Saturday sonshine program

Saturday Sonshine Brings Sunshine into Lives of Kids!

During the school year for Fall 2009-Spring 2010 the Saturday Sonshine program brought sunshine into the lives of children. If you receive our newsletters you know a bit about the program already. We continue to provide children and youth ages 6-16 yrs. old, opportunities to visit places and enjoy experiences that they may not have otherwise. The kids come primarily from the zip code areas of 14613 and 14621. It is no secret that the children coming from these areas are at great risk at falling into the potholes of poverty.

The Saturday Sonshine Program journeyed to Watkins Glen, Bristol Mountain, the Salvation Army gym, Gallery One, Mud About You, Mendon Ponds Park, Bowling, Taughannock Falls (near Ithaca), Cummings Nature Center, Braddock Bay, the Seneca Park Zoo, Genesee Valley Gorge and one of our greatest outings was to the Weaver Farm in Rushville. One of our mornings was spent with members of Slam High, writing and reciting poetry.

We incorporated Bible studies on most occasions that tied in with a life skills lesson.

Most Saturdays involve some physical exercise, mostly in the way of hiking. The hope is to do activities outside for the majority of the times we meet, interspersed with the arts.

One very special trip to the Weaver farm had the kids hiking around the property with the cows, horses, goats and chickens. They paddled around in a small pond and some caught little frogs. Each one of our Sonshine participants got to ride horseback and take a ride on the Weaver's buggy, which is the

form of transportation they use regularly.

The year concluded with youth receiving a year book of photos from the trips, an outline and commentary on some of the Bible studies, as well as, a packet of information reinforcing the message about eating healthy foods and charts for nutrition, that we hope parents will implement for their children.

We look to resume this program in November. Volunteers are needed!

More than \$\$ for your organization

If we sent out a message inviting organizations to attend a seminar where each would receive \$2000, I doubt that any would pass up the opportunity. Am I right?

If we invite you to a collaborative event that may bring you more value than a check for \$2000, will you come? If the answer is yes, mark Saturday, November 6' on your calendar.

Several years ago Project URGE was part of a consortium of organizations that applied for a Federal Grant, with the lead organization being Foodlink. The prevailing question was: Shouldn't many Rochester non-profits team up to apply for a grant that would assist many groups rather than have two or three compete for the same dollars?

Initially there were few organizations at the table, but as the potential grew for a grant submission that held some promise for future funding, so did the number of people around the table. What a surprise! Right?

To make a longer story short, the first grant attempt did not come to fruition. Despite the point being made several times with regard to the potential value and strength these organizations could have by working together, the representation at the table shrank to the earlier stages of discussion.

The following year Foodlink once again pursued the Capital Compassion Fund grant, with several organizations and universities remaining at the table. This time the grant was awarded, but for much less than the previous year; however, many grassroots organizations (CBOs and FBOs) benefited greatly from the award. My personal opinion is (and I do stress personal), that the effort put forth by Foodlink and the benefits reaped by grant award recipients were often taken for granted.

any grassroots organizations truly benefited from the capacity building, training and funding. But once again, after the grant period had ended and those efforts were suspended, representation at the table shrunk. There have even been workshops and trainings open to organizations who were not awarded grants and to many who were not even part of the original process in an effort to strengthen the effectiveness of organizations with the underserved. Though participation grew this past year, relatively few of the non-profits in Rochester have taken advantage of this educational opportunity through CUPP (Community University Partnership Project). This effort was an outgrowth of the grant process and a plea by some to extend benefits to grassroots organizations that could use these trainings to improve their capacity to serve and connect with others in the process.

bviously there is much more to this story; however, the conclusion can be drawn through this experience, that unless there is potential for dollars blowing in the wind there appears to be little incentive for many organizations to be at the table. The value of building collaborative relationships dwindles without money, in spite of the potential impact that could be realized against poverty through a collaborative effort. This is not only evidenced in our non-profit sector, but is unfortunately true in our churches as well. Do we toss in the towel?

Granted, the anemic collaborative efforts of some organizations can call to question our motivation to rekindle the cooperative spirit. Conversely, aren't the lives of those hurting worth the battle? Aren't the devastating effects of poverty (especially children/youth) enough to motivate us to re-engage? Must we always wait for a cataclysmic crisis before groups respond with a concerted effort to problem solve?

Project URGE serves your organizations and individuals selflessly. Being a servant is a function of our faith lived out through the example modeled by Jesus Christ. Check out Philippians 2:3-5.

"Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit, but in humility consider others better than yourselves. Each of you should look not only to your own interests, but also to the interests of others. Your attitude should be the same as that of Christ Jesus..."

or the most part, we quietly go about our business. The difficulty that we share with others in the faith community is that, to a large extent we are forced by external forces to conform to the typical hype practiced on a daily basis in order to compete for attention in the media or dollars. We must find data, keep statistics and disseminate information that will help us raise more money and satisfy the grant. There is a constant effort to elevate ones status and validate the work that's being done. Much of this "required" work actually dilutes the more important aspects of the ministry and drains energy from where it is intended to have the greatest impact. In fact, many grants require a process that frustrates and impedes the progress it seeks to promote by demanding a specific profile for reports, unrealistic timetables and a deaf ear to problems that exhaust those involved in the work. This leads to a more antagonistic relationship rather than a productive partnership, stirring an undercurrent that slows progress and sometimes causing waves that capsize the boat altogether. How about a novel idea like having a representative from the grant agency work along side the grant recipient, offering verbal reports to a committee from time to time? This dialogue about elevating ourselves to be considered for a grant or funding could easily take on a chapter or two of its own.

So what's the point? The service of Project URGE is multi-dimensional. But our emphasis is serving other non-profits and cultivating an atmosphere of collaboration. We assist others without money being the prerequisite for the service.

serve

A group of people from our Jacob's Ladder Team offers their services for free, twice a month on Saturday mornings, to help non-profits (mostly Project URGE affiliates) refurbish, maintain or redesign their facilities.

This saves organizations time and money, which can be directed to their programs, rather than costly repairs. This is about sacrificial service. It costs the organization being served nothing, and those providing the work are living out the model of Christ. They often do the work without even as much as a note of thanks.

Another team of servants is our Bread Run team. For years they have been picking up bread and baked goods from Tops Markets and delivering the products to homeless shelters, recovery houses and soup kitchens in the poverty crescent. Again, these folks perform the task on Saturday mornings (some Sundays), driving many miles, at their own expense, serving others with a rare note of thanks. They serve to model Christ.

commit

ach year Project URGE attempts to draw attention to your organization/ministry by organizing the URGEnt Presentation and Tour. Our focus is to break down barriers to volunteering and opening up doors of support for our affiliated organizations. Again, it costs the organization nothing! Every organization benefits to some degree, whether they get introduced to more volunteers, create an awareness of what they do or secure additional funding. How many organizations would present this opportunity without some fee attached? Project URGE lines up volunteer opportunities for groups and individuals throughout the year with many of your organizations.

n addition, we minister to kids in the 14613 and 14621 areas with our Saturday Sonshine Program. Our Prayer Team prays for the organizations and volunteers affiliated with Project URGE, as well as for the numerous activities that surround the work. Our "US" team is a group of urban and suburban youth serving the community while building relationships across denominational and socio-economic lines.

collaborate

The opportunity for collaboration, partnering and sharing of valuable information can be found at our meetings. But didwe wait for money to do all these things? No, we did not. Would financial support help our efforts? Absolutely it would! But you do not wait for money when the house is burning. You do not wait to help others.

A llow me to summarize: The first point: Follow the lead and example of Jesus Christ. Join the efforts of Project URGE! Build relationships, collaborate for better outcomes and extend a hand in love to others. (1 John 3:11)

ow do we show love and concern for those in poverty? Clearly, the answer is not remaining isolated, but by being engaged with one another to meet the challenge.

The second point: Let's work collaboratively to build avenues toward financial support that do not work counterproductive to the desired outcomes. And the second part of this point: There is much that can be done in building collaborative partnerships that will benefit others before a dime crosses the table. Preliminary relationship building will help pave the road.

And lastly, IT IS difficult to tout your success without the appearance of boasting; especially as we compete for dollars and media attention. But in the final analysis, without dedicated people living out their call and being obedient to what the Lord commands, the community would be a very desolate place, void of any hope and prospect of peace.

ronically, between periods of writing this piece I read an article in the August issue of Christianity Today magazine titled, "To Serve Is to Suffer", by Ajith Fernando, a national director of Youth for Christ in Sri Lanka. One portion of the article quotes him saying, "A church that has a wrong understanding of fulfillment for its workers will certainly become sick. This may be one reason why the church contains so much shallowness. We have measured success by the standards of the world and fail to challenge the world with the radically different biblical way to fulfillment."

t is my sincere hope that we can pave new opportunities to secure partnerships and funding. The truth is, as sophisticated and streamlined as some processes have become, they have largely failed to address the underlying challenges adequately.

f you take a moment to read Dr. Wayne "coach" Gordon's bio, you can surmise that he took the road less traveled. It was a road marked with pain, suffering, discouragement and joy. The benefits of commitment and collaboration become obvious in his story. We chose to bring him to Rochester to inspire and learn how a similar effort could be established and realized here. Christian community development is not a myth.

engage

Why bring an "outsider"? Simple, read Mark 6:4. Let us be humbled enough to listen and learn so that similar transformational efforts might take root in our neighborhoods. Let's come together to demonstrate to the community what is happening in our neighborhoods along the poverty crescent. Let's demonstrate a true spirit of collaboration to inspire a renewed sense of hope for a new reality.

