Padres GM suspended for Pomeranz trade

Major League Baseball suspended San Diego Padres general manager **A.J. Preller** for 30 days without pay, an unprecedented punishment for what an official said was a failure to disclose medical information when pitcher **Drew Pomeranz** was traded to the Red Sox in July.

The commissioner's office announced the discipline on Thursday but did not elaborate on what Preller did wrong. Red Sox owner **John Henry** had confirmed to the Boston Herald that the commissioner's office was investigating whether all medical records were provided before the trade; the team declined to comment on Thursday.

It's not the first time Preller has run afoul of the commissioner's office: As an assistant with the Texas Rangers, he was suspended for a month for violating baseball's international signing rules.

The Padres traded Pomeranz, a former Collierville High star, to Boston on July 14 for right-handed prospect **Anderson Espinoza**. An All-Star in San Diego, Pomeranz has been inconsistent in Boston with a 2-5 record and 4.60 ERA in 13 starts since the July 14 trade.

MLB said it conducted an investigation into the deal, interviewing individuals from both clubs, and submitted the findings to Commissioner **Rob Manfred**.

South Koreans share lead at final major

South Koreans **In Gee Chun** and **Sung Hyun Park** both carded eight birdies en route to rounds of 8-under par 63 and a share of the lead in the first round of the Evian Championship on Thursday at Evian-Les-Bains, France.

In the fifth and final major of the season, New Zealander **Lydia Ko**'s bid to defend her title and clinch a third career major by the age of 19 got off to a rocky start as she finished seven shots behind the co-leaders.

While Ko's play was patchy, with a bogey and only two birdies, her rival **Ariya Jutanugarn** of Thailand also had a day to forget with a 2-over 73 featuring a triple bogey.

Ko and Ariya have a good chance of taking the Annika Major Award, which rewards the major winner with the best combined record at all five majors of the season, and is named after 10-time major winner **Annikka Sorenstam**. A win here would clinch the award for either Ko or Ariya.

American **Annie Park** posted an eagle and five birdies in a 7-under round of 64 to move into a tie for third place with Olympic bronze medalist **Shanshan Feng**, who was third here last year. They are one stroke behind the leaders.

American **Angela Stanford** posted a 6-under 65 to move into fifth, one shot ahead of South Koreans **So Yeon Ryu** and **Eun-Hee Ji**.

GOLF

■ **Sam Ryder**, **Adam Schenk** and **Keith Mitchell** each shot 7-under 64 to share the first-round lead in the Web.com Tour Finals' Albertsons Boise Open. The tournament is the second in the four-event series that features the top 75 players from the Web.com Tour money list, Nos. 126-200 in the PGA Tour's FedEx Cup standings and some non-members with enough PGA Tour money to have placed in the top 200 in the FedEx Cup had they been eligible.

■ Defending champion **Rikard Karlberg** of Sweden led local favorite **Francesco Molinari** by one stroke in the first round of the Italian Open at Monza, Italy. Karlberg shot a 7-under 64 at the Golf Club Milano. Thunderstorms delayed play for several hours and a good chunk of the field did not complete their rounds, or even start.

NBA

■ Philadelphia 76ers center **Joel Embiid** has recovered from foot injuries and should be ready to play when the team opens training camp in two weeks. Embiid, the No. 3 pick in the 2014 draft, has yet to make his NBA debut because of two surgeries on his right foot that stunted his progress and put a serious crimp in Philadelphia's rebuilding process. Coach **Brett Brown** said the 22-year-old Embiid, a 7-foot center out of Kansas, will play this season with yet to be determined restrictions to ease him into the NBA. One such condition could include holding him out on the second night of back-to-back games. Embiid has wowed the organization in private workouts since the end of last season and his potential has Brown excited that the Sixers, coming off a 10-win season, have found their cornerstone center. "He needs to be the crown jewel, the centerpiece of our defense," Brown said.

■ Phoenix Suns forward **P.J. Tucker** had surgery on his lower back Thursday and is expected to be out six to eight weeks. Tucker averaged 8.0 points, 6.2 rebounds, 2.2 assists and 1.3 steals in 82 games last season.

