Fresh Youth Initiatives empowers youth who have the fewest resources to achieve their greatest potential. Our programs address five challenges in our community:

- The academic achievement gap among Latino youth
- Immigration adjusting to a new home and language
- School transitions, especially middle to high school to college
- Social-emotional and mental health needs.
- Access to resources that prepare youth for college and careers

A turning point in my life was when I went to my first therapy session. FYI supported me when I needed it the most.



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


Alondra

Susan and I talk about all this, and she listens to me, and that's the most important thing. To have an adult who listens to you. And doesn't judge you. She always supports and listens to me. We tried to work it out so I could feel better. It's not ignored, or it's not absurd, and it's not forgotten; she just listens to me.

She is like a guardian angel rescuing me from my dark inner demons. I told her one of the reasons I am stronger now is because of her. She is one of the reasons I haven't given up. With college, and problems at home, sometimes you just want to give up. But I never did. It's amazing how they protect us like we're their own children.

Being a participant of FYI has helped build the way I think and the way I am as person. A lot of the staff in FYI have seen a change in my attitude compared to what It used to be. 
Jesus

I modeled in the Fashion Show. And everyone went crazy!


At the end, I was thankful to Susan and Paola because they gave me the support that I needed to challenge myself to do what I like without thinking about what others would say.




Rashell
