PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The Rosslyn Hotel will preserve 264 small to medium-sized studio apartments. After a gut rehabilitation of the entire building, 79 units will be set aside for formerly homeless tenants, while 184 units will be affordable to individuals earning between 30% and 60% of area median income (AMI). The one remaining unit is reserved for the Hotel's superintendent. The Hotel will include ground floor retail, while the second floor of the building will include new recreation space, as well as property management and social service case management offices. Following the rehabilitation, the building is slated to achieve LEED Silver certification.

SRO Housing Corporation was established in 1984 to acquire, rehabilitate and operate the numerous single-room occupancy hotels located in the Central City East neighborhood known as "Skid Row."
