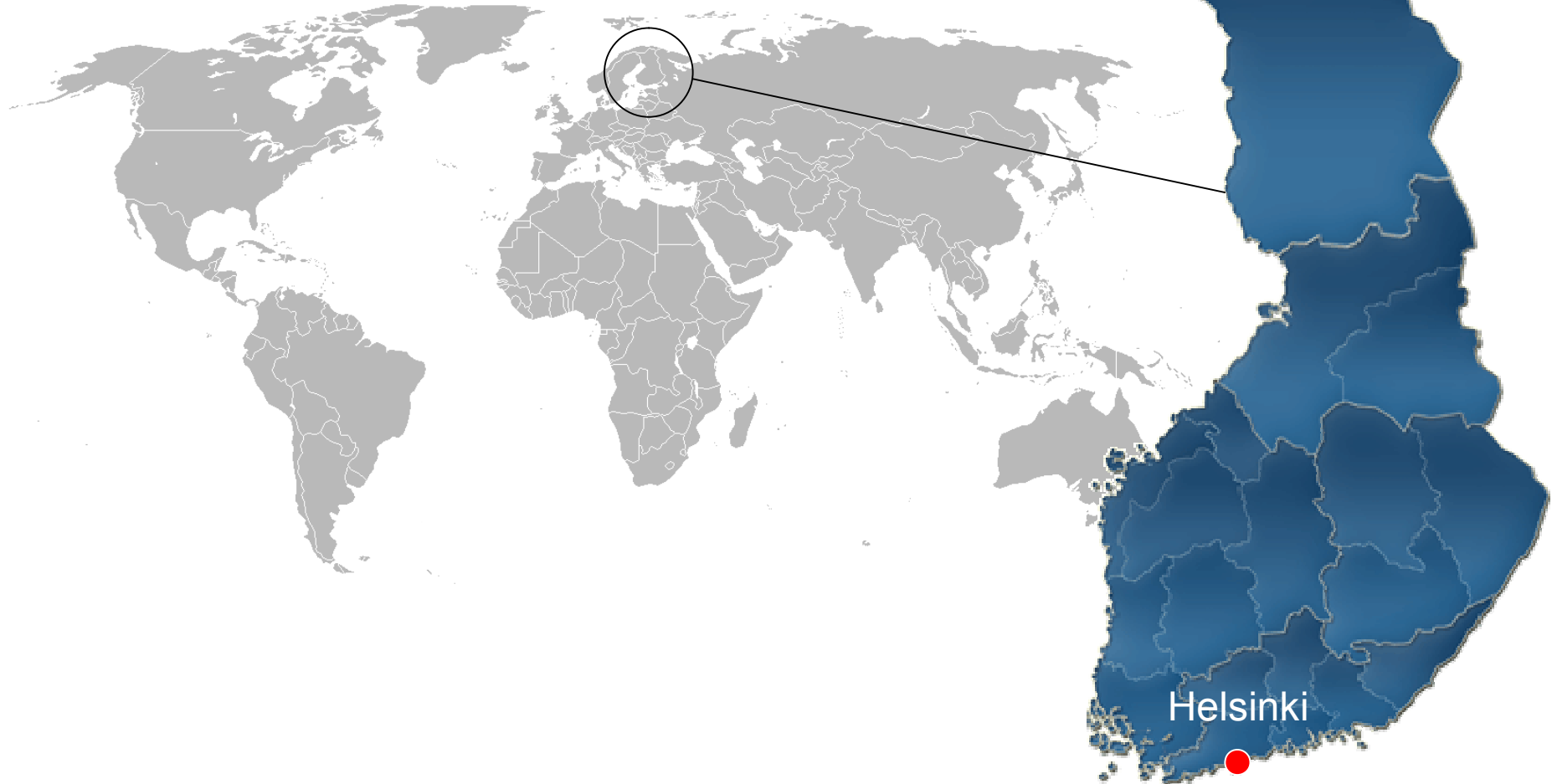
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