BACKGROUND

August 2020 begins the 9th year of Black Philanthropy Month (BPM), founded by Jackie Bouvier Copeland as a global celebration, revival and mobilization of Black giving in all its forms to advance Black communities everywhere. Now co-organized with Valaida Fullwood of The Soul of Philanthropy and Tracey Webb of Black Benefactors, as well as African and global Diaspora leaders from the Pan-African Women's Philanthropy Network (PAWPNet), Black Philanthropy Month has become a global movement. Black Philanthropy Month has become a national movement. The United Nations and over 30 governmental bodies have declared *every August* Black Philanthropy Month. Combining sophisticated social media with in-person and virtual events organized by changemakers in cities all over the world, to date 17 million people have celebrated BPM. Today, BPM is more important than ever, as the twin pandemics of Covid-19 and anti-Black racism have decimated communities everywhere. This global celebration and social action initiative promotes a culture of giving and mutual support year-round to buoy the spirits and capacity of stressed Black communities to recover and rebuild.

Black people worldwide give billions in philanthropy, and there is a growing social impact investing and venture funding movement, too. Despite our longstanding and determined leadership to help ourselves, it is well documented that our Black-led nonprofits and businesses have been chronically underfunded by the private sector. Equitable funding is a racial justice issue. A monumental funding investment will be required for Black communities to rebuild post-Covid. In response, BPM organizers are convening a series of three virtual events over four dates during August 2020. These convenings and every discussion are designed to mobilize Black philanthropists, social and angel investors, venture capitalists as well as non-Black allies, along with leaders of nonprofits, businesses, communities and movements to create a set of shared funding guidelines for effective Black community rebuilding. The WISE Fund will coordinate follow-up implementation of BPM Summit recommendations and action steps in collaboration with partners and attendees over the next year.

PLATFORM

The Summit uses a high-tech, interactive platform that simulates a global Black conference location to provide an Afro-futuristic sense of place that stirs an immersive visceral experience and healing. The platform and design elements are crucial for Black people experiencing social isolation, severe illness, death, financial distress, heightened anxiety and anti-Black hostilities during the Covid era.

SUMMIT SERIES

Black Giving and Beyond is a global, virtual convening with three distinct events over four dates (August 1st, 4th, 5th and 29th). Each event is designed to cultivate community and identify actionable principles for equitable, impactful funding of Black communities ravaged by racism and Covid. Live events based on US and African time zones, along with recordings accessible after each live event, allow the entire world and Black Diaspora to participate.

Day 1: Global BPM Kickoff, August 1st, 2020 (12:00 PM - 8:00 PM EDT/9:00 AM - 5:00 PM PDT)

Three (3) influential leaders deliver keynotes with respondent panel discussions. Each of these is followed by audience engagement and polling to develop new Black funding principles. Intermittent cultural performances will lift spirits and stimulate new thinking, while a virtual expo hall, breakouts and a networking lounge will allow participants to delve deeper into the issues and create new connections.

Days 2 and **3:** Black Philanthropy Month - Africa, August 4th and 5th, 2020 (2 PM - 6 PM WAT) Led by the continent's most prominent funders, a keynote and respondent panel will spotlight strategies that are working to address Covid and leapfrog Africa's development. Cultural performances, the virtual expo and networking halls will enhance the Summit's community building impact. Polling during panel discussions will enable attendees of all backgrounds to create Africa's version of The New Black Funding Principles that are the anticipated Summit outcome.

Day 4: Reunity[™]: The Pan-African Women's Philanthropy Network Summit, August 29th, 2020 (11 AM - 10:30 PM EDT/8 AM - 7:30 PM PDT)

Created by The WISE Fund, Reunity[™] is a global rally and revival of Black women funders and innovators from philanthropy, social impact investing and venture capital designed to build diverse Black women's networks, learning, energy and spirits as they lead the social justice movement while working and caring for families, especially in the uniquely stressful conditions of the pandemic recession's impact on our communities. Organized as a series of keynotes, with interactive audience-speaker conversations, Reunity[™] will operate as a master coaching session for Black women. An innovation panel focused on next generation Black Diaspora Giving will be a highlight of the event.

