You continue to amaze me with all of the work that you do to help your communities by serving the hungry and clothing the needy. You provide screening of eyes, hearing, diabetes and blood pressure. You also do your part in protecting our environment by planting of new trees and collecting and recycling newspapers, aluminum cans and plastic bottles. You show the willingness to care for the youth in your communities by providing vision screening, flags for first graders, Lions Quest, scholarships for high school graduates and starting Leo clubs.

All that I have listed above fulfill the requirement for LCI's Centennial Service Challenge (CSC). Of all the Lions clubs in this District only 22 clubs are receiving an LCI Centennial Service Award for the year 2015-2016. Hi Lions....It's been a pleasure for Doug and I to attend District Conferences and Conventions. There have been some great speakers and I learned new Lions information; did I hear you say I am too old to learn? Now that is not true - you are never too old to learn new facts about Lionism or anything else that is "important to you". For example, I learned from ID Quinn from Alaska that LCI is ramping up their Lions Marketing Campaign. They are devoting \$5.8 million to make the Lions name become so recognizable that people will be coming to our clubs and asking if they can be part of our great organization. Wouldn't that be something to have our clubs overwhelmed with new members?

ID Quinn also said because of digital technology the demand for Lions to assist people with their sight needs will increase. Scientific American reported that 70% of our kids today are going to need help because they don't get outside much, thus their eyes don't get a break from close-up work and they are not getting the Vitamin D that is healthy for their eyes. Kids spend a lot of time using pcs, smart phones, iPads, etc. which may lead to near sightedness.

I did some online research and according to The Vision Council, "Because this is a new phenomenon, not much is known about the long-term impact of computers or other digital gadgets on pediatric eyes. However, eye care providers have reported seeing an increase in cases of myopia, or nearsightedness." According to the National Eye Institute, more than 34 million Americans suffer with myopia or near sightedness, a number that is projected to rise to nearly 40 million by 2030. In the US, 42 percent of those aged 12 to 54 are now myopic, triple the rate of only 30 years ago. Computers and smartphones are often tied to every facet of a young person's life—from school to socializing, there is little respite from the constant use of technology. Digital devices are here to stay, yet it is still unknown how all the exposure will impact eyes in the long term." www.thevisioncouncil.org/sites/default/files/ VC DigitalEyeStrain Report2015.pdf

Elgin Lions Hear Report on Grand Ronde Watershed

Alex Borgerding and Jessica Phelps were guests at the Elgin Lions Club meeting, outlining the restoration of habitat in the Grand Ronde areas. Borgerding said there are hundreds of restoration projects, many of which involve partnerships between the government and individual land owners. She cited a project at the 6 Ranch in Wallowa County, where the national water flow for habitation

and grazing management within the Riparian Zone were improved. Borgerding listed an example of the Confederated tribes and Union County Conservation team improving 2.3 miles on Southern Cross land located on Catherine Creek. "We are looking for new and effective ways to improve the streams," she noted.

Phelps stated that the fur trade and harvest of salmon had an effect on streams and rivers. Much of the damage included the harvest of beavers, effecting flood conditions in some areas. "We are looking at management and restoration by planting beaver away from human infrastructure. Through management and relocation we can minimize their impact and help the

flood plain." Phelps said that research with the beaver helps control the cost of restoring habitat.

The diabetes article for the March issue of *The Oregon Lion* was submitted by DG Judith Poage, the Diabetes Awareness Chair for District G, whose family tree, unfortunately, has quite a history of diabetes. Thank you, DG Judith, for stepping up to the plate. I would like to hear from more of you out there who are battling this insidious disease. You could be an inspiration to others and that would be a good thing.

Diabetes Awareness and Our Children By: DG Judith Poage

I became aware of diabetes at an early age. My grandfather lost both legs below the knees due to complications with diabetes and an aunt taught herself to read by braille when she started losing her eyesight. Type 1 exists on both sides of my family.

Some folks have genetic markers; however, there are non-genetic factors that we all should consider to reduce our risk of diabetes including: lowering your intake of sugar, regular exercise and good nutrition.

Reducing your intake of sugar is fairly easy by watching desserts and snacks. We know sodas have sugar; however, sports drinks do also. Water is best. Counting calories, carbs, and grams is difficult – consider portion size. A deck of cards is considered a healthy portion size for meat, fish and chicken. A tennis ball is considered a healthy portion size for spaghetti, macaroni and noodles.