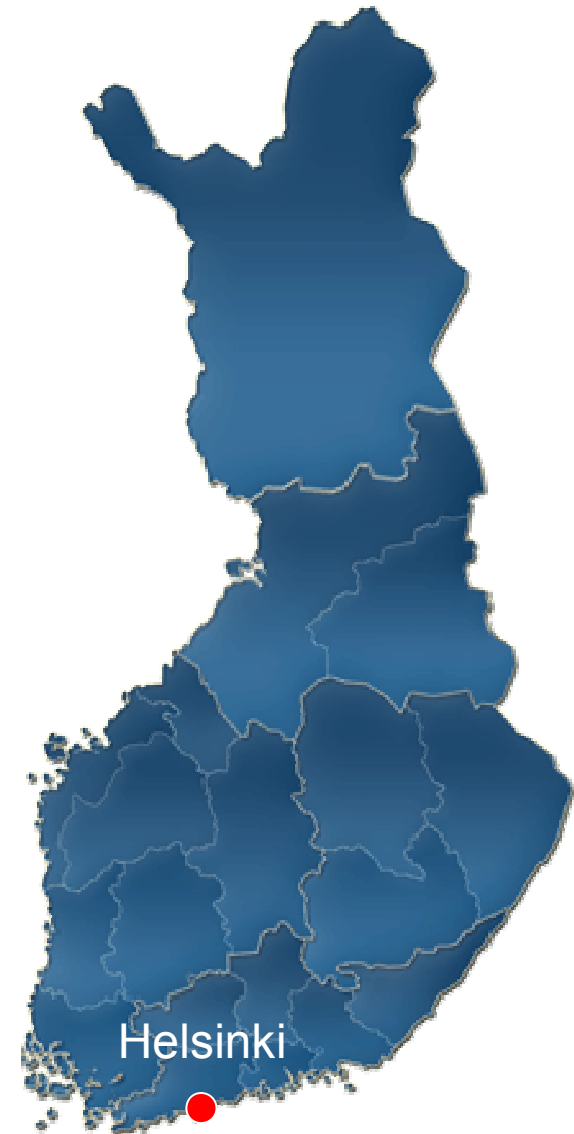
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Finland facts 2011

