40th ANNIVERSARY CHAIRMAN REPORT

Wish I were there, but still the prospect of this meeting has brought back many wonderful memories. We were part of the honeymoon for dressage. You know when you first organize, get together and everything is wonderful, love is in the air. Meetings were fun, everyone eager to learn. USDF was born and was eager to hear and listen to everyone. All were welcome and all was wonderful.

We put on schooling shows, we even put on a dressage recital. Nineteen riders participated in doing demonstrations and riding together. Weather was bad that day, the spectators were thin because of the bad weather, but still all went well. Everyone did a great job. We were a family.

Since those days dressage has grown. With growth came pain. Divisions began. Did you know leg yielding was our first major "you will ruin your horse" pedestal people began to stand on? After all, leg yielding will cause riders to lose the horse's shoulders.

Then more "experts" began to climb on the pedestal to tell us we would ruin our horses if we used any kind of "gimmick". Then came over-bending, and heaven forbid, over-flexing. Our horses were doomed to ruin.

Today I hear that "rollkur" will cause such pain in the horse that his neck is in danger of falling off. Never mind that many Saddlebreds, Andalusian, the new favorite Frisians, and the ever loved Arabian frequently use "rollkur" as an evasion to working for a living. I never have seen any of them lose their necks or even appear to be in any kind of pain.

These purists of dressage frequently are people that are under the illusion dressage is the magic that happens when you do everything RIGHT. Sadly that is the biggest lie and handicap dressage enthusiast face.

I have pictures of us when we were young, ignorant and happy. NO ONE was perfect, yet all were giving their horses the GREATEST GIFT any of us can give our horses.....training. A well trained horse will have a good home for the rest of his life...everyone wants a well-trained horse.

There is a universal cry among dressage experts today, yesterday and tomorrow: to make progress with our horses, we have to go back to basics. As a Club, if we want to make progress, we must go back to our roots. Forgive each other, work together, put on schooling shows and put the fun back into the word dressage.

My biggest joy in Dressage has been helping dozens of riders win their Bronze, a dozen Silver and a few Gold Medals.

TREASURER: No report.

MEMBERSHIP: Nancy reported for Anne Scrivner. There are now 88 members with Kathleen Burda of Rochester as a new member for 2013. Welcome!

NEWSLETTER & FACEBOOK: No report.

WEBSITE: No activity to report.

SCHOLARSHIP: No activity to report.

AWARDS: No report.

SYMPOSIUM: Cindy Ishoy will be teaching at StarWest, November 16-18. An Education Days dinner for all members is being planned for Friday night, November 16. Ishoy will present a short lecture. It will be held at the home of John and Nancy Simpson, 1200 Interlaken, Springfield, IL. Simpsons will provide the main dish.

YOUTH: No report.

CLASSIC: Nancy reported a profit of \$3288.12 from the 2012 Classic I & II for Mgr. John Simpson.

BANQUET UPDATE: Members are reminded to bring items for CLD's GMO basket for the National Convention in New Orleans, December 5-8. These items should have a horsey or Illinois connection. Paula is following up with Illini Country Club on final details. She reported 55 reservations to date. ADDENDUM

Following this meeting, there was online discussion and a motion made to donate \$400.00 to CIRT. The motion was made by Marilyn Weber, seconded by Judy Nordstrom, and passed with 7 Aye votes on November 6.

NEW USEF RULE ON AMATEUR STATUS TO GO IN EFFECT AS OF 12/1/2012

GR1306 Professional/Amateur Status. [Chapter 13. Competition Participants and Associated Individuals] 436-11effective 12/1/12:

1. Amateur. Regardless of one's equestrian skills and/or accomplishments, a person is an amateur if after his 18th birthday, as defined in GR101, he has not engaged in any of the activities identified in paragraph 4 below.

a. In the Dressage Division, individuals are only eligible to compete as amateurs from the beginning of the calendar year in which they reach age 22, See DR119.3.

b. In the Reining Division, amateur status is determined per Reining Division Non Pro Conditions (RN 105).

c. For Amateurs in Jumper Sections, see JP117.

d. For Amateurs in Hunter sections, see HU107.

e. For Amateurs in Eventing, see EV Appendix 3- Participation in Horse Trials.