WNBA

■ **Angel McCoughtry** scored 31 points and the host Atlanta Dream (17-16) beat Washington 94-91 to stay in contention for a double-bye while eliminating the Mystics (13-20) from the playoff race. The Phoenix Mercury clinched the No. 8 seed with Washington's loss. **Emma Meesseman** and **Taylor Hill** had 20 points each for Washington.

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PREP FOOTBALL PREVIEW: WEEK 5

Shaping up to be a special Friday night

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For the first four weeks at least, it's been a bumper year for special teams in Shelby County.

Led by Trey Thomas of MUS (15 of 15 extra points, 8 of 11 field goals), the city has a fine crop of kickers which also includes Hunter Haynes of Harding, Noah Grant of Briarcrest, Dylan Scott of Collierville, Jacob Bray of CBHS and Micah Breckenridge of White Station.

Return men are off to a great start as well: Trezevant's Marterio Richardson has only returned two kickoffs so far this season — both for touchdowns while averaging 77.5 yards per return — and Bartlett's Philip Thompson also has two TDs on kick returns. Calvin Austin of Harding has brought back two punts for scores.

As the saying goes, special teams do special things. And they probably will tonight, too.

(6) LAUSANNE (3-0) AT (7) HARDING (3-0)

Time: 7 p.m. Storylines: Harding won 40-37 last year and you can expect similar fireworks this time around. Lausanne ranks third in Shelby County in total offense (393.3 yards per game) with Harding sixth (359.3). Two of the

city's best running backs will also be on display, Harding's Marquavius Moore (224 ypg) and Lausanne's Eric Gray (164).

(2) Cordova (4-0, 1-0 Region 4-6A) at Collierville (1-3, 0-1), 7 p.m. Storylines: The Wolves — led by their county-best defense — face their toughest challenge to this point. Collierville rolled up 60 points last week against Millington and has some very capable playmakers that can cause problems.

Cincinnati LaSalle (2-1) at (T3) CBHS (3-1), Saturday, noon. Storylines: Look for this one to be much closer than last year, when the Lancers romped 63-0 on their home turf. The Brothers have the third-best run defense in the county and an offense capable of producing big plays, led by quarterback Keegan Voss. LaSalle's standouts are athlete TreSean Smith, a Louisville commitment, and linebacker-running back Jarrell White.

South Panola (1-3) at (T3) MUS (4-0), 7 p.m. Storylines: On paper, this doesn't appear to be a vintage South Panola team. And the Owls are flying high after a fine performance against Grenada last week. If the MUS defense stays hot, the Owls win.

Millington (0-4) vs. (5) Ridgeway (3-1) at Halle, 7 p.m. Storylines: The Roadrunners should get back in the offensive groove after losing to Whitehaven last week. The Trojans have given up 108 points in their last two games. And it's Homecoming, along with the Region 8-4A opener for both.

Joining Kaepernick — at a cost

■ Backlash doesn't deter

Standing, kneeling or gesturing in support of Colin Kaepernick's national anthem protests has come at a cost for the dozen NFL players who have joined the cause against social injustices. They've faced vitriolic, sometimes racist reactions, forfeited some of their fan base, and at least one has lost endorsements.

None is deterred by the backlash.

"No, it's worth it," said Broncos linebacker Brandon Marshall, insisting that while he's disheartened by evaporating endorsements, Twitter trolls and the burning of a T-shirt in front of team headquarters this week, he's also undaunted.

"It's an evil world. It's a hateful world. I'm not here to spread hate. I'm not here to respond to the hate. I'm here to spread love and positivity," Marshall said. "I'm a likable guy. I was once a fan favorite for a reason. It's cool, because people can call me n-word or cuss at me or say they wish I would break my neck all they want. There's no backlash from me. Hate can't drive out hate. Only love can drive out hate."

Marshall played at Nevada with Kaepernick, who began this movement last month by refusing to stand for the anthem during San Francisco's preseason games as a protest to racial oppression and police brutality in the United States.