A CALL TO ACTION

This is a turning point for Black communities. The Summit calls on all Black funders and our allies to ask and answer the question: *What are YOU willing to do to heal and fund Black communities for post-Covid recovery and rebuilding*? The time is now. The future is ours. Thank you to all participants, partners and sponsors for joining us to create a safe and just world at Black Giving and Beyond: The Black Philanthropy Month 2020 Summit Series.



Reunity[™]: The Pan-African Women's Philanthropy Network Summit

A Global Black Philanthropy Month 2020 Women's Celebration Produced by The WISE Fund

Reunity[™] is a virtual celebration of BPM and the final year of the African Union's Decade of the Woman. Although often unheralded and invisible, Black women are the backbone of their communities' social change innovation and future. A one-day virtual summit, Reunity is designed to honor, rally and revive the many Black and African- descent women, who are the backbone of our community's future through their philanthropy, social investment, venture capital, volunteerism, activism and caregiving. We anticipate at least 1000 participants.

Founded in Minneapolis, MN in 2003, the Pan-African Women's Philanthropy Network (PAWPNet) is a coalition of old and new Black Diaspora women philanthropists, funders and activists with 300 members from 30 countries from throughout the US, Africa and the global Black Diaspora. A peer support network for diverse Black and allied women, PAWPNet organized the inaugural BPM 2011 convening, called the "Pan-African Women's Action Summit," a global celebration of Black giving.

Today BPM, PAWPNet and Reunity[™] are projects of The WISE Fund (thewisefund.org), a social enterprise committed to empowering grassroots Black and Indigenous women renewable energy innovators using technology to equitably address our world's most challenging issues. The WISE Fund is also the backbone organization for Black Philanthropy Month and its Summit series.

From August 17, 2020, the first 100 registrants for Reunity[™] will receive complimentary copies of Everyday Ubuntu by Mungi Ngomane, a treatise on the ancient Indigenous African philosophy for giving and giving meaning "I am because you are" applied for contemporary times. Mguni Ngomane is granddaughter of Archbishop Desmond Tutu and daughter of Reverend Canon Nontombi Naomi Tutu of The Episcopal Church, a renowned social justice advocate, PAWPNet co-founder and keynote speaker from the early 2000s.

Reunity[™] 2020 will engender hope, foresight, community, learning, new relationships, and wellness among diverse Black women, as we are all called to lead new social, economic and environmental justice movement everywhere in these very stressful times.

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BIOGRAPHIES

Toyin Adegbite-Moore

Oluwatoyin Adegbite-Moore is the Executive Director, West Africa for the African Venture Philanthropy Alliance (AVPA), a Pan-African Network with a mission to increase the flow of capital (financial, human and intellectual) to African Social Investments and ensure the use of the capital for maximum social impact. Prior to joining AVPA, Toyin founded and managed Sheafam & Tam Limited, an international consulting firm specializing in organizational and capacity development including business process management, strategic and change management for SMEs, MSMEs and nonprofits in the US and Nigeria. With over 25 years of leadership within the philanthropic and private sectors, she served as the founding consultant for promoting diversity and inclusion for the work by the Council of Michigan Foundations and the W.K. Kellogg Foundation.

Toyin has provided project oversight on Transformational Projects in the Public, Private and Social Sectors. She is a Salzburg Fellow and was selected in 2019 in the inaugural list of the Top 100 Women CEOs across 24 African countries by Reset Global People in partnership with Pulse and Avance Media. She also serves on the Governance Board of the Sterling Bank Foundation for the Health Workers Fund.

Dr. Antonia Apolinário-Wilcoxon

Antonia Maria Apolinário-Wilcoxon, Ed.D., Equity Strategies, LLC, principal consultant provides direction and leadership in efforts of private, public, and collaborative efforts working to improve the lives of disenfranchised and vulnerable persons impacted by inequities. Dr. Apolinário-Wilcoxon obtained her doctorate degree in educational leadership focusing on critical studies informed by Critical Pedagogy theorists. An African-Brazilian, she brings experiences in education, corporate, private nonprofits and government to lead efforts that bring agency, voice and liberation in spaces where the presence of Oppression, bias and other barriers, silence those most valuable voices to find solutions to problems in their world. Dr. Apolinário-Wilcoxon's approach is one of listening deeply, exercising inquiry to enable wisdom and insights to emerge. Her facilitation is participatory, inclusive, resourceful, caring, and thoughtful. Trained in Respectful Conversations, Kaleidoscope Institute Faith-Based Facilitation, Technology of Participation (Institute of Cultural Affairs) and Art of Hosting/Art of Participatory Leadership, she blends these methodologies to attend to her audience's needs and motivation more responsively.

