Woman's Club of Palo Alto Executive Board Meeting Minutes February 4, 2015

Jack Morton, WCPA accountant, presented and answered questions regarding the WCPA tax return. The report as presented passed unanimously. Margaret Feuer showed plans for a plaque indicating our status on the National Register of Historic Places. Feuer asked for and got an allocation of \$1500 to cover the costs of the plaque. Feuer will return with exact details of style, size, and cost. Lolly Osborne, Co Chair of the Centennial Committee presented general proposals for our 2016 celebration. Lolly wants our members to be excited, participating, and well-informed about any Centennial plans. The Board expressed pleasure with some of the initial ideas for the Centennial. There were no amendments to the minutes as presented. Barry reviewed the budget and answered questions about the total cost of the exterior ramp and delight in the restoration of the Steinway piano. The treasurer's report passed unanimously. Lolly Osborne reported that there are eighteen women on the WCPA waiting list at this time. The 2014 class is planning a Bunco Dice Game on March 26. Tickets will cost \$15. The event is billed as a friendship-raiser for members and friends. Chair Margo Ogus reported that the

History Corner The Great War

Even though the United States did not enter World War I until 1917, events commemorating its trials and tribulations have been all over the media since 2014. The Hoover Institution presently features a powerful exhibit, "Women and the Great War," through March 21. It's worth a trip. It is a familiar story to many Peninsula residents how, in 1917, the government "leased 25,000 acres of land in and around Menlo Park to establish a...training center called Camp Fremont." Menlo Park became a "boom town" as recruits from all over the West poured into the area to train as part of the 8th Infantry Division in preparation for deployment to France. At Camp Fremont, soldiers honed a variety of skills. Rifle drills took place at what is now the intersection of Foothill Expressway and Page Mill Road and artillery practice in present-day Foothill Park and the Pearson-Arastradero Preserve. The ladies of the Woman's Club of Palo Alto sent aid for Belgian Relief and sponsored entertainments for the troops. Late in the war, as part of the Allied Intervention, 5000 soldiers went from Camp Fremont not to France as originally planned but to Vladivostok, Russia, with a dual role: if possible to help the anti-Bolshevik forces; encourage Russia to continue its military efforts against the Central Powers. Neither effort turned out to be successful, and the American doughboys spent two miserable winters in Eastern Siberia. Camp Fremont closed down shortly after the war. According to Jerry Lawrence and Brian Bondurant in their "War Relics in the 'Valley of Heart's Delight,'" as recently as 2008 Palo Alto park rangers uncovered a 75mm artillery shell beside a deer trail in the Pearson-Arastradero Preserve.

Committee On Revenue Sources and Equity is proceeding apace. The committee has interviewed thirty-one Club members regarding revenue sources. They will also do a brief survey of all members. The Committee will report at the March General Meeting and make a presentation to the Board before the end of the Board year. She asked that Board members attend the March meeting to hear the discussion so as to act with awareness when the report comes to the Board.

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ACTION ITEMS

Policy Re Division of Fundraising Funds between Historic Preservation and Philanthropy (Cash Grants): Adopted a definition of 'Historic Preservation' as follows" 'Historic Preservation' is to maintain the appropriate contents and character of the house." The Board adopted the following procedure for allocation of funds raised by the membership. " All fundraising events held by members of the Woman's Club of Palo Alto shall be considered to be for the benefit of the whole Club; and the Board shall decide the division of any funds raised by each fundraising event. Each fundraising event or activity shall be approved by the Board." It was determined that the procedure would allow those undertaking a fundraiser to come to the Board early in the process and ask that funds from their event be directed to a designated item and the Board should approve the dispersal when the event is initially presented to them. The Board has the right, based on current need of the Club, to allocate any funds raised to the projects most needy at the time. The final action by the Board regarding fundraising was the following motion: That the \$6,613.30 income received from the Painted Chairs Event (FY12-14) shall be allocated to Historic Preservation.

Direction to Finance Committee on FY15-16 Budget Issues. The Finance Committee is working on the FY15-16 Budget and brought forward to the Board several items for direction.

1. Membership in the Palo Alto Chamber of Commerce. The Board directed that the Club renew its membership in the PA Chamber for FY15-16; and that the President should appoint a liaison between Club and Chamber for clear communications.

2. Monthly Newsletter. The Club should continue next year the e-mail based newsletter distribution established this year. Mailed newsletter will be provided to members at no additional cost, only on request to the Membership Chair.

3. Fundraising/Program Seed Money. The Board accepted the definition of Fundraiser as 'an event whose intention is to raise more funds than it costs to put it on.' The Board's definition of Program is 'an event that aims to educate/enlighten members or community and plans to cover expenses from fees charged.'

4. Loma Prieta Youth Conference. Club budget next year will include a scholarship for this Federation led and sponsored event. Local youth groups

need to be aware of this opportunity. Hopefully a young Palo Alto woman could represent the Club. The President will select a member next year to promote this local opportunity.

5. Kitchen Amenities. This expenditure will be separated from the Luncheon line item in FY15-16. The Board directed that next year purchasing coffee and tea shall be paid for from the \$850 monthly allocation. All other support 'staples' (salt, pepper, sugar, etc.) would still be considered a Kitchen Amenity, along with replacement of cooking equipment, cooking supplies, crockery.

6. Philanthropy Grants. The Board directed that philanthropy grants should not be tied to a percentage of the operating budget. The amount given to Philanthropy in the operation budget will be determined each year. This amount is supplemented each year by donations made by members.

7. In Memoriam Gifts. The Board directed that In Memoriam Gifts by the Club to philanthropy to recognize deceased members should be increased from \$50 to \$100.

8. Future Use of the Fireside Room. There are no funds this year to install a gas fireplace in the Fireside Room. Rather House and Grounds Committee (H&G) should be charged to look into use of the area, how to facilitate that use, list total costs, including, if appropriate, the refitting of the fire place. A gas fireplace is on the capital inventory for the Fy15-19 investment period, estimated at \$10,000.

9. Increase in the Janitor's Wage. The Board directed that the hourly and monthly stipend of the Janitor, a contractor to the Club, be increased. There were two recommendations, one from H&G (4% or \$26/hr) and one from the Finance Committee (8% or \$27/hr). Half or more of the janitor's income is from rentals, set up/take down and clean up, all paid by renters. The Board also endorsed double time (\$52/hour) for any clean up that taking over 4 hours.
