Overview

You are going to give a 3-5 minute presentation using Microsoft PowerPoint to tell about a problem and a possible solution for this problem.

Topic

You will choose a topic that we have discussed in class. Then, you will present a suggestion on how to fix the problem.

Be sure to include:

- Introduction
- The problem
- 2 possible solutions for the problem
- Conclusion/sources

Research/Sources

You may need to research your topic, but your Lecture Ready 2 textbook will be the best place to start. Your instructor will give you suggested websites or articles to learn more about the problem. If you use information from a website or article, it is very important that you include the source, where you found the information, on the slide. Use your own words; plagiarism is not permitted.

Your presentation should have 5-8 slides

Each slide should have less than 10 words on it.

The slide should only have notes. Do not write complete sentences.

Each slide should have 1+ picture on it.
