
2020 Dog Park Survey


Go Dog North Shore (GDNS) launched an online dog park survey on February 10, 2020. The survey was advertised through a variety of outlets including the GDNS Facebook page, Cook County News Herald, WTIP radio, Boreal Community Media, a public outreach event at Voyageur Brewing Company and by word of mouth. Given the dates that the majority of survey responses were submitted it appears that most respondents found out about the survey through Boreal Community Media. As of March 3, 2020, 121 people had responded to the survey. The primary objectives of the survey were:


- ✓ Determine how many people use the current dog park & frequency of use
- ✓ Determine why people don't use the dog park
- ✓ Identify individuals that would be willing to maintain the current and/or future dog park
- ✓ Gather feedback on what a future dog park should consist of


The survey consisted of 10 questions, many of which were open-ended and allowed the respondent to provide a lot of feedback. One statistic that particularly stands out is that while only 56% of those that responded to the survey use the current park, 94% of the respondents provided feedback on what they would like a future dog park to consist of. In a nutshell, 94% of the survey respondents (109 people) would like to have a dedicated off-leash dog park available to them. The tables below summarize the results for each question.














A total of 116 people responded to this question. Of those 116 responses, 109 of them provided details on what their ideal park would consist of. The other 7 respondents provided unrelated or negative feedback concerning dogs or dog parks.
















The overall response to this question yielded an average rating of 4.





A total of 73 people responded to this question. Below is a sample of some of the comments received in Question #10.

We've been experiencing many different dog parks in the metro area. They are fun areas to meet other dogs and other people. As always, it's important people pick up the poop!

Could charge small fee to pay for upkeep of park.

In addition to Grand Marais being a dog-friendly home, it's also billed as a dog-friendly destination. That means people - visitors and locals alike - need a safe and secure place to walk, run, and play with their dogs within the city limits. The current infrastructure (horse arena, rec park in the off-season, safe streets) is inadequate to meet the needs of dogs.

A big concern is ongoing maintenance, including pooop disposal. Even if there is only a small percentage of users who don't clean up after their dog, it won't take long for poop to build to the point that it becomes unpleasant to use. How will this be addressed? Who will be responsible for maintenance, the city, county, GoDogNorthShore, or some kind of cooperative arrangement of the above? This would be alarge area that would need to be fenced (secured). Where does the money come from to get that done, and who installes it? Can volunteers help? It needs to be done well. Professionals may need to do some parts (installing gates and secure corners). The fence may need to be 6 feet high in orderto provide security in winter when there is packed snow inside the fence. (I had a 4 foot fence that was almost completely covered in places during the winter. Shared space does not work well for either party.

Appreciate the efforts in providing the current dog park area. Looking forward to having a dedicated dog park. Locals and visitors would all benefit and would be a plus for our town. In the fund raising, don't limit it to just the cost of the installation but start something for the up-keep/maintenance because something will happen and then at least there would be a bit to get it fixed. Could a secure donation box be placed at a dedicated dog park (thinking something like a car meter). Thanks again for organizing and getting people involved!