Teresa "Lah Tere" Ayala

Lah Tere is a humanitarian, organizer, activist, emcee, songstress, proud BBW, and a visionary speaker for the 21st Century. The Afro-Antillean/Puerto Rican/Boricua sister grew up in Chicago's historic Puerto Rican community of Humboldt Park near the famed Paseo Boricua. She is the first generation born on the mainland, and the daughter of revolutionary educators and survivors of Chicago's notorious ghettos. Lah is a proud Aspirante and active member of Sigma Lambda Gamma National Sorority, Inc. Her sheroes are her mother Carmen Maria, Abuela Maria Teresa Serrano, Titi Lah and Dr. Antonia Pantoja (founder of ASPIRA).

Lah was a member of Rebel Diaz, an internationally known rap group that took a critical and political stance on many social issues from police brutality on the streets of New York to violence against women globally. Her dedication and hard work granted her the opportunity to travel to Spain, Germany, Guatemala, Chile, and Venezuela. She is also a founding member of the Rebel Diaz Arts Collective (RDAC), a multimedia arts and music community center in the South Bronx.

Lah is a co-founder of Momma's Hip Hop Kitchen: The Soup Kitchen for the Hip Hop Soul (MHHK), a multifaceted hip-hop event designed to showcase intergenerational women artists, especially women of color. MHHK serves as a social justice community-organizing platform that educates and empowers women of color on issues that impact their lives, including Health, HIV/AIDS, and reproductive justice.

Lah is also the founder of InnerCityQueens, an organization who is set out to provide a mobile safe healing space for children, women, and men in war-torn/third world countries through events, workshops, and meditation using the arts. In recent years Lah Tere's vision of teaching women and children about the healing power of Hip Hop truly manifested itself. She taught and performed in some of the poorest communities in Palestine (West Bank), Guatemala City (Comunidad Incencio), Ireland's Ballymun (like the BX), and the Dominican Republic's pueblo of Azua (Fundacion Casa Ana). Her most recent journey in the summer of 2016 was to the motherland, Africa. Lah's project "Bags of Joy: Tanzania Edition" brought hygienic products, educational supplies, and toys to the children who live on the streets of Dar es Salaam and Dodoma. These experiences have equipped her with a wealth of knowledge and have expanded her career. She is currently being booked internationally as a motivational speaker and lecturer on women's rights and Hip-Hop Healing.

Susan Taylor Batten

Susan Taylor Batten is president and chief executive officer of ABFE: A Philanthropic Partnership for Black Communities. ABFE (established in 1971 as the Association of Black Foundation Executives) is a membership- based philanthropic organization that advocates for responsive and transformative investments in Black communities. Since joining ABFE in 2009, Batten has led the organization's philanthropic advising and programming on responsive philanthropy in Black communities for foundation leaders, donors and aligned partners.

Batten came to ABFE after more than 25 years of leadership experience in both the private and public sectors. Prior to joining ABFE, Batten served as senior associate with the Annie E. Casey

Foundation, a grantmaking institution focused on child welfare. In this role, she served as staff in the Community Change Initiatives Unit and coordinated a portfolio on equity, diversity and inclusion. In the public sector, Batten worked as a senior analyst for the U.S. Department of Agriculture where she directed research and evaluation on food assistance programs; she also served in the Government of the District of Columbia as an analyst on initiatives supporting children, youth and families. Batten currently serves on the board at the United Philanthropy Forum and the Schott Foundation for Public Education, and is an adjunct lecturer at the Valdry Center for Philanthropy at Southern University. She received her master's degree in social work from Howard University and her bachelor's degree in English and political science from Fisk University.

Andia Laura Chakava

Andia Laura Chakava is anAfrican gender lens investing expert. She is theInvestment Directorat the Graca Machel Trust to drive the organization's gender lens investing initiative and is leading the team to create a Pan African women's investment fund.

