident as God comes to us again and again in the word and in the supper. "Ascribe to the LORD the honor due the holy name; bring offerings and enter the courts of the LORD." This is what we do when we assemble as a community on a Sunday.

During June we will switch to the alternate "semi-continuous" Old Testament reading and psalm in order to hear some Elijah stories, so our readings will be 1 Kings 18:20-39 and Psalm 96. The epistle is Galatians 1:1-12 and the gospel reading Luke 7:1-10. The hymns will be ELW 858, "Praise to the Lord, the Almightty," ELW 610, "O Christ, the Healer, We Have Come," and ELW 673, "God, Whose Almighty Word." Home from graduate work in Arizona, Katy McDowell will sing for offering at communion at 10 a.m.

### Sunday, June 9 Time after Pentecost

The time after Pentecost is a teaching time, a growing time, in the life of the church. Today's texts celebrate God's ability and intention to provide us with abundance and a new lease on life. To that end, we gather on the first day of the week with the whole people of God to be instructed by the word and nourished in the sacrament.

The readings are 1 Kings 17:8-24, Psalm 146, Galatians 1:11-24 and Luke 7:11-17. The hymns will be ELW 867, "In Thee is Gladness," ELW 860, "I'm So Glad Jesus Lifted Me," and ELW 542, "O Living Bread from Heaven." Offering and communion music at 10 a.m. will be provided by Amy Walman Madden and Chris Frantsvog.

### Sunday, June 16 Time after Pentecost

The enormity of the sum total of ways we fall short of all God intends for our lives is surpassed only by the mercy, understanding and love of God. We come, repentant, to the table of the Lord. In the body and blood of Jesus, in the announcement of our absolution, all our sins are forgiven. "Happy are they ... whose sin is put away." Happy are we.

The readings are 1 Kings 21:1-21a, Psalm 5:1-8, Galatians 2:15-21 and Luke 7:3b-8:3. The hymns will be ELW 526, "God Is Here!" ELW 587 (ELW 588 at 5 p.m. and 8 a.m.), "There's a Wideness in God's Mercy," and ELW 863, "My God, How Wonderful Thou Art."

### Sunday, June 23 Time after Pentecost

In this Sunday's readings, God's judgment is severe for the false Gods and loyalties that we put in God's place. But God is more gracious to the foreigner, outsider and outcast and reaches out to them – and to us – in Jesus.

The readings are 1 Kings 19:1-15a, Psalms 42 and 43, Galatians 3:23-29 and Luke 8:26-39. The hymns will be ELW 651, "Oh, Praise the Gracious Power," ELW 843, "Praise the One Who Breaks the Darkness," and ELW 537, "On Our Way Rejoicing."

### Sunday, June 30 Time after Pentecost

We have no good apart from God. That makes our Lord's call to follow him an invitation to freedom. This is freedom to revel in the Spirit's fruits: love, joy, peace, patience and the like. This freedom is the path of life.

The readings are 2 Kings 2:1-2, 6-14, Psalm 77:1-2, 11-20, Galatians 5:1,13-25 and Luke 9:51-62. The hymns will be ELW 786, "O Holy Spirit, Enter In," ELW 798, "Will You Come and Follow Me," and ELW 810, "O Jesus, I Have Promised."

## The Ministry of Prayer

"Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and

supplication with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus." - Philippians 4:6-7

Many of you are familiar with the published prayer page that accompanies our bulletins each week. Prayer requests are gleaned from notations on the worship cards turned in from our weekend services. Requests come from members, visitors and, judging from the handwriting, elders, children and all ages inbetween. We also receive calls from people who are not members and don't wish to leave their names, but are in crisis and ask for prayerful support.

In addition to the published list, we have a prayer chain, as you may have seen on the worship card. What you may not know is that there is a group of very devoted participants, prayer ministers, who each week receive a list of prayer requests. Our current prayer ministers are eight dedicated and faithful pray-ers. Last week's prayer chain had 91 requests from individuals and families for cures, needs, strength, help, etc. One of our seasoned members of the prayer chain remarked on the number of requests and how the need has grown – a sign of our times perhaps.

You may ask what qualifies these people to participate in this ministry, and the answer is simple – a willing heart, trust in God's goodness and a desire to help others. There is no required certification, no continuing education to track, not even required reading – unless you simply wish to read the Bible, a prayer book or other resource. But that's up to you. All you need do is talk to God.

Growing up Catholic, it was a sign of "goodness" to know all the standard prayers: Our Father, Hail Mary, Act of Contrition and, literally, the mother of all...the Rosary. Oh, those prayers were simple enough, but memorizing all the "Mysteries" in the proper order and for the appropriate day, well, that was something else again. Being a natural overachiever (I've outgrown that!), I not only had to say all my prayers at bedtime, I had to say them perfectly. Perfectly meant each word said without

my mind wandering or getting distracted – not an easy task for a five-year-old. And, the pièce de résistance, if I messed up, which I inevitably did, I had to start ALL over again, and I had quite a long list (that over-achiever thing, again).

