LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

The purposes of CenterLine Dressage: "to promote interest in and further the knowledge of dressage; to conduct dressage events and activities; to provide educational forums" from the Bylaws of CenterLine Dressage, adopted August 1983.

As of April 16, we have 80 members. We grew ten members since my last letter, some as a result of the discount for showing at the CLD IceBreaker Schooling Show on April 16. Thank you to Sue and Amanda Graham for co-managing our spring schooling show. They were ably assisted by Amira Anthony, Ryan Ballinger, Brett Fisher, Kim Jones, Julie Nichols and Judy Nordstrom.

I think it is safe to call the weather for IceBreaker simply miserable. It was cold and wet and windy. Of the 47 rides scheduled, 37 actually were performed. All the rides went indoors. Jayme Geisler was the high scoring youth and highest Training Level score with a

74.167% at Training 1. The show made a profit of \$291.83.

We still need an assistant Volunteer Co-ordinator to work with Volunteer Co-ordinator Deb Porter. Family responsibilities make it impossible for Deb to assemble volunteers with the last CLD schooling show of the year, FireCracker on July 2. The Col. Christian Carde Symposium, April 29-May 1, was again a great success on many levels. Forty

different people audited, rode, ate or helped with the Symposium. The meal and lecture once each day was just as popular this year as last. The Colonel has a wealth of AV material to share as well as years of knowledge working at the highest level. Thanks to Leslie Burket for helping prepare the lounge, meals and for assisting to collect fees. A couple of fees are still arriving before final figures are available, but the Symposium made a profit. Another \$115 worth of CLD apparel was sold over the weekend. COL. CHRISTIAN CARDE SYMPOSIUM RECAP



On April 29,30, and May 1, CLD sponsored a Symposium with Colonel Christian Carde, former *écuyer en chef* of Saumur (l'Ecole nationale française, the French National School). He has been a member of the French Olympic Team as well as coach and chef d'équipe at different times. The three-day symposium included lectures, lunches, a banquet, and eight private lessons daily. The Colonel taught the rider-participants and shared insights with and answered questions from the auditors.

At the Friday's luncheon, the Colonel showed his audience a set of images of various horses at different levels of training dating from his time as *écuyer en chef* at Saumur. He pointed out the differences in balance and collection brought about by progressive training.

Saturday evening, at the banquet, he delivered a thought-provoking overview of the history of the Federation Equestre Internationale, the FEI. He described the development of FEI rules and changes in interpretation of those rules that have developed in recent times. The changes have, in fact, negated some of the most basic tenets of classical dressage the rules were intended to codify.

He cited examples of various rules and described how modern judging has ignored them (ie. little or no forward movement at piaffe). Some rules have been changed to fit current habits that contravened them. He also mentioned that recent changes in the persons governing the FEI seem to have contributed to this change and loss of the original principals of the FEI. The Colonel fears that these recent trends could lead to the total loss of the classical principles of dressage. The huge economic impact of the modern dressage industry make adherence to the original principals of the FEI an expensive proposition.

The Colonel pronounced himself rather pessimistic about the chances for survival of classical dressage. He found, however, rays of hope in such groups as our club and other groups he teaches around the world. When President Alice Martin asked if there was anything we could do to help the situation, he suggested membership in Allège Ideal, an international organization dedicated to lightness in dressage and equitation (allege-ideal.com). The more members groups such as Allege Ideal have, the more weight a letter from the organization has at the FEI.

At lunch on Sunday, the Colonel showed slides of his horse Junker, ridden by one of his students, and commented on aspects of the training. All of these talks were very well received by the audience, and the banquet audience showed special warmth for the Colonel as he completed his presentation.

In his teaching of the riders, the Colonel outlined the principles of classical training and the route to achieve them. Throughout the lessons he always stressed the importance of 1) lightness and elasticity of the contact with the horse's mouth; 2) the need for the horse to be active, not fast, in his strides; and

ILLINOIS HORSE TRAILERING LAWS

In Illinois, a person hauling a horse trailer with their own and with customers' horses, will most likely be subject to both Illinois and Federal regulations concerning a Commercial Driver's License. If you haul only your own horse(s), you may still need a CDL, depending on the weight of your truck and trailer

Section 1030.30 Classification Standards

Driver's License Classification System
 All drivers' licenses issued by the Office of the Secretary of State after April 1, 1990, shall be classified as to the kind and type of vehicles the holder is licensed to drive, as follows:

- a) Class A: Any combination of vehicles with a Gross Combination Weight Rating (GCWR) of 26,001 pounds or more, provided the Gross Vehicle Weight Rating (GVWR) of the vehicles being towed is in excess of 10,000 pounds. Holders of a Class A license may, with the appropriate or required endorsements, operate all vehicles within Class A, B, C and D, but are not authorized to operate motorcycles or motor-driven cycles.
- b) Class B: Any single vehicle with a GVWR of 26,001 or more pounds, or any such vehicle

towing a vehicle not in excess of 10,000 pounds GVWR. Holders of a Class B license may, with appropriate or required endorsements, operate all vehicles within Class B, C and D, but are not authorized to operate motorcycles or motor-driven cycles.

c) Class C:

1) Any Vehicle:

A) with a GVWR of 16,001 or more pounds, but less than 26,001 pounds, or any such vehicle towing a vehicle not in excess of 10,000 pounds GVWR; or

B) less than 26,001 pounds GVWR designed to transport 16 or more people including the driver or used in the transportation of hazardous materials that requires the vehicle to be placarded; or

C) less than 26,001 pounds GVWR designed to transport 16 or more people including the driver or used in the transportation of hazardous materials that requires the vehicle to be placarded, towing a vehicle with a GVWR of 10,000 pounds or less or with a GCWR of less than 26,001 pounds.

2) Holders of a Class C license may operate all vehicles within Class C and D, but are not authorized to operate motorcycles or motor-driven cycles. A Class C license is not required to operate rental vehicles when transporting an individual's own personal property or that of an immediate family member for non-business purposes within this State, if the individual has successfully completed a safety course regarding safe operation of the vehicle.

NEW USEF RULES

UNITED STATES EQUESTRIAN FEDERATION, INC. Rule Changes Part II

(7) If the Freestyle test is longer or shorter than the stipulated time on the test sheet, .5% will be deducted from the total artistic score.

7. Judging a test.

b. Accuracy (moderate) should be a factor only if the inaccuracy avoids the difficulty of the movement, i.e., a larger circle avoids the difficulty of a 10 meter circle. In a movement which must be carried out at a certain point of the arena it should be done at the moment when the competitor's body is above this point, except in transitions where the horse approaches the letter from a line diagonal or perpendicular to the point where the letter is positioned. In this case, the transition must be done when the horse's nose reaches the track at the letter so that the horse is straight in the transition. This includes the execution of flying changes.

f. In the case of a fall of horse and/or rider the competitor will not be eliminated. He will be penalized by the effect of the fall on the execution of the movement being performed and also in the Collective Marks.

g. If the horse leaves the arena with or without the rider (all four feet outside the fence or line marking the arena perimeter) between the time of entry and the time of exit at A beginning and end of the test, the competitor is eliminated.

k. After the sound of the bell, the competitor should enter the arena at A as soon as possible. Exceeding 45 seconds before entering the arena after the bell has sounded will entail elimination. In the Freestyle, the rider has 45 seconds to signal to start the music; however, exceeding 65 seconds before entering the arena after the bell has sounded will entail elimination. Exception: For USEF High Performance qualifying and selection trials, and observation classes, entering the arena over exceeding 45 seconds but within 90 seconds before entering the arena after the bell has sounded will be penalized for an error as specified under DR122.5. Exceeding 90 seconds will entail elimination. Extreme lateness may be penalized by elimination except where a valid reason is accepted by the Judge at "C" (losing a shoe, etc). No competitor can be required to ride prior to his scheduled time except as required in GR830.

l. Any resistance which prevents the continuation of the test longer than 20 seconds is punished by elimination. However, resistance that may endanger the rider, horse, judges or the public will result in elimination for safety reasons earlier than within twenty (20) seconds.

8. The scale of marks is as follows:

10 Excellent 7 Fairly Good 4 Insufficient 1 Very Bad

9 Very Good 6 Satisfactory 3 Fairly Bad 0 Not executed

8 Good 5 Marginal 2 Bad

"Not executed" means that practically nothing of the required movement has been performed.

In FEI Level Freestyle tests, half marks may be used for the artistic marks.

9. Collective marks are awarded (from 0 to 10) after the competitor has finished his performance for:

d. The rider's position and seat; correctness and effect of the aids. The collective marks as well as certain difficult and/or infrequently repeated movements can be given a co-efficient which is fixed by the USDF, the Federation (USEF) Dressage Committee or the Bureau of

the FEI for their respective tests.