2. Remuneration. Remuneration is defined as compensation or payment in any form such as cash, goods, sponsorships, discounts or services; reimbursement of any expenses; trade or in-kind exchange of goods or services such as board or training.

3. Permitted activities by Amateur. An amateur is permitted to do the following:

a. Accept reimbursement for actual expenses associated with conducting classroom seminars for a not-for-profit organization, therapeutic riding programs, or programs for charitable organizations approved in advance by the Federation.

b. Act as a camp counselor when not hired in the exclusive capacity as a riding instructor; assist in setting schooling fences without remuneration; give instruction or training to handicapped riders for therapeutic purposes.

c. Appear in advertisements and/or articles related to acknowledgement of one's own personal or business sponsorship of a competition and/or awards earned by one's owned horses.

d. Accept prize money as the owner of a horse in any class other than equitation or showmanship classes.

e. Accept prize money in Dressage.

f. Accept a non-monetary token gift of appreciation valued less than \$300 annually.

g. Serve as an intern for college credit or course requirements at an accredited institution provided one has never held professional status with the Federation

or any other equestrian National Federation. In addition, one may accept reimbursement for expenses without profit, as prescribed by the educational institution's program, for the internship. At the request of the Federation, an amateur shall provide certification from the accredited educational institution under whose auspices a student is pursuing an internship that he is undertaking the internship to meet course or degree requirements.

h. Write books or articles related to horses.

i. Accept remuneration for providing service in one's capacity as a: presenter or panelist at a Federation licensed officials' clinic, competition manager, competition secretary, judge, steward, technical delegate, course designer, announcer, TV commentator, veterinarian, groom, farrier, tack shop operator, breeder, or boarder.

j. Accept reimbursement for any bona fide expenses directly related to the horse (i.e. farrier/vet bills, entries). Travel, hotel, equipment, and room and board are not considered bona fide expenses.

k. Entries for non-under saddle classes in amateur sections at hunter, jumper or hunter/jumper competitions, must be paid either (i) directly to the competition by the amateur or the amateur's family or (ii) by someone whom the amateur or the amateur's family reimburses within 90 days of the last day of the competition for which the entries were paid.

l. Accept educational, competition, or training grant(s).

4. Professional based on one's own activities. Unless expressly permitted above, a person is a professional if after his 18th birthday he does any of the following:

a. Accepts remuneration AND rides, exercises, drives, shows, trains, assists in training, schools, or conducts clinics or seminars.

b. Accepts remuneration AND gives riding or driving lessons, showmanship lessons, equitation lessons, trains horses, or provides consultation services in riding, driving, showmanship, equitation, or training of horses consults in horsemanship related activities.

c. Accepts remuneration AND acts as an employee in a position such as a groom, farrier, bookkeeper, veterinarian or barn manager AND instructs, rides, drives, shows, trains or schools horses that are owned, boarded or trained by his employer, any member of his employer's family, or a business in which his employer has an ownership interest.

d. Accepts remuneration AND uses his name,

photograph or other form of personal association as a horseperson in connection with any advertisement or product/service for sale, including but not limited to apparel, equipment, or property.

e. Accepts prize money unless permitted in paragraph 3d or 3e above.

f. Rides, drives or shows any horse that a cohabitant or family member or a cohabitant or family member's business receives remuneration for boarding, training, riding, driving or showing. A cohabitant or family member of a trainer may not absolve themselves of this rule by entering into a lease or any other agreement for a horse owned by a client of the trainer.

g. Gives instruction to any person or rides, drives, or shows any horse, for which activity his cohabitant or another person in his family or business in which his cohabitant or a member of his family controls will receive remuneration for the activity. A cohabitant or family member of a trainer may not absolve themselves of this rule by entering into a lease or any other agreement for a horse owned by a client of the trainer.

h. Accepts remuneration AND acts as an agent in the sale of a horse or pony or accepts a horse or pony on consignment for the purpose of sale or training that is not owned by him, his cohabitant, or a member of his family, a farm/ranch/syndicate/partnership/corporation/business in which he, his cohabitant, or a member of his family controls.

i. Advertises one's equestrian services such as training or instruction.

j. Accepts remuneration AND acts as an intern, apprentice, or working student whose responsibilities include, but are not limited to, riding, driving, showmanship, handling, showing, training or assisting in training, giving lessons/coaching and/or schooling horses other than horses actually owned by him.

k. Accepts remuneration in excess of rental fee for use of a facility, ring or school horses.

l. Accepts remuneration for such use AND uses commercial logoed items while on competition grounds unless expressly permitted by applicable division rules.

