His design and shopping philosophy can be summed up like this: "If your mother gave you a teapot, it should sit out. If she didn't, you should get one." We hunted down the best spots to do just that.

VINTAGE The word "vintage" has become so ubiquitous that it can be tough to discern the really good resources. Both by time period, and attitude, we tend to think of this category as less formal and sometimes quirkier than traditional antiques. We have our standby sellers, but also an ever-growing list of new must-shop stores.

ANTIQUIFIED

You know you're in the Northeast Minneapolis Arts District when you spot the distinctly southwestern stone building affectionately referred to by neighbors as the Alamo. This single-owner shop, filled with collectibles, art, and plenty of small treasures, is a trip through American history, and it's one of the only places in town to find black Americana 1519 CENTRAL AVE. DANISH TEAK CLASSICS

MidNorth Mercantile

When antiques dealers aren't at their stores, they're often scouring estate sales for treasures they can turn around and mark up for resale. At an estate sale, everything must go-quickly-so it's often the place to find the best deals on valuable furniture, décor, vintage fashion, and more. Estate sales are like time capsules—the trick is to find the era that fits your style. Because they shop so much, our panel of pros tends to get tipped off when a good sale is coming up. You can be a part of that club, too. "The reality is that if you are a consistent buyer, the people that run the sales will reach out to you," Robb Whittlef says. Here's more expert advice:

① Know your neighborhoods. Go to sales in areas that mirror your taste-Golden Valley for midcentury, Edina for traditional, north Minneapolis for urban vintage. For Downton Abbey fans who desire Edwardian opulence, Whittlef points to Kenwood, Summit Avenue in St. Paul, and Wayzata's Ferndale Road/Fox Street area.

2 Follow estate companies. Dennis Hagen (dennishagenestatesales.com) has been known to conduct sales for some of the more prominent families in town. H&B (handbgallery.com) has a reputation for good sales, and Willmatt Hill (willmatthill. com) is another good resource. Scanning the newspaper for sales is a weekly ritual

for Gwen Leeds, who also subscribes to mailing lists for local auction and estate companies, which notify her when a sale is coming up. At estatesales.net, you can narrow your search by city and view pictures of featured items for sale.

3 Timing is everything. Go early or don't bother. That's generally the strategy of serious shoppers like Denny Kemp. But Whittlef suggests shopping late for big pieces, which sometimes do not sell as quickly as the items that fit in your trunk. As closing time approaches, you might be able to negotiate a lower price.

4 Know the system. At big sales, numbers are handed out to potential buyers an hour before start. But dealers and early-birds adhere to a pre-numbering system that determines the order of the line to get those "official" numbers. The first one to arrive posts the pre-numbers on his or her driver's side window, and takes No. 1. To get in line, find that car, take your number, and return to your car to wait. No driving away. If you leave, you lose your place.

(5) Strategize. Leeds is always on the prowl for vintage fashion, so she heads directly to the bedrooms at an estate sale. Next step: She finds a spot with good lighting where she can give garments a quick but thorough inspection before buying. The thing about estate sales: There are no returns.

ANTIQUES How do you know something's antique? The simple rule is that it's at least a century old. This "100-year rule" appeals to collectors who are searching for pieces from around the world that will hold value and appreciation, rather than

The key is to find a good source and a good dealer who can tell you the story of the piece. Lucky for us, we have plenty of those around here.

Architectural Antiques

SALVAGE Nate Berkus and HGTV's Genevieve Gorder have shopped far and wide, but the star interior designers always return to their hometown for architectural relics. Some of the best salvage resources in the country are located in the Twin Cities. That tin ceiling panel, brass door knob, or old marble column could be the element that adds character to your space, often at a price much lower than it would cost to buy new. Don't be afraid to get your hands dirty-the best stuff isn't always in view.

When NATE was hunting for an antique mantel for his bedroom fireplace, he found it online, from Architectural Antiques in Minneapolis. Berkus says the marble piece, originally from a Summit Avenue mansion, is easily the nicest of the three salvaged mantels in his home, and it cost half as much and the ones he purchased in New York (shipping included).

HGTV host Genevieve Gorder says Architectural Antiques is "hands down, the best salvage store in the country."

ARCHITECTURAL ANTIQUES

The original Twin Cities salvage shop. Come here for bigger, more unusual items, as well as the standard salvage fare.