I remember one time my mother was very sick; she had pneumonia and it was serious. Her younger sister, a nurse, had come to help care for her. I may have been young, but I still remember the fear and tension from my father and older brother. I somehow decided that my nighttime prayers were the key to my mother getting well. If I could just say them all correctly, God would cure my mother. I was so scared for her and so tired I couldn't get through the prayers; I kept having to start them over and over again. I was nearly hysterical. My aunt came in to find out what was wrong, and I told her. She guided me through the prayers and also told me to simply tell Jesus what I needed and wanted. I didn't have to be perfect; Jesus would make it so.

Many years later, I found another powerful message for prayer. I was a single mother with a five-year-old son, eight-year-old daughter, two elderly parents (my mom made it through the pneumonia), a job and no time. I heard a religious sister give a talk about prayer and how every act we do can and is an act of prayer, if we remember to offer those efforts to God. If you're a stay-at-home parent, everything you do on behalf of your children and family is prayer; it is meeting their needs and nourishing them soul and body. In the work place, your assistance to co-workers, kindness to someone who is down, simply doing good and honest work is a prayer.

Our prayers, action or thought, don't have to be long nor elaborate; they simply need to be guided and given to God. Sometimes the need is so great that it's hard to know what to ask or how to ask. That is when we are reminded by Romans 8:26, ". . . the Spirit helps us in our weakness; for we do not know how to pray as we ought, but that very Spirit intercedes with *sighs too deep for words.*"

I've taken this meandering trip down memory lane to bring to you the immense need, and yet the simplicity, of prayer ministry. For people who have scheduling conflicts, transportation issues, financial constraints, whatever, prayer ministry is do-able. And, please bear with me as I say again, it is needed!



## News from the Garden

Several members of the St. John's Faith Garden team planted vegetables in Pastor Bob Speir's backyard on May 18, a nearly perfect afternoon. This year's garden will produce tomatoes, peppers, cauliflower, broccoli, zucchini, cucumbers, beets, bush beans and sugar snap peas for the Des Moines Area Religious Council's (DMARC's) Move the Food pantries.

The volunteers placed wet newspapers between rows and plants and covered them with the mulch Pastor Bob had procured with his trusty red pickup. The mulch-covered newspaper will give the vegetables a head start on any wily weeds trying to grow from under the mulch – they'll have a tougher time finding the life-giving rays of the sun. At least that's the theory.

Pastor Bob blessed the garden using the passage from John 21 in which Jesus asks Peter three times if he loves him. Peter replies three times, "You know I love you." Jesus says to Peter, "Then feed my sheep." Pastor Bob says we are to feed Jesus' sheep not only spiritually but physically, too. We do so with our garden produce, which will be donated to DMARC to distribute to those who have difficulty buying it for themselves because of limited income.

### Growing in Faith at Home

The 50<sup>th</sup> day after Easter is Pentecost. On this day, the Holy Spirit came to Jesus's disciples so they could carry on His work and establish the church throughout the world. Read this story in Acts 2:1-41 with your child to help them understand Pentecost.

The deeply rooted plant growing under the sun symbolizes the Church living and growing in the light of God.

The season of Pentecost emphasizes life in the Spirit. We live in the community of the church, and GROW in faith, hope and love with the help of the Holy Spirit.

The color for the Sundays after Pentecost is green. Green is the color of life and growth in the Spirit. There are green plants growing all around us in the summer. As you notice flowers and plants growing all around you, remind your child that those green plants remind you of the season of Pentecost. Use the key words and phrases of "grow in faith, hope and help of the Holy Spirit." As you relate your faith to the world around you, your child will begin to make connections in their own faith!

### Arts at St. John's: A Year in Review

Many thanks to all who support the arts at St. John's, and a very special thank-you to the Arts Visioning Team.

The commitment, talent, and appreciation of the arts are outstanding at St. John's! Our 2012-13 programming brought the arts to every corner of the church and beyond! Take note of a few highlights:

The Performing Arts Series presented three concerts conducted by Larry Christensen and showcasing the St. John's Cathedral Choir. Bach's *Magnificat*, in collaboration with Drake University's String Ensemble, was presented in November. Two spring concerts took place, one with Tropical Steel, and the other showcasing talent from St. John's and friends.

Artist of the Month exhibits rotated monthly in Weertz Hall. The December exhibit of young children was poignant and full of promise; the April collaborative exhibit on the Way of the Cross involved over 20 artists from St. John's.

The Midweek Music Series gained momentum as the season progressed. Each Wednesday from late September through early May, St. John's hosted world-class musicians for a mid-week respite from the world outside. Attendance grew throughout the year, as did the attendance at the lunches served after each concert.

The Arts in worship were evident throughout the year, on an almost weekly basis. Cathedral Choir, String Scholars, brass and other ensembles, and vocal and instrumental soloists shared with worshippers beautiful and unique outlets for God's praise through music.

The Handbell Repair fundraiser met the goal of \$10,000 in very short order. The cases were ordered and have arrived. The bells are now completely refurbished and ready for 30-plus years of ringing. Since September, St. John's has seen three very healthy bell choirs take shape; handbell music was present in worship two or three Sundays each month.
