News from Brookside

Roses in December? With the very mild winter weather, we all have noticed a number of plants confused and blooming out of season: daffodils and Lenten roses (see below), snowdrops and forsythia. I also noticed one of my least favorite invasive plants, the despised Garlic Mustard. This biennial (which means it seeds one year and flowers the next) grows in abundance in the shady woods around our office. Staff routinely pull handfuls of them as we walk to and from our cars. The mild late fall weather encouraged their growth and it wasn't too onerous to spend some of the sunny 70 degree weather outside removing them, getting a jump on a task we usually tackle in March. Another unwelcome invasive pest to be concerned about is the Emerald Ash Borer. If you haven't already heard of it, these shiny green beetles were introduced unintentionally from Asia to Michigan in 2002 and have spread eastward, killing millions of our native Ash trees, a common woodland species. Once symptoms are observed, tree health can decline rapidly. Some symptoms include branch dieback and crown thinning; bark-splitting; d-shaped exit holes;

and woodpecker damage. For more information, check out these websites:

At Brookside Gardens, we have a few specimen Ash trees planted in our collections, which we monitor for signs of infestation. Within Montgomery Parks, it is a larger problem, since we manage tens of thousands of acres. We share our knowledge at events like Green Matters Symposium and Earth Day, both sponsored by Friends of Brookside Gardens. Programs like these bring local environmental issues to the attention of our visitors and give us all tools to become better stewards of our shared environment.

2015 BROOKSIDE GARDENS WINTER TRAIN DISPLAY

The train display was a treat for every one! Young and old enjoyed the charming layout of three Large Scale (G-Scale) garden trains on three tracks running through a town and country setting depicting life in the 1960's in Montgomery County. Train lovers could waft nostalgic at the sound of the engines chugging around the tracks. Car buffs marveled at the collection of vintage models. Garden lovers admired the lovely plantings supplied by Brookside Gardens to enhance the setting that even boasted a model of the greenhouse. Children were thrilled at the sight of Thomas the Engine and his pals coming around the bend. They also had fun searching for favorite cartoon characters hidden among the wonders of the display using a scavenger list provided by the Society members. Miniature modelers marveled at the detail in the city and village scenes while history lovers enjoyed the replicas of well-loved areas and landmarks in the County, such as The Cider Mill, The Kensington Train Station, and the Maryland Motors building. The separate Cabin John Trolley Line display depicted the

line running to Glen Echo, complete with models of the Denzel Carousel, the Ferris wheel and the bumper car building and an explanatory note on the history of the line and the park. Designed, built and installed by members, the display is owned by the Washington, Virginia & Maryland Garden Railway Society. Many replicas in the display were hand-built by its members, several of whom have their own year-round outdoor displays and often bring trains from their collections to be "guest trains" for the day. According to their informative handout, it takes "approximately 200 person hours to plan and design with another 874 person hours required to build this display." Much of it is stored at Brookside Gardens during the year; however, throughout the year exhibits can be seen in other locations in the area. Garden Guardian

In case you hadn't noticed, we experienced spring in December!! In stark contrast to last winter's hard chill, this strong El Nino influenced year has brought about a completely opposite plant reaction in response to the unseasonable warmth!! (at least as of this writing on Jan. 1, 2016!!). Last year we were lucky if a few *Helleborus niger* (Xmas rose) dared show themselves before being iced out, this year a whole swarm of Xmas roses and relatives are in full glory – in fact several have gone from white to faded green already!! But – not only are these *H. niger* forms in full show, many of the *Helleborus* (Lenten Rose) plants are actually in bloom or threatening to. Equally obvious have been the *Prunus x hybridus autumnalis* (*subhirtella*) cherries that typically bloom in early Spring and occasionally throw a few autumn blooms but this year are almost in full bloom!! Then there are the daffodil greens, the snow drops, the forsythia (and jasmine), *Iris unguicularis* (pictured), even a Daphne, etc.


It feels like mid-March!! So many plants that have low chill requirements are forcing – in the lexicon of the day 'may the forces be with us' so to speak. What do you have in your garden (wallet)?

A concern might well be – how much collateral damage will occur when the inevitable deep freeze moves in?? How many of these plants have hardened off? Hopefully just the flowers will disappear and perhaps some shoot tips get nipped. So maybe many of you will be observant and be in a position to provide feedback as to how much this pre-spring tease actually predisposes our gardens for a small disaster. Will this abnormal early bloom reduce the impact of the later true spring emergence?? Whatever, it is abundantly clear that spring will arrive considerably earlier than last year.

Book Review



Chapman, Baylor. PLANT RECIPE BOOK: 100 Living Arrangements for Any Home in Any Season. New York: Artisan, 2014.

While gardeners cannot dig in the dirt just yet, there are some creative and fun activities to do indoors while waiting for spring. You may find yourself doing these year-round!

This book, organized like a cookbook with specific “ingredients” and “instructions”, will have you scouring your cupboards and shelves, even the garage and gardening storage, for everyday and unusual items with which to make attractive and intriguing arrangements. That old watering can, the abandoned wooden box, or the pedestal cake plate you no longer use can bring sparkle and interest to ordinary and extraordinary plants. Many of these arrangements can be as long-lived as the contents or as short as needed for a special occasion. Some of the author’s suggestions include some of the following ideas:

Instead of that Christmas amaryllis standing rigidly lonely in its container, enhance it with the addition of

some peperomias and perhaps a calla lily in a wooden salad bowl. It’s nearly time for hyacinth bulbs to make an appearance. The author suggests planting them in four shallow bowls of the same or complementary colors and varying sizes, clustering them in a tabletop arrangement. A variety of miniature cacti would look especially appealing in that discarded wooden box with contrasting material for mulch – try black sand. That same box could contain your indoor herb garden using a variety of plant shapes and colors. The red plastic bowl for which you have no use can be the start of a display for the red tulip bulbs that did not get planted outdoors last fall; use some grape ivy and shamrock for contrast. The old copper pot you no longer use in the kitchen would make a lovely container for a combination of begonia and primrose with ivy twining on the handle.