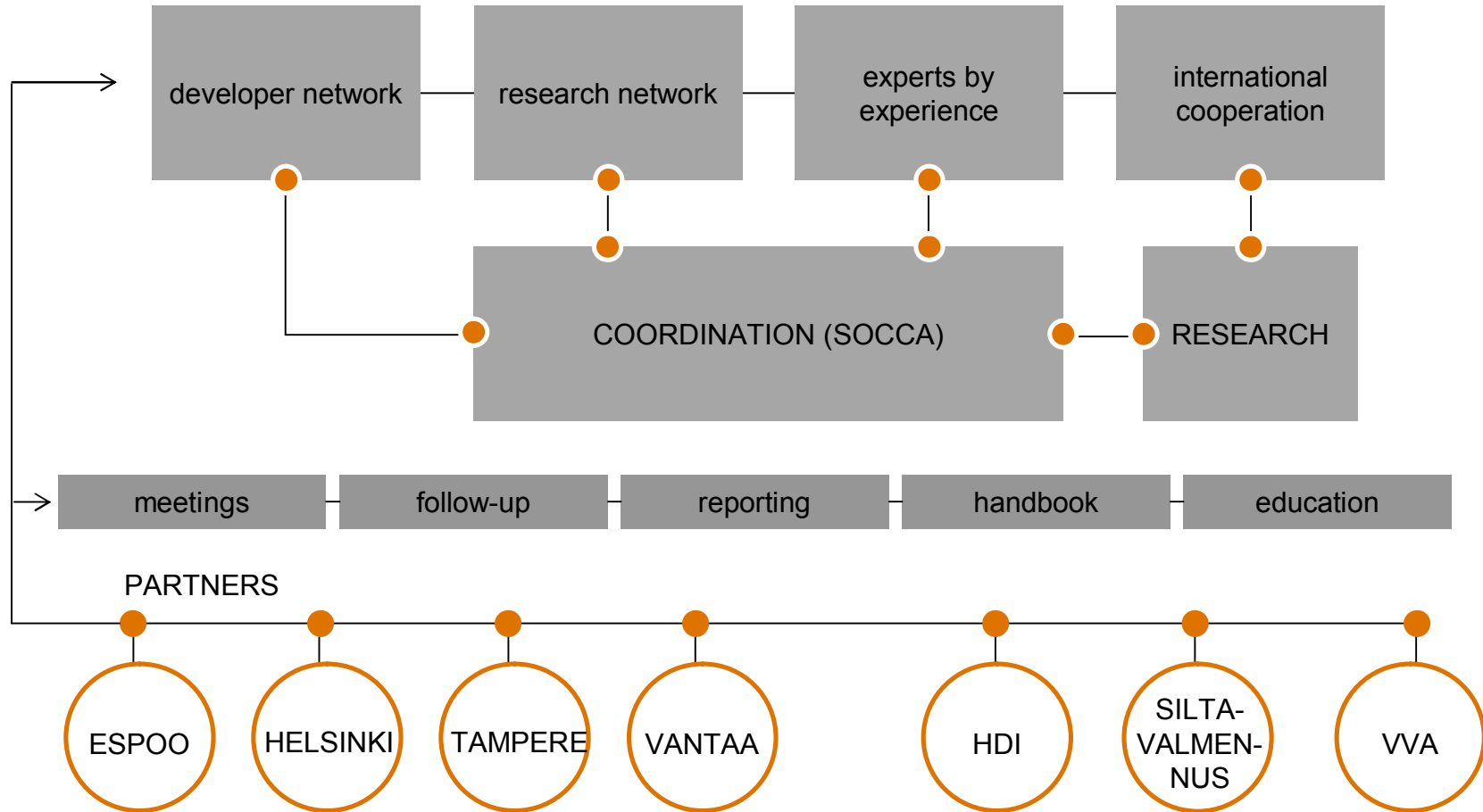
- Population: 5 401 267
- Area: 130 127 square miles
- GDP/c: \$46 639
- Immigrants: 183 055 (3,4%)
- Temperature: from -43°F to 91°F