Health professionals recommend that you exercise at least four days a week and raise your heart rate for 30 minutes. You can lift weights, take yoga or zumba classes, ride a bike, or walk your dog at a brisk pace. Just do it.

Diabetes has appeared earlier in successive generations. Susceptible individuals developing diabetes now include 1-5 year olds. At the same time, the genetic predisposition has not increased. The increase in childhood diabetes is partly due to bad nutrition and a lack of physical activity which means that childhood diabetes can be reduced by good nutrition and increased activity.

Lions of Oregon support the Gales Creek Camp for children with diabetes. Eric Hanson of Gales Creek shared the following: in 2013, 451 children with diabetes attended camp sessions. A week session at Gales Creek costs the family \$375 per camper. The actual cost is three times that and Lions donations account for the difference. Gales Creek Camp was able to extend the dormitory space by 20% last year and no longer had a waiting list. Campers at Gales Creek make friends with peers who have diabetes, take part in physical activities just like any camp, learn about nutrition and are coached by counselors who also have diabetes.

Lions and their support of Gales Creek Camp are making a difference in our fight against childhood diabetes.

Florence-Siuslaw Lions Reach Out to Community and Schools

In Florence, the third Saturday of July is Power of Florence day – a day dedicated to volunteering, giving back, and making a difference in the community. Organizations and citizens join together to have fun and work together to make Florence an even better place

to live by pledging a day of service. The Power of Florence motto is "Each ONE, ONE day, Making a Difference, Together."

This community-wide volunteer project was the brain child of 14-year-old Kaylee Graham, a Siuslaw Middle School student. She was named one of America's top youth volunteers of 2014 by the Prudential Spirit of Community Awards. She was selected from a field of more than 30,000 youth volunteers from across the country.

Participants are encouraged to donate food to Florence Food Share or Humane Society, donate clothes or household goods to the needy, or raise money through a fundraiser like a garage sale, car wash or fun run and donate the funds to a local nonprofit. Some groups donate labor by weeding parks or doing yard work at homes of seniors or disabled persons.

At the sixth Power of Florence last year, the Florence-Siuslaw Lions Club participated by bringing the Mobile Health Screening Program (MHSP) to Florence. The screening stations were set up in the lobby of City Lights Cinema. Forty individuals were screened for glaucoma, vision, blood pressure, and blood glucose in four hours, which resulted in each individual going through all four stations every six minutes. Literature was also made available on various subjects such as diabetes as were applications for eyeglasses and hearing aids.

Once school started, the Florence Lions turned their attention to school screenings. A total of 822 students from kindergarten to 7th grade were screened, with a total of 63 referrals (an 8% referral rate).

The next project for the Florence Lions will be Flags for First Graders in February. Many adult community members have informed the Club that they still have the flags they received when they were in first grade and are looking forward to their children sharing that experience.

As the weather gets better, the Club will be directing its efforts to the Rhododendron Festival in May, a bass tournament in June, and the Wings and Wheels Fly-In and Car Show in July. It's a small (11 members) but active Club!

March: In Like a Lion

Like many of you, my involvement in Lions Clubs began many years before now. At the time I began I had my reasons, not the least of which was wanting to be involved in volunteering and service. When I joined, I made a commitment, a pledge, to align myself with others who are also "...dedicated to the service of others."

The ways we engage in service to others has changed many times. People change, passions change, but what has remained constant is the motto of "We Serve."

OUR Oregon Lions Sight & Hearing Foundation is approaching 60 years of service. Since 1959, our foundation's mission has changed and expanded from focusing on vision and hearing patient care to our current mission of "to screen, treat, save, and restore sight and hearing in partnership with Lions Clubs."

The program focus has changed as well. As the foundation grew, its service shifted from the deep personal impact for the individuals helped through surgeries to searching wider through screening efforts to identify those in need of sight and hearing assistance. Oregon Lions went from serving a few people each year to serving over 200,000 children, adults, and seniors.

About 90% of those served are elementary or middle school aged students receiving an objective vision screening through our Mobile Health Screening Program.

If you've been reading this magazine, OLSHF's website or Facebook page, or if you have volunteered your time, you know how important it is to catch vision and hearing issues as early as possible so any needed medical or educational intervention can happen. Children who can see, can better learn in their classrooms and in life. They are better prepared to participate and to engage their communities.