5. Professional based on one's own activity along with another's. A person is also deemed a professional if after his 18th birthday, he accepts remuneration for his spouse, family member, or cohabitant engaged in any activity enumerated in 4 a-l above. For the purposes of this rule, the term cohabitant is defined as any individuals living

together in a relationship, as would a married couple, but not legally married.

6. Violations of Amateur status. After an investigation as to proper status has been initiated, and upon request by the Federation and to the satisfaction of the Federation, an Amateur shall submit verifiable proof

of Amateur status, including but not limited to a bill of sale for any horse(s) the Amateur is competing in classes restricted to Amateur Owners. If the Federation deems such proof insufficient, then the Federation

may initiate proceedings under Chapter 6.

a. Any individual found to have knowingly assisted in the violation of the Amateur rule may also be subject to proceedings in accordance with Chapter 6. See GR1307 and GR1308.

CLD AVAILABLE SCHOLARSHIPS

Cheryl Finke Memorial Fund for Developing Riders

The scholarship is intended to allow members the possibility to take advantage of extraordinary opportunities to advance their dressage careers. Applicants must be riding at Fourth Level and above. Consideration is given to service to CLD, dressage accomplishments, and potential significance of the activity for which support is requested. Scholarship winners agree to provide an article for The Reader describing their experience. They are also required to provide service such as judging a schooling show or instructing a clinic for the club within two years of the funded activity.

Scholarship to Fund Member Participation in CLD-Sponsored Clinics

The scholarship will provide amateur owners and juniors or young riders the opportunity to take part in CLD clinics. It is particularly meant to allow those who could only afford one day of a clinic to participate in all days of a two or three day clinic. This allows the degree of improvement and knowledge afforded by working on consecutive days with a clinician. Recipients will be required to do all days of the clinic for which they have applied, to be members of at least two years' standing, to be working with a coach or instructor, and to have goals that such a clinic should advance. A rider may use the scholarship once in any three year period. Winners are to report on what was gained from the experience within three months of the end of the clinic. This will be published in The Reader.

ISHOY CLINIC BY LESLIE BURKET

CLD, as part of their Education program, hosted a potluck dinner on Friday night, to allow riders and auditors to spend some 'away from the arena' time, with Cindy Ishoy. A native of Canada, Cindy has competed in the 1972, 1988, 1992 and 2004 Olympics, bringing home a Bronze Medal from the Seoul Olympics in 1988. Cindy was named the 2010 Dressage Canada Owner of the Year. She is the co-owner of Proton, who represented Canada at the 2010 World Equestrian Games with Cindy's student, Victoria Winter, riding.

After a delicious dinner, we all gathered around Cindy for some great words of wisdom. She had a simple question for us – 'what is dressage'? We pondered and pondered . . . and did, finally, come up with the correct answer – training! And many benefited from that training.

If you were fortunate enough to ride with Cindy, and/or audit the clinic, you would have learned that Cindy has a very systematic training approach, using a variety of exercises that follow the training pyramid. The value of this approach is consistent training that is based on the basics and the ten meter circle. Exercise after exercise, ride after ride, Cindy demonstrated how simple and uncomplicated the exercises are but how instrumental they are in identifying and resolving issues. As Cindy emphasized – only perfect practice makes perfect riding.

The resolution to a variety of problems, for many riders, was stabilizing and effectively using the outside rein. Each had a different situation, ranging from ineffectively turning a pirouette to 'what does it mean to use the inside leg to get the horse into the outside rein and how do I do it' to falling in and out on the circle. Is this a rider problem or a horse problem? It could be either – or both! Cindy showed us that if the rider is positioned correctly, the horse will follow, and we were able to see that in action. Other times it was the horse that received the benefit of the exercises. As the rides continued, the change in both horse and rider was easily visible, enhancing the harmony between horse and rider, allowing both to perform their best work.

Much appreciate the riders that shared some of their clinic experiences and comments as testimony to the 'training' experience:

That's the best my horse has EVER gone!

Basics and suppling exercises that prevail throughout the dressage experience

What do you mean – give aids with clarity?

I will definitely ride with her again – hope she returns!

Direct, clear, demanding and very successful!