Andia is one of the first female fund managers in the East Africa region and has been instrumental in the set up of two fund management companies from scratch in Kenya (Old Mutual Investment Services and Alpha Africa Asset Managers) where she served in each as Managing Director. She is also the founding Chairperson of New Faces New Voices Kenya chapter (women in finance network)and is the founding principal of AC Advisory. She is passionate about facilitating intra Africa investment, championing women's economic empowerment and creating strategic alliances to promote gendered financial impact.

The catalyst to establish 1847 Philanthropic emanates from Ms. Petersen's strong desire to create lasting impact in Africa by bringing the essentials of fundraising to their nonprofit institutions. DIA-Fund is a hybrid micro-philanthropy platform that connects members of the diaspora in the U.S with vetted community based organizations in their home country and was developed out of 1847 Philanthropic, as technology solution to the problem of expensive due diligence costs to vet local organizations. Ms. Petersen's career has been built on expertise gained from leading major fundraising and development initiatives in Africa as well as expanding U.S. trade and investment in developing countries. Working within the development departments of international nonprofits, she has been responsible for annual funding goals of over \$16 million dollars in institutional funding and over \$1.3 million dollars cumulative in unrestricted sponsorship dollars.

Her steadfast focus on causes with strong community involvement and local impact enabled her to work with some of the major civil rights leaders of our time, including Ambassador Andrew Young, at GoodWorks International, an international management-consulting firm and she served as the vicepresident for programs and business development at OIC International, this organization carries the legacy of the late Reverend Leon H. Sullivan.

Ms. Petersen began her career at the U.S. Department of Commerce, where she served as the East Africa desk officer within the International Trade Administration. Additionally, she served as the acting senior commercial officer with the African Development Bank in Tunis, Tunisia. She was formerly the director of membership and marketing for The Corporate Council on Africa, a trade organization devoted to increasing U.S. trade and investment in Africa.

Ms. Petersen is a noted speaker on topics related to international development, organizational development and local impact, fundraising, as well as the importance of diversity in international affairs at conferences and events around the world including, Council on Foreign Relations' Conference on Diversity in International Affairs and Africa 2018 Forum amongst others. Rashida Petersen holds an International Business degree from the University of Maryland. She currently serves on the advisory board of the University of Maryland's Hinman CEOs Program; is a member of Bridge Institute's Africa Policy Group; active member of the Association of Fundraising Professionals and a mentor for College Bound in Washington, D.C.

Reverend Canon Nontombi Naomi Tutu

Reverend Canon Nontombi Naomi Tutu is the Missioner for Racial and Economic Equity at the Cathedral of All Souls, Asheville, NC. The challenges of growing up black and female in apartheid South Africa have been the foundation of Rev. Tutu's life as an activist for human rights.

Those experiences taught her that our whole human family loses when we accept situations of oppression, and how the teaching and preaching hate and division injure us all. Rev. Tutu is the third child of Archbishop Desmond and Nomalizo Leah Tutu.

Reverend Tutu's professional experience ranges from being a development consultant in West Africa to being program coordinator for programs on Race and Gender and Gender-based Violence in Education at the African Gender Institute at the University of Cape Town. In addition, Reverend Tutu has taught at the University of Hartford, the University of Connecticut, and Brevard College in North Carolina. She served as Program Coordinator for the historic Race Relations Institute at Fisk University, and was a part of the Institute's delegation to the World Conference Against Racism in Durban. She started her public speaking as a college student at Berea College in Kentucky in the 1970s when she was invited to speak at churches, community groups, and colleges and universities about her experiences growing up in apartheid South Africa. Since that time, she has become a much soughtafter speaker to groups as varied as business associations, professional conferences, elected officials, and church and civic organizations.

In addition to her speaking and preaching, Reverend Tutu has established Nozizwe Consulting. Nozizwe means Mother of Many Lands, in her mother tongue Xhosa, and is the name she was given by her maternal grandmother. The guiding principle of Nozizwe Consulting is to bring different groups together to learn from and celebrate their differences and acknowledge their shared humanity. As part of this work, she has led Truth and Reconciliation Workshops for groups dealing with different types of conflict. She has also offered educational and partnership trips to South Africa for groups as varied as high schools, churches, hospices, K-12 teachers, and women's associations. These trips emphasize the opportunities to share our stories and experiences.

Reverend Tutu is the recipient of four honorary doctorates from universities and colleges in the United States and Nigeria. She is an ordained clergy in the Episcopal Church. Reverend Tutu is the single mother of two daughters and a son.
