

Pastor's Ponderings

Holy Week is always a powerful time for me. The dramatic liturgies, the opportunities to reflect on the nature of loss and grief, the regular rhythm of prayer, and the time of preparation for Easter is always an opportunity to focus my attention and renew my faith.

Now we have entered the season of Easter. One of my colleagues once remarked that the reason that Lent is six weeks long and Easter is seven weeks long is that resurrection is a more difficult concept than death. It takes us longer to comprehend the season of Easter, I don't know how true that statement is, but I am grateful for a season to consider and experience the power of resurrection in our lives.

This is a season of new possibilities for our congregation. We remain as busy as we were before, but have found new focus for our work in the joy of the good news that death is not the end.

Conference Ministers call for prayer

On March 16, the 39 Conference Ministers and the General Minister and President of the United Church of Christ joined their counterparts in the Episcopal Church known as the House of Bishops in signing a statement calling for church members to pray for our country. This unprecedented action—the leaders of our two denominations joining together—was in response to the political climate in our country. The statement was read in all Episcopal congregations on Palm Sunday. In the United Church of Christ we share information in a different manner. Here is the statement that our leaders have signed:

Statement by the House of Bishops of the Episcopal Church cosigned by the Council of Conference Ministers of the United Church of Christ:

On Good Friday the ruling political forces of the day tortured and executed an innocent man. They sacrificed the weak and the blameless to protect their own status and power. On the third day Jesus was raised from the dead, revealing not only their injustice but also unmasking the lie that might makes right.

In a country still living under the shadow of the lynching tree, we are troubled by the violent forces being released by this season's political rhetoric. Americans are turning against their neighbors, particularly those on the margins of society. They seek to secure their own safety and security at the expense of others. There is legitimate reason to fear where this rhetoric and actions arising from it might take us.

In this moment, we resemble God's children wandering in the wilderness. We, like they, are struggling to find our way. They turned from following God and worshiped a golden calf constructed from their own wealth. The current rhetoric is leading us to construct a modern false idol out of power and privilege. We reject the idolatrous notion that we can ensure the safety of some by sacrificing the hopes of others. No matter where we fall on the political spectrum, we must respect the dignity of every human being and we must seek the common good above all else.

We call for prayer for our country that a spirit of reconciliation will prevail and we will not betray our true selves.

Board and Departments

Church Board By Dona Leavens

The UCC Church Board met on March 15, 2016 with Rob Burton leading the meeting. Andy Knight reported that the pledges are down but that is normal for this time of year. Ted Huffman asked the Board to amend the 2016 budget by \$1700 for wages for part-time employees. Cinnamon Hill has requested extended hours from 12:00pm to 2:00pm for the coming school year. The Board agreed to the extended hours. Cinnamon Hill currently gives a donation of \$9,900 per year. The Board decided to increase their annual donation by \$500 plus an additional \$315 for extended hours. Susan Kelts would like to have an AED installed in the Church. The cost would be about \$1300 and training would be provided. Susan will do some research and get back to the Board. Lutheran Social Services will be holding a benefit dinner on May 1 for aged out foster children with mental health issues. Carol Boyles would like to put the information in The Call and on the bulletin board. The next board meeting will be held at 7:00pm on Tuesday, April 19.

Why Do We Do That?

From the Department of Worship

The Department of Worship has had several recent conversations concerning the use of glutenfree bread for communion. There are several guiding principles that are a part of our consideration: Communion should be inclusive of all. No one should have to forego communion because of an allergy or health condition. And the symbolism of all eating from the same piece of bread is part of the sacrament. On the other hand, the meal is symbolic. It has worked, in the past, for us to have a separate cup for glutenfree bread. We've experimented with offering gluten-free to all worshipers, but we haven't yet arrived at a final solution. We'd love your input. Speak with any member of the Department of Worship to express your opinion. There may be a few more changes yet to come.