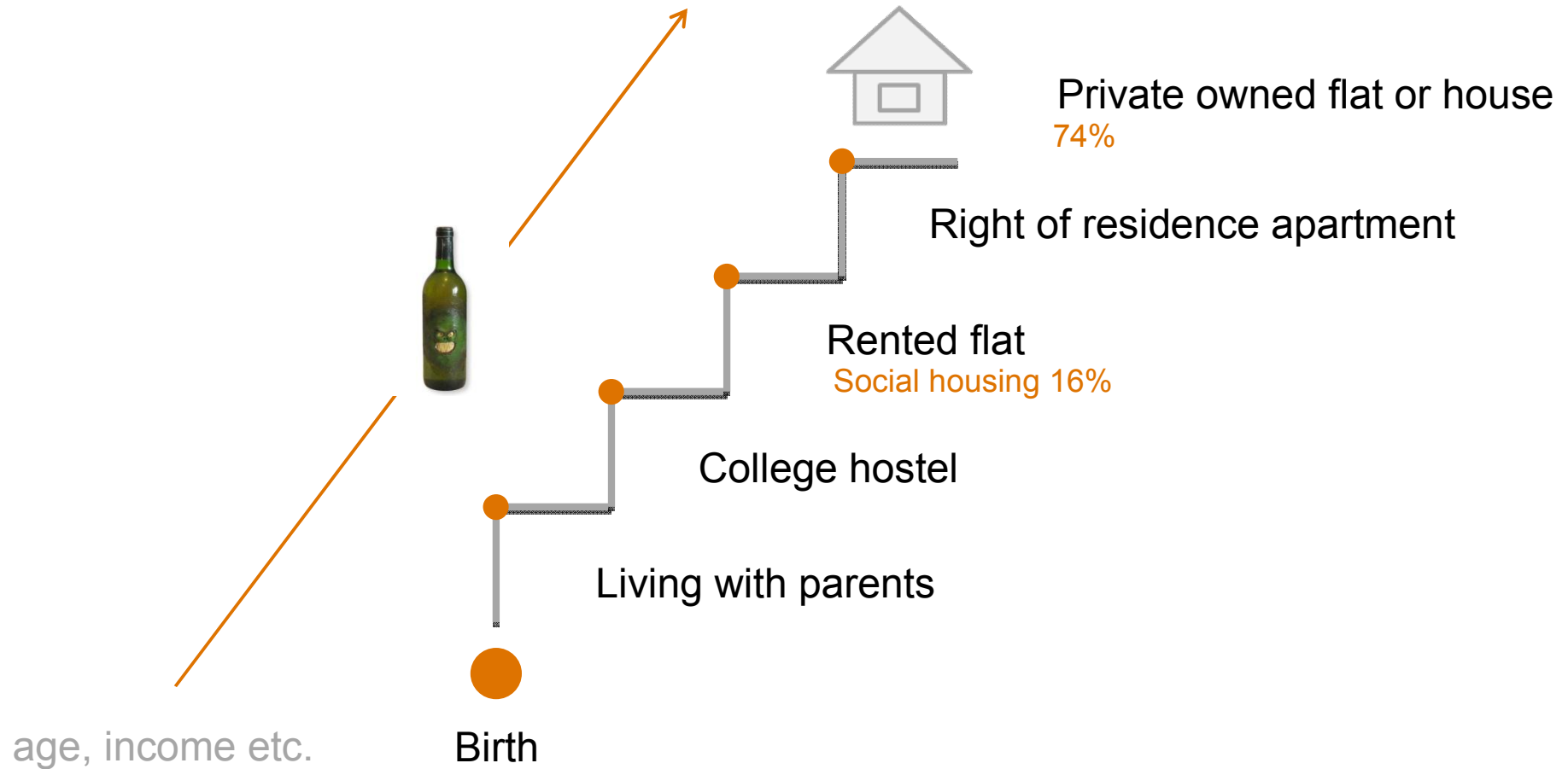
Nimi ovesa (Name in the Door) project 2010-12

