His own Radio 4 series 'Paul Sinha's History Revision' won the Rose d'Or for radio comedy in 2016. A lifetime of curiosity and learning informs Paul's comedy but now also ranks him as one of the UK's finest quizzers. This has led to yet another concurrent career, this time as a general knowledge expert on the awardwinning ITV quiz show, The Chase.

As in previous year's, PICT's AGM will be held before the lunch in one of the hotel's smaller rooms (details available closer to the time). This in essence is to encourage members to come along to this important meeting prior to the lunch. At this stage a request was made to PICT to see if we could help to access specialist help - an assessment process had to be gone through, which as you may imagine, was time consuming, stressful and due to the travel involved, expensive.

PICT looked at the circumstances and decided it was a case we would support. We provided a sum of money to assist in the matter

and we are really pleased to report that through the expertise of the specialist the child is improving and the parents coping well.

We were only too pleased to support a paper trade colleague during a very concerning time for their family.

This is another example of the kind of assistance that PICT can give to former or current members of our paper industry, who may be facing difficulties. Should you know anybody who we may be able to help, please, in the first instance, contact PICT secretary Anne James.

TRINGFORD TROUT LAKE, TRING, HERTS - Saturday, 14th September 2019

RIVER TEST, ROMSEY, HANTS - Thursday 17th October 2019



letter from the paper trail

It has been a very busy and fulfilling period at The Paper Trail. It has seen a record number of visitors and school trips, along with a very full order book for Frogmore paper, not to mention some well received support.

One of the problems facing schools is the lack of funds to support outings. Epson, through its Horizon Education Project, has gifted money to Apsley Paper Trail (APT) that will enable worthy schools to apply for monies to help pay for a coach to bring classes to Frogmore Paper Mill. Additionally Epson has gifted a powerful teaching aide, which includes a camera and wireless projector. This facility will allow the whole class to view at one time microscopic fibres and close-ups of various print process characteristics amongst other things.

PICT has kindly donated monies that have gone towards equipment in APT's Have-A-Go papermaking area, and the local Boxmoor Trust has gifted a new outboard motor for the Bryan Donkin visitor boat.

Other very rewarding events have occurred be it via a somewhat convoluted route! The Archive staff at Frogmore Mill were asked to verify the authenticity of a letter supposedly from the Titanic. Timothy Towers, letterpress historian and expert witness in the USA, asked if this letter was genuine. The letter had been written on Croxley Script. Within the APT archive exists a recorded list of all John Dickinson Dandy Rolls and their original production dates. As a result, Mike Stanyon, senior archivist, was able to confirm the

letter was a fake, in that the first Croxley Script Dandy Roll was manufactured in 1950, somewhat later than 1912?

Mike Stanyon himself has just retired. A surprise party was held in order to celebrate his 19 years with the APT archive. As a special thanks for all his efforts over that period his name will continue to be associated with APT. The Archive has been named the Michael Stanyon Archive.

Whilst talking of the USA, Frogmore Paper Mill received a very interesting guest. James Fenn, the great, great, great, great, great grandson of Henry Fourdrinier, came over from the USA to see at first hand where the first commercially operated Fourdrinier machine was housed.

APT remembered. At precisely 11am on the 11th November a number of ex-Dickinson staff joined APT personnel at the War Memorial in the grounds of the John Dickinson Cottage to remember the 362 John Dickinson employees who fell during the First and Second World War.

Sadly, not everything at APT has gone well. Due to the lack of support it was necessary to cancel the dinner (celebration of Paper) at Stationers' Hall. It is hoped to reschedule it in the New Year, but at a quieter time and possibly during the day. Watch this space.