DR122 Execution and Judging of Tests. [Chapter DR. Dressage Division] 020-11, effective 12/1/11:

8. The scale of marks is as follows:

10 Excellent 7 Fairly Good 4 Insufficient 1 Very Bad
9 Very Good 6 Satisfactory 3 Fairly Bad 0 Not executed

8 Good 5 Marginal 2 Bad

All half marks from 0.5-9.5 may also be used both for movements and collective marks, at the discretion of the judge.

DR126 Requirements for Dressage Competition Management. [Chapter DR. Dressage Division] 022-11, effective immediately:

1. The following requirements apply to all Levels 1-5 of Dressage Competitions, except where noted. Specific requirements for specific levels of competitions are listed under .2, below.

f. Arena Specifications.

(1) The arena should be on as flat and as level ground as possible. It is recommended that the difference in elevation across the diagonal or along the length of the arena shall not exceed 0.50 0.60 meters. It is recommended that the difference in elevation along the short side of the arena shall not exceed 0.20 meters.

(3) The enclosure itself must consist of a low fence about 0.3 meters high and must be completely enclosed, except for the entrance at "A". The width of the entrance must be at least two meters.

(7) No publicity is permitted anywhere on the arena fence. It is permissible to decorate the letters with flowers or greenery to enhance the appearance of the arena, however, letters must be visible from all sides at Level 3-5 competitions.

(12) If marked, the center line, throughout its length should be as clearly marked as possible, without being of a nature to frighten the horses.

DR128 Musical Frees Style Ride. [Chapter DR. Dressage Division] 023-11, effective immediately:

4. Riders are not required to submit a written copy of the ride. Furthermore, since the ride is judged as a whole no errors can accrue.

MINUTES FROM THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

President Alice Martin called the meeting to order at 5:05 p.m.

Members present:

Alice Martin, Traci Morenz, Kathi Cannon, Deb Porter, Kate Fleming-Kuhn, Martin Kuhn, Janet Fitch, Paula Briney, Marilyn Weber and Nancy Simpson. Leslie Burket and Marie Meadows joined via telephone.

Before the reports of officers began, Leslie confirmed that she would send out the flyer on the Col. Carde clinic again. Alice reported that all riding slots in the clinic are filled but we have room for auditors.

Treasurer: Marie Meadows reported that she received checks totaling \$634.00 from IceBreaker entries. She does not yet know the total payment to Holy Land Diner for the food. Two new memberships were received at the show. The checkbook balance is \$8028.63. She reported the total balance in three CDs/money market accounts is \$25,024.20. Income from clothing sold at IceBreaker exceeded \$230.00. There is some confusion over number of children covered by a Family Membership; that topic was discussed later in the meeting.

Membership: Alice reported for Anne Scrivner. We discussed how USDF counts children when part of a family membership; how CLD would have to pay USDF for children, how many children are covered by CLD's family category, etc. Junior members do count towards our GMO count. It was decided that Alice would contact USDF for clarification. Our membership count is now 79.

Newsletter: Kathi Cannon has taken on editorial duties for the newsletter. There was discussion of number of printed newsletters which need to be mailed. Kathi was not sure what that number is currently but thought that Pinky would know.

Webmaster: Martin reported that two email addresses bounced back to him from the March 31 email, and one bounced from the April 15 email.

Awards: Marilyn Weber commented that confusion remains among members regarding trading in plates for other pieces in the china series. We are still interested in considering other items as awards, such as halters, blankets, coolers, saddle pads, etc. Cost and time to order are the two main concerns.

Currently we do not have Highest Score awards at each level. If we adopt them, we will need a written policy which includes how ties are to be broken.

Scholarship: Janet Fitch reported that she would take action once her computer is fixed. She asked if additional events for youth are scheduled. There is a clinic planned for the day after FireCracker.

She commented that no adults have applied for education scholarship funds. She reminded us that the funds are for anyone above High School level.

Symposium: Kate reported that Col. Carde will be here April 29, 30, May 1. No one has been retained for Fall 2011 Education Day; the previous clinician has cancelled. Paula has reserved Illini Country Club for the banquet, which will be held Nov. 12.

Show-Prep Clinic: Marilyn and Paula reported that attendees seemed to enjoy the program. About 10 people participated.

Paula Briney mentioned that State of Illinois officials will be more actively enforcing drivers' licenses restrictions for those drivers pulling trailers. Nancy Simpson will try to find the regulation to send to Kathi Cannon for the newsletter.