Like most nonprofits, OLSHF relies on donations and grants. Larger funders provide needed resources to purchase equipment and tools for the programs while our generous recurring and individual donors help keep the staff and programs running. Without this support, without your donation, without Lions, our state would look very different. How so?

For one thing, over 100,000 children would not have been referred for a comprehensive vision exam with an eye care provider. Lions and OLSHF have worked with thousands of families over the years to coordinate exams and eyeglasses for needy youngsters. The World Health Organization states the prevalence of amblyopia (a vision condition that may cause blindness) could be as high as 5%. We can reasonably estimate about 5,000 students have been referred for conditions as serious as amblyopia. Lions prevent blindness.

In just the last 10 years, over 60,000 adults and seniors have called our Lions In Service Referral Hotline. People call every single day, most asking for help with an exam and a pair of eyeglasses. Thanks to our newest and fastest growing program, the Lions Eyeglass Assistance Program (LEAP), OLSHF helps support Lions Sight & Hearing Chairs as they coordinate client exams. 56 Lions Clubs work directly with the LEAP Optical Lab, saving thousands of dollars on charitable eyeglasses.

Beginning next month, LEAP expands yet again, bringing our Eye Promise Optical shop to life. A full service optical retail store will be open to EVERYONE next month. If you or a loved one is in need of new eyeglasses or even sunglasses, Eye Promise Optical can meet your needs. And you can trust that every penny spent through Eye Promise Optical will go back into the LEAP effort to help Lions Clubs serve their communities with needed eye wear.

Your OLSHF, your Lions Clubs, are more relevant than ever. Thank you for all that you do on behalf of Oregon Lions and those they serve!

SB 187 - Fund Vision Screenings for Oregon Students!

Why Some Oregon Students are Failing

• **25% of all children have an undiagnosed vision problem** significant enough to affect their performance in school (Children's Vision Care in the 21st Century and Its Impact on Education – academic study).

Senate Bill 187 Addresses an Unfunded Mandate

- SB 187 is a follow up to House Bill 3000 passed in 2013, requiring all Oregon students to provide proof of a vision screening or eye exam prior to starting school.
- HB 3000 sparked a public-private partnership, with schools providing logistical support and the State
 partnering with private non-profit entities to provide necessary equipment, staff, training and resources
 such as funding.
- The Oregon Lions Sight & Hearing Foundation (OLSHF) has held up their end, now screening 180,000
 Oregon students with objective, fast vision screening in a school setting, an increase of 720% since 2013.
- SB 187 will allocate funds to reimburse schools for the costs of vision screenings and would provide sufficient support to expand programs to cover every school district and every student in Oregon.

Who May Enter: Any Lions Club or individual or organization or business.

Deadline for Applications: Saturday, May 6, 2017

<u>Lions Report:</u> to the Parade Registration table in the lobby lot of the Pendleton Convention Center located at 1601 Westgate during Convention hours Friday, May 19th to get your parade number and assembly point directions. You may position vehicles in your assigned assembly point at the Chamber of Commerce parking lots Saturday morning before the convention. **You must be lined up in your assigned space by 9:30 AM on Saturday.** The parade begins at 10:00 AM sharp! You will need to arrange for your own transportation to the parade and back to the Convention Center.

<u>Non-Lions Entrants Report:</u> to the Parade Registration Desk at the Pendleton Chamber of Commerce at 501 South Main Street, Pendleton, OR 97801 by 9:00 am on May 20th to get your parade number and assembly point directions.

Parade Rules:

- 1. Parade numbers must be visible *on both sides* of the entry nearest the front.
- 2. Entries should be attended at all times.
- 3. PLEASE, NO CANDY THROWING! DUE TO THE SAFETY ISSUES INVOLVING THE THROWING OF CANDY AND OTHER ITEMS, NO ENTRY WILL BE ALLOWED TO THROW ANY ITEMS TO THE SPECTATORS. THIS INCLUDES BUT IS NOT LIMITED TO, CANDY. GROUPS MAY PROVIDE PEOPLE TO WALK ALONG THE PARADE ROUTE AND PASS OUT ITEMS TO THE CROWD
- Motorized Entries revving engines or squealing tires on the pavement will be removed from the parade immediately, for safety reasons.