- The aim of the project is to catalyse a paradigm shift towards housing first principle in a service system for a long-term homeless people
- Four Finnish cities are collaborated: Espoo, Helsinki, Tampere, Vantaa + several service providers from private and third sector
- Projects is funded by the four cities, HDI and TEKES (The Finnish Funding Agency for Technology and Innovation)
- The Internet handbook of implementations of HF

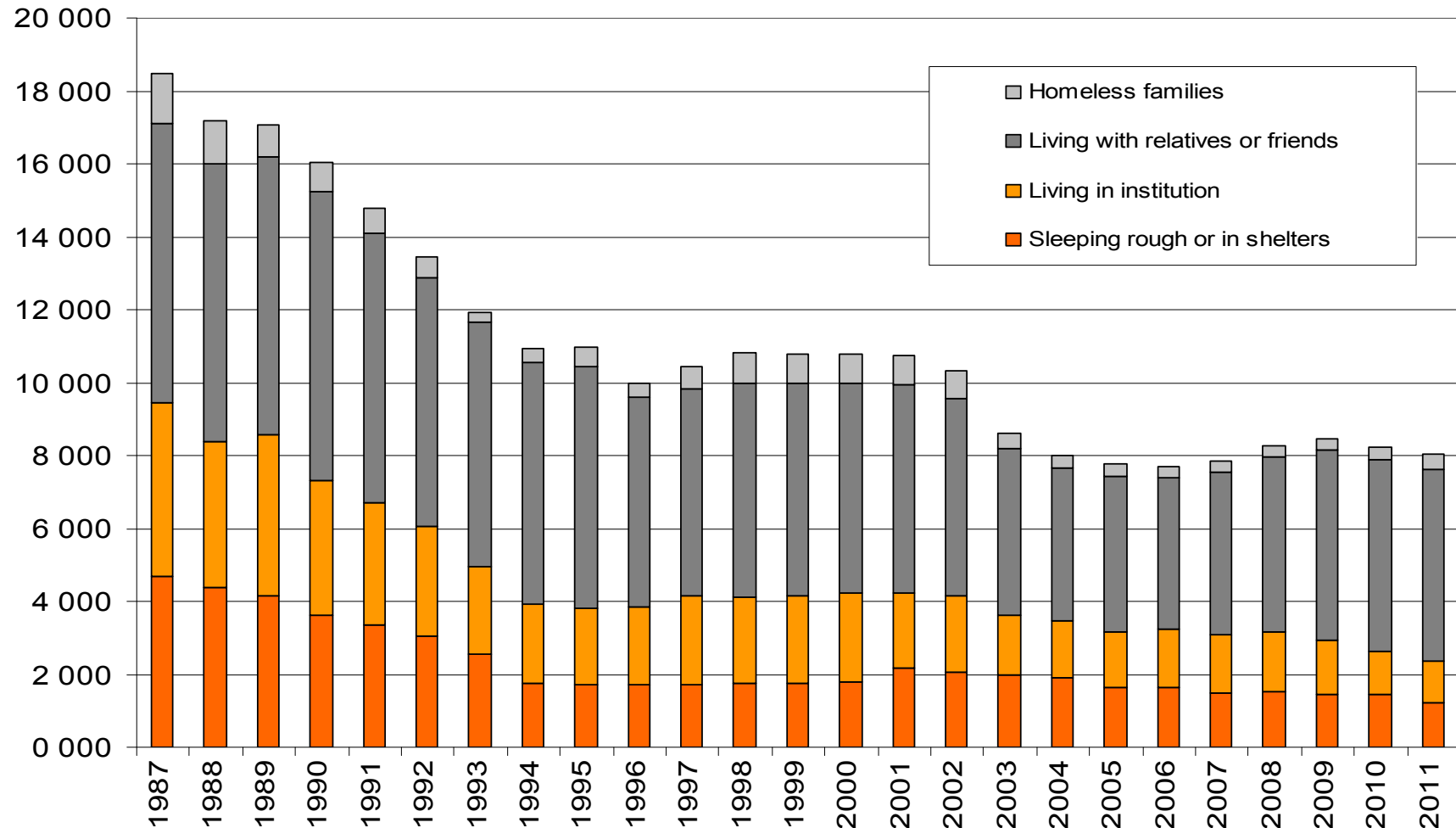
Cooperation network of the project



Housing market in Finland



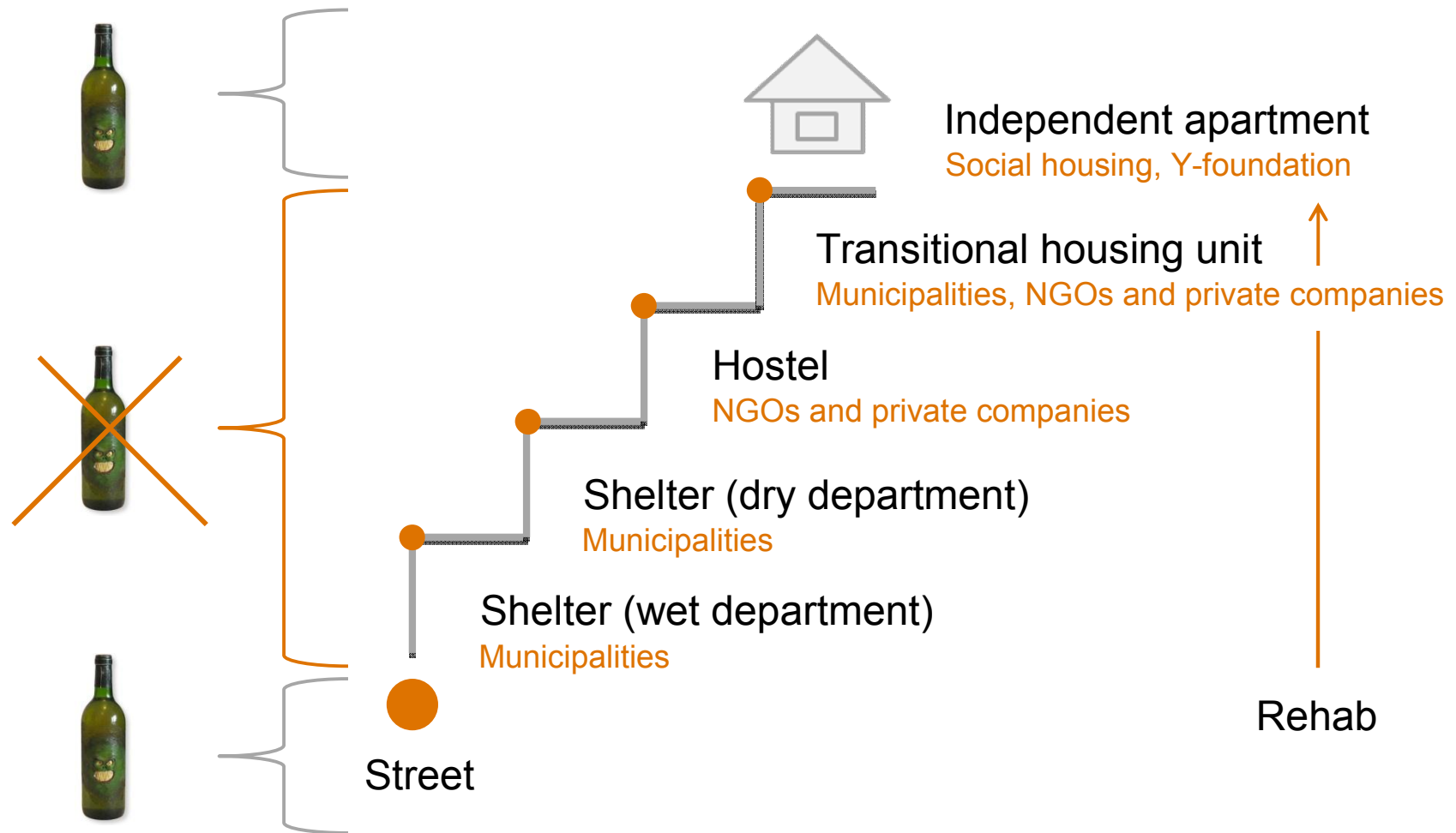
Homelessness in Finland 1987-2011

Housing history 1/6: Hostels 1880-

👤 200

Build for short time residents and for travelling working force
Shared rooms, low tolerance for substance abuse, revolving doors
The hostels are now renovated to small studios with rental agreements

Housing history 2/6: Woods & streets -1967



44 homeless persons died in Helsinki during extremely cold winter 1967
The November movement was established