While Kaepernick saw sales of his jersey skyrocket, Marshall has faced financial repercussions for taking a knee during the national anthem on opening night.

Marshall lost endorsements from the Air Academy Federal Credit Union and CenturyLink before music mogul Russell Simmons offered him a deal with Rushcard this week.

"So, I lost two endorsements and gained one," said Marshall, insisting it was better to have a single company standing behind him than two so quick to bail.

"When you really think about it, I didn't breach my contract. I didn't get arrested. I didn't do anything to defame the team or CenturyLink or Air Acad-

emy. I just exercised my first amendment rights," Marshall said. "And they dropped me for that. I'm proud of what I did because I didn't do anything wrong or hurtful by any stretch."

Seahawks' Wilson says he'll be ready: Seahawks quarterback Russell Wilson insists he'll be ready to play against the Los Angeles Rams on Sunday.

Wilson was a full participant in practice each of the past two days after suffering a sprained ankle in the third quarter of last week's game against the Miami Dolphins.

Hopkins fined for wearing Yeezy cleats: Houston receiver DeAndre Hopkins won't be wearing his Kanye

West-designed Yeezy cleats again anytime soon.

Hopkins, who has a multiyear contract with Adidas, said he received a fine of \$6,000 for wearing the shoes. He received the fine because NFL rules say that shoes must have one dominant base color, which the Yeezy's do not.

Titans want more pressure, sacks, turnovers vs. Lions

NASHVILLE — Linebacker Derrick Morgan missed a second straight day of practice for the Tennessee Titans with his injured left hamstring.

Whether Morgan plays or not Sunday, the Titans know they must do a better job of pressuring Detroit Lions quarterback Matthew Stafford than they did against Minnesota journeyman Shaun Hill in the opener.

The Vikings backup quarterback was not sacked by the Titans, who also didn't force any turnovers. Against the more explosive Lions offense, the Titans must find a way to attack Stafford, who was 31 of 39 for 340 yards with three touchdowns passes in a win at Indianapolis.

"We've got to create turnovers," Titans linebacker Brian Orakpo said. "Last week you saw two great defenses going at it, but what was the difference in the game was turnovers, and we've got to do a good job of getting some this week."

Orakpo not only was held without a sack in the opener, he was not credited with a tackle either.

"Sometimes it's like that," Orakpo said. "You play on the edge and it's like that. You've just got to control and play your side. ... You've got to control your side. Nothing really

broke on my side. It is what it is. Sometimes it's like that."

Titans coach Mike Mularkey said getting turnovers and sacks have to be a priority for the defense.

"For the most part in the history of the NFL, turnovers dictate the outcome of games," Mularkey said. "Sacks are right behind turnovers. If you want to look at teams that get sacks and don't, you'll look at the win-loss column. That ratio is definitely a factor in the outcome of the game."

A point the Titans know firsthand. Tennessee had three second-half turnovers against the Vikings and lost a 10-0 lead.

Defensive coordinator Dick LeBeau said the Titans were getting a lot of pressure on the quarterback early. "The biggest thing was we didn't turn the ball over" for our offense, LeBeau said. "We got a couple where we almost had the ball out. But almost doesn't count unless you're pitching horseshoes. We want to do better in that area."

Doing better might prove difficult if Morgan is limited or doesn't play Sunday, though the Titans believe they are better equipped to handle his absence now than when he missed six games last year with a shoulder injury. They drafted Kevin Dodd with the No. 33 pick overall out

of Clemson with David Bass likely to start at outside linebacker if Morgan is out.

"One of the things we've been very encouraged about this year's defense is I think we have more depth, particularly in that position" LeBeau said. "David Bass had a lot of snaps last year filling in for Derrick and did a great job for us really. I feel really good about his ability to go in there and perform at an NFL level."

"We have a couple of draft choices (Kevin Dodd and Aaron Wallace) that we feel good about that are making great progress."

Note: WR Kendall Wright was limited again to individual work with his injured left hamstring.