A re we ready to model the example of Jesus Christ or are we content to wait for the money to roll in while some neighborhoods crumble beneath the burden of poverty and its manifestations? Are we ready to accept the responsibility of the challenge as readily as the financial package we might receive?

Project URGE has quietly been facing the challenge. We invite you to join many of us around the collaborative fire. The fire will burn out if the sticks aren't touching one another. We feel the stakes are too high to gamble with the lives of families who are hostages in their own neighborhoods. God calls us to pray, plan and persevere together.

For over 30 years of ministry "Coach," as he is affectionately known, has played a key role in numerous community development initiatives. He is one of the founders of the Lawndale Christian Health Center, a healthcare ministry that sees over 120,000 patients per year.

Wayne was the founding president of the Lawndale Christian Development Corporation. The Development Corporation is the arm of Lawndale Community Church that facilitates economic development, education and housing. LCDC has seven different housing ministries and under Wayne's leadership, over 400 units of abandoned housing have been rehabbed. LCDC places special emphasis on home ownership for residents of the community.

One of the major goals of "Coach" has been developing a new generation of leaders for North Lawndale. Over

200 young people have graduated from college with more than half returning to live and

work in North Lawndale.

Wayne Gordon helped to formulate the Christian Community Development Association (CCDA). CCDA is a network of individuals and ministries nationwide who engage in Christian community development efforts. At various times, CCDA has had 600 organizational members and 10,000 individual members. CCDA meets annually to share skills and network together. Over 2000 people attend the national CCDA conferences and the CCDA movement continues to expand.



Wayne authored the inspiring book "Real Hope in Chicago." This book details the power


of God working in a community in need. Wayne has co-authored books and written numerous articles on God's heart for the poor and Christian community development. Lawndale Community Church was given a "Point of Light" award by President George Bush in 1989 and Chicago Magazine named Wayne one of the Chicagoans of the year in 1995 for his commitment and creativity.

Wayne Gordon is a real testimony to the grace of God and the witness of God's call upon a person's life. Wayne possesses the ability to empower people and believes that the heart of Gospel is reconciliation. For more than 30 years of his life he has exemplified breaking down all racial barriers to pave the way for God's truth in the lives of all that he encounters.

Wayne L. Gordon is founding Pastor of Lawndale Community Church and Chairman/President of the <u>Christian Community Development Association</u> (CCDA) and is a graduate of Wheaton College and Northern Baptist Theological Seminary. He received his Doctor of Ministry degree from Eastern Baptist Theological Seminary.

"There is never a simplistic answer to the problems in poor communities. Often, people will say that the problem is spiritual, social or educational. Of course these are problems, but they are only part of the larger problems. Solving the housing problem does not solve the emotional struggles that a person has. Christian Community Development has a wholistic approach to ministry that deals with the spiritual, social, economic, political, cultural, emotional, physical, moral, judicial, educational and familial issues of each person."

Our major project at Community Lutheran (CLM) is a six week Traveling Summer Day camp. This year we had an average of 70 children, ages 3 to 16 participate each day. Highlights were trips to Letchworth State Park, Seabreeze Amusement park, Grimes Glen for hiking, and an on-site carnival. Reading was woven into each day's activities. We were extremely blessed to have a number of churches sponsor camp for a few days or weeks. They organized the devotions, bible lessons, games, crafts, and the snacks. This year our children enjoyed activities at Crosswinds Wesleyan Church and Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in Canandaigua, Willowbrook Community Church in Victor and Assumption Catholic Church in Fairport. Pam Renfro from Fairport United Methodist organized activities for the children at a Fairport park. We were scheduled to go to St. Mary's Catholic Church in Canandaigua, but had to cancel due to a transportation conflict. The major camp expenses are bus transportation and counselors salaries. Costs are covered in a small part from Monroe County DSS and parents; but the majority expenses are paid through donations from individuals and churches. Churches (and individuals), unable to be a host, may sponsor a child for the six weeks (\$750) or donate specifying "Summer Camp". Pinnacle Lutheran Youth group had fundraisers to pay for a child's 6 week camping.

The After School program will start the end of September. This year we will be having a 'Tea Party' each day. Prior to doing homework, we'll have tea and cookies and talk about their school day. Each child will be responsible for their own cup and saucer (no mugs). We are planning on reading 'theme' programs, with children reading about certain topics followed by a trip to reinforce the stories (ex. Reading about space, stars, planets, etc. with a trip to the planetarium). Needed: Tea cups w/ saucers, Volunteers for 1:1 reading.

