Welcome

Greetings CSRF! Thank-you for joining us for the 47th Annual Conference of the Canadian Sex Research Forum, held virtually for the first time. CSRF's aims to be Canada's leading organization fostering sexual science and improving the sexual health and well-being of Canadians. This year, we meet in the midst of two ongoing and life-altering events: a global pandemic and the social justice movement of Black Lives Matter. Both of these events have shone a light on the lived inequities here in Canada, and world-wide.

This year, three of our plenaries will speak to these timely and essential topics as they relate to sex research. On Thursday, Dr. Nicola Doering will present on *Sex, media, and COVID-19*, and Dr. Rinaldo Walcott will present on *Viruses and Black-sex-lives*. On Friday, we will hear from Rahim Thawer, *When curiosity sends the wrong message: Exploring biases in sexuality research, education, and therapy*. Friday will also include a plenary by Dr. Brian Mustanski, *Using science to address the ethical challenges in sexual health research with sexual and gender diverse teens*. I am sure that these presentations will inspire reflection and thoughtful discussion as we grapple with the current and future implications for sex research, and the world we live in.

The pandemic has pushed us to be creative and experiment with our first-ever virtual CSRF meeting. While we will surely miss being together in-person, I hope we can embrace this as an opportunity to explore new ways of sharing our research and interacting with each other. A silver lining is that our carbon footprint will certainly be much smaller this year! One consequence of a virtual event with attendees across our vast country, is that our typical program content was cut in half. Because the CSRF community highly values engagement with the research via questions post-talk, as well as socializing and networking during breaks and the poster sessions, in planning the conference we prioritized interaction as much as possible. For example, the new data blitz format asks attendees to listen to talks before the conference such that the time allotted during the conference can focus on questions and answers with the presenters. In addition, we will be using a new social platform called gather.town, which enables real-time interactions with audio and video for our virtual coffee breaks, a faculty-student networking event, and for our poster sessions. **Please carefully review the instructions provided in this program for setting up Zoom (p. 21), gather.town**

I am especially excited to try the gather.town platform for the poster sessions as I hope it will mimic the look and feel of a live session. In the end, the true mark of a successful conference is the engagement of our attendees, something that CSRF truly excels at. For this reason, I am confident that the CSRF 2020 virtual meeting will be outstanding.

I would like to thank all of the people who helped plan and make this conference possible: presenters who shared their work, the Program Committee who reviewed proposals and guided conference planning, session moderators and presentation judges, the Executive Council for their oversight, and our Executive Director Larry Brockman. I would like to also thank SIECCAN as a sponsor of the student awards.

Finally, with gratitude and respect, I acknowledge that we are holding our meeting on the traditional territories of many different Indigenous peoples across our country, whose historical relationships with the lands and waters continue to this day. I would like to encourage personal, professional, and organizational reflection on our responsibilities for reconciliation with Indigenous peoples and decolonization. We have decided to retain the conference logo designed by Dylan Thomas last year in recognition and honour of our Indigenous heritage.

Thank you for coming to CSRF 2020. I hope you will find the meeting both professionally enriching and socially engaging. This is a special opportunity to learn from one another. Please listen carefully, think critically, and engage in respectful and constructive dialogue!

About the Conference Logo

Artist: Dylan Thomas (http://dylan-thomas.ca)

Logo Description: The logo was centred about three concepts based on the writings of Bill White, Sulalewh/Elder, Coast Salish (Snuneymuxw/Cowichan):

- 1) **Protection/guardianship.** This theme showed up in how the ceremonies (songs, dances, rituals, etc.) offered protection to Salish communities. It showed up in how the husband had to prove that he was capable of being a protector to his potential wife, etc. In the realm of sexuality, there is the obvious parallel of the term "protection," but I wanted to allude more to the idea of *community* and practices of well-being (spiritual practices, self-care, a purposeful life, etc.) can allow us protection, and allow us to explore the gifts of sexuality by avoiding its inherent dangers. So, you will see the Thunderbird circling the human face, forming a protective barrier.
- 2) **Transformation through union.** This alludes to the importance of *relationship* in the realm of sexuality. Whether it be health social circles, healthy families, or just healthy couples, our relationships will help us develop a healthy and safe sexual life. So, in the logo, I have the bodies of two Thunderbirds and one human coming together to form a single complete design.
- 3) **Balance.** I used Bill's description of the Thunderbird bringing transformation and the ceremonies intended to keep/restore balance as the basis for the imagery in the logo. Balance, like all areas of human life, is an important aspect of healthy sexuality. So, in the design, I made the logo perfectly symmetrical to allude to concept of balance.

Overview:

The use of *R* as a data analysis platform is gaining rapid popularity in the social and medical sciences, owing to the *R* ecosystem's open source philosophy and deep community of developers. In this workshop, I aspire to provide you with a scaffolded introduction to the vast universe of *R*, while providing you instruction and resources for conducting reproducible data analyses and creating high-quality data visualizations. 
Asking questions






- E. To interact, move your avatar to the area of your interest by pressing your arrow keys. You must be close to an object or person of interest to interact. **If you would like to** "locate" someone quickly to meet up, see instructions under the faculty-student networking event (p. 24 of the program).
- F. Explore different spaces by moving your avatar into the **Poster Rooms** (at the top of the map) using the arrow keys on your keyboard. **Please make note of the EVEN and ODD numbered poster rooms**.

As your avatar moves by the various poster tables you will see a preview of the top of each poster, if you are in range. You can test out how far this range goes by moving your avatar closer and further from the poster table with your arrow keys.

During the conference, once you see a preview of a poster you'd like to view, press the "x" key on your keyboard. You do not have to be directly in front of the poster to view it. As long as you can see a preview of the poster, you are close enough in range to view the entire thing (by pressing the "x" key). You will then see the full poster and can zoom in or out to view the preferred size. *Click and drag to scroll when zoomed in*. You will also be able to see, hear and interact with the poster presenter (standing beside their poster table) through video and audio.


Instructions for Data Blitz Breakout Sessions






Click on the faculty member you are meeting with. Select the "locate" function to find your first faculty/student meeting.