Service system for homeless people started to develop

Housing history 3/6: Night shelters 1967-



First night shelter opened 1967 in the Helsinki city center

Wet departments for the people with ongoing substance abuse problems

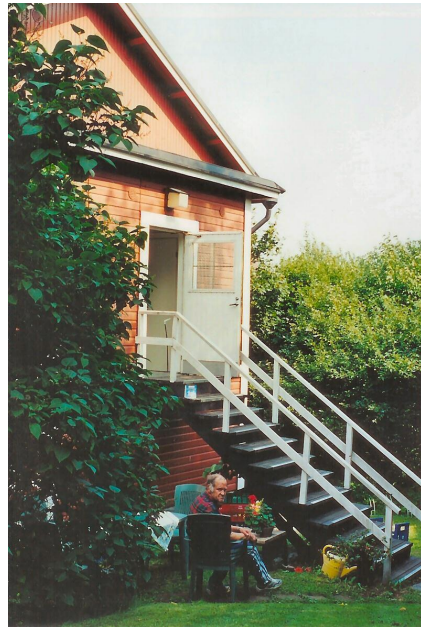
Dry departments for the people aiming for rehabilitation programs

Housing history 4/6: Group homes 1985-

Small size supported group homes for the homeless people

Housing history 5/6: Independent flats 1985-

Y-foundation was established

Secondary leasing cooperation with the municipalities (City of Helsinki)

Operating mainly as a last step of the staircase model

National programme to reduce LTH

- Objective is to settle over 3000 LTH persons in 8 years
- Reinforcing Housing First
- Because of the quantity/time: large units are needed
Hostels are renovated to small studios
- Permanent rental agreements as a goal
- Harm reduction approach - 24/7 on site support / ctrl
- Focus on scattered housing in 2012-2015