A "Reading for Tots" program is being planned for October for children 2 and 3 years old and will include age-appropriate stories, games and songs. The children and

parents will meet Saturdays for 1 hour. The objective is cultivate an enjoyment for reading before they start pre-Kdg. Volunteers from local colleges will be helping with this program.

Fall activities at CLM: supporting the Project URGE coat drive (URGEncy Collection) by collecting clean and gently used coats, and hosting the annual Thanksgiving Dinner for community residents on Saturday, November 20th. Churches are being asked to help provide food and volunteers. Last year we had about 450 people join us for a traditional turkey dinner. Our 'claim to fame' is REAL mashed potatoes. Needed: volunteers, contributions for non-food

Immediately after Thanksgiving, work begins for the Christmas activities. Christmas 'wish lists' are gathered and distributed to churches as 'angel tags'. Gifts are purchased and brought to CLM the week before Christmas. The annual Christmas program will be held during the week of


Christmas and will include scripture reading, music & dance by the children and followed by a dinner. **Needed:** monetary contributions for purchase of last-minute gifts and for the Christmas dinner meal.

CLM will again be sponsoring two basket ball teams for youths (boys and girls) ages 10-21. Games will be played in the North Street Gym.

CLM, like many non-profits, is struggling due to a serious lack of funds but we continue to be optimistic. The CLM Board is looking for other sources of income and potential fund-raising activities. Needed: Prayers, and individuals interested in helping with fundraising or being a potential board member.



For what purpose was Project URGE created?

URGE (Urban Revitalization, God Experienced) was founded to respond to two main issues:

1) To build relationships between urban and suburban churches.

There needed to be an opportunity for unity to be built in the "church", outside the walls of our houses of worship.

Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., 1963: "I must admit that I have gone through those moments when I was greatly disappointed with the church and what it has done in this period of social change. We must face the fact that in America, the church is still the most segregated major institution in America. At 11:00 on Sunday morning when we stand and sing and Christ has no east or west, we stand at the most segregated hour in this nation. This is tragic. Nobody of honesty can overlook this. Now, I'm sure that if the church had taken a stronger stand all along, we wouldn't have many of the problems that we have. The first way that the church can repent, the first way that it can move out into the arena of social reform is to remove the yoke of segregation from its own body. Now, I'm not saying that society must sit down and wait on a spiritual and moribund church as we've so often seen. I think it should have started in the church, but since it didn't start in the church, our society needed to move on. The church, itself, will stand under the judgment of God. Now that the mistake of the past has been made, I think that the opportunity of the future is to really go out and to transform American society, and where else is there a better place than in the institution that should serve as the moral guardian of the community.

The institution should preach brotherhood and make it a reality within its own body."

There remains a disconnect between urban (primarily black) and suburban churches (primarily white). Forty years after the civil rights movement, little has been done to build meaningful relationships across these lines. This has provided a mirror image of our segregated society. Latino churches can now be included in the divide.

2) To create a forum for collaboration and partnering with organizations serving the under-resourced.

The disconnect broadens with little collaboration between the organizations that work with the under-resourced. Similarly, we must acknowledge a rather anemic effort by churches to support or partner with these organizations, either financially or with volunteers.

"Connecting and uniting urban, suburban and rural churches, organizations and individuals to work together in breaking down barriers of poverty, race and despair, in the name of Jesus Christ."

Project URGE from the outset began to center on ways that the dividing walls could be deconstructed. The first step was establishing a forum for church members and organizations to interact and exchange information in a non-threatening environment. These gatherings build relationships and offer opportunities for partnerships or collaborations to sprout. Additionally, there are teams of ministries created within Project URGE to purposely engage people from a variety of churches and organizations to serve together in various capacities, which also support our mission. These ministries include:

The Jacob's Ladder Team, which provides renovations, light construction, painting and etc. for non-profit organizations

The Bread Runners, that each Saturday deliver bread and baked goods to homeless

shelters, soup kitchens and churches in the "poverty crescent"

Prayer Team, that prays for initiatives and people serving in Project URGE or our collaborative affiliates

The Saturday Sonshine Program, that provides entertaining, educational and edifying experiences for children (6-16 years)

The URGEnt Presentation and Tour, which gives people a chance to meet representatives and tour the facilities of organizations and ministries in an effort to open opportunities for service or financial support

The Concert of Praise, a combined worship service including music, dance, prayer and guest speakers

US (Urban/Suburban youth) Group volunteering in the community and having time to socialize in fellowship

URGEncy Collection, collecting winter attire and non-perishable foods to be distributed to homeless shelters, soup kitchens and food pantries in Rochester

Sponsoring trainings and providing scholarships to CCDA (Christian Community Development Association) conferences and trainings

Social events like our annual URGE picnic and dinner and more!

Volunteer Coordination, organizing volunteer service days for high schools, colleges, church groups and helping to plug volunteers into appropriate serving opportunities and more!