National programmes to reduce LTH

- **First phase 2008-2011**

Conversion of shelters and hostels into supported housing

1250 new dwellings, supported housing or care places in ten major cities

2010: 494 new dwellings in use

2011: 581 under construction, will be in use

2012: 622 under planning and construction will be in use

Total: 1697 new dwellings

- **Second phase 2012-2015**

1000 new dwellings of which at least 500 in scattered housing

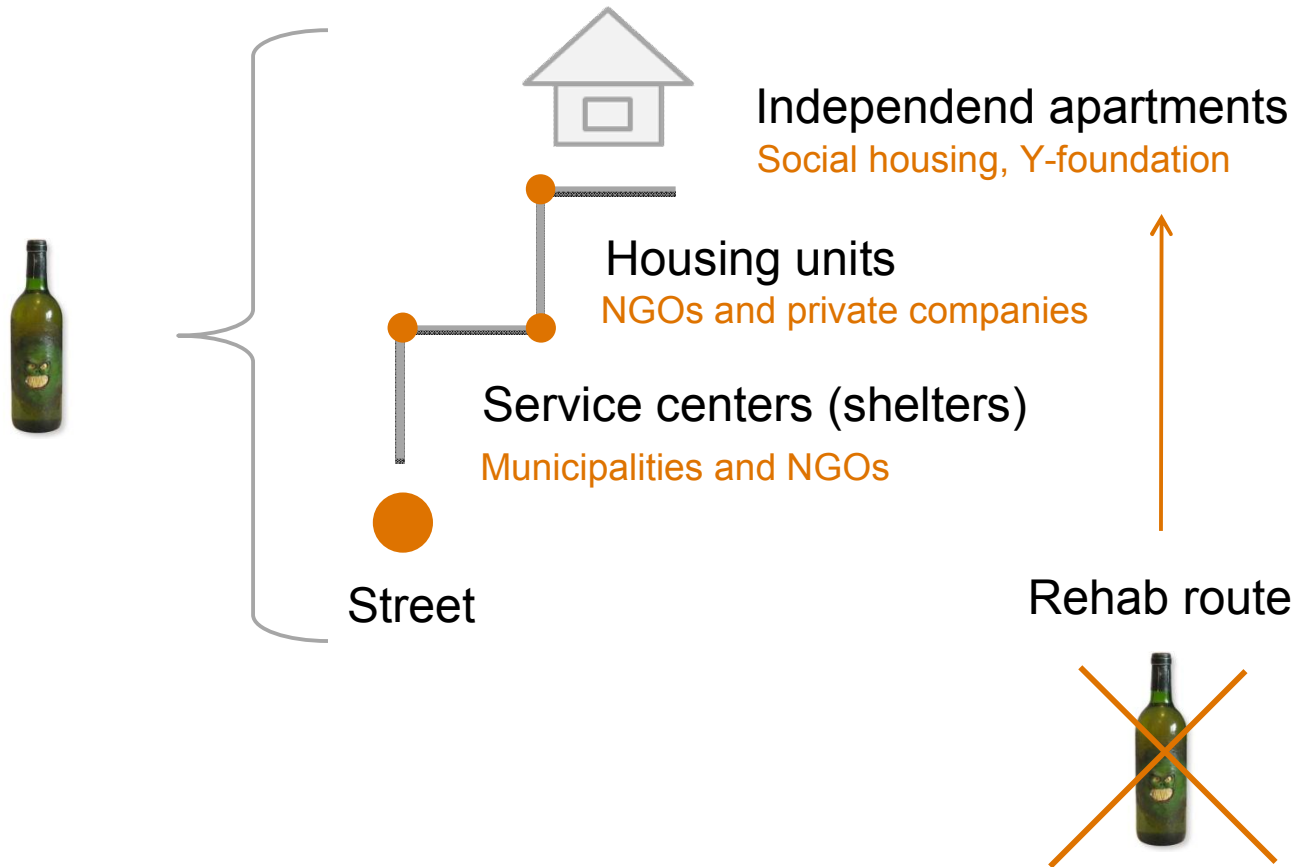
Abolishing shelters nationwide

HF model in Finland (2008-)



Example of Finnish HF single site unit

Single site HF-unit for 29 LTH men, long term rental agreements, single or double rooms with kitchen, 24/7 housing support, harm reduction, maintained by NGOs, funded by the City of Helsinki

Consumer Choice	<u>High</u> : LTH tenants was picked up from the shelters and from the streets by the staff, no evaluation of housing readiness
Separation of Housing and Services	<u>Medium</u> : long term rental agreements, 24/7 on site housing support, no obligations for a change of a life style (harm reduction), on site medical care
Recovery Oriented Services	<u>Yes</u> : support and opportunities are provided as needed and wished by the tenants
Community Integration	<u>Medium</u> : homogenius community, mostly off site services, independent living



Example continues: facts 2007-2011

- 45 residents (44 men + 1 woman) in five years in 28 flats
Housing retention rate 64.4%
- Most of the residents had extremely severe alcohol abuse problem when they moved in, slightly decreased consumption over years
- 7% moved to more independent housing (Y-foundation)
7% moved to unit with more intensive support
1 person was evicted because of constant violence
14% past away
- Average age 56 (end of 2011)
- Rent \$45/m² (average in Helsinki was \$18/m²)

Selected criticism of the HF in Finland

- HF (harm reduction) will eradicate the great efforts put into the development of intoxication treatments
- HF = "bottle first model"
- HF = a form of abandonment
- The Finnish model is not cost effective



Challenges of the implementation of HF in Finland

- Intertwining of services and housing
- Institutionalized services and service providers
 - lack of service providers that are able and willing to work with the most challenging long-term homeless clients
- Self interests of professions and professionals
 - lack of workforce with appropriate values and skills
- Housing resources
 - lack of both, scattered site and single site housing units
