Teacher's Pet: Dogs and Kids Learning Together


BOTH ENDS

OUR Fide. Teacher's Pet works with at-risk teens and adolescents who have shown interest in being in our program. Currently, we work with youth from the following facilities:

- Kingsley Montgomery School in Waterford, MI
- Macomb County Juvenile Justice Center in Mt. Clemens, MI



- Angelic Tails in Oxford, MI

- Macomb County Animal Shelter in Mt. Clemens, MI
- Oakland Pet Adoption Center in Auburn Hills, MI

OUR Program. While duration and content of our program may vary slightly based on the youth we are working with, each session is generally divided into two segments.

- Classroom. Students spend time learning about humane education, dog behavior, dog body language/communication and responsible animal care.
- Training. Each student is paired with a shelter dog for the duration of the program and trains his/her dog in basic obedience using only positive training methods.

It took a few days of patience and slow movements, but eventually [M] was able to sit in a chair and Duke came up to greet him. Victory! What an amazing 5 weeks!:)



He is entrusted to walk dogs that need special handling and works to enrich the lives of all the dogs awaiting their forever home.









Alkight Michigan ENOUGH IS ENOUGH

With one of the coldest and snowiest Michigan winters still lingering around, you better believe that your dog is going just as stir crazy as you are! Quick trips outside to go to the bathroom just aren't cutting it, and you may be starting to see a change in your dog's behavior. Here are a few of our favorite tips to keep your beloved dog happy and healthy during this sub-zero season!

Play Indoors! There are safe, easy and non-destructive ways to fulfill your dog's needs to exercise, play, interact and use their mind without a tennis ball in the park.

- Tug-Of-War. While some may believe this form of play to teach the dog poor behaviors or even, gasp, cause aggression, if done correctly can actually provide a great form of mental and physical exercise. Be sure your dog knows the 'release' command to ensure it is a game and not a challenge.
- Hide-And-Seek. Our favorite! First practice 'sit' and 'stay' commands with your dog. Once mastered, have your dog sit and stay while toys, treats or even people are hidden around the house. 'Release' your dog and let them find all of the hidden objects or people! You will be amazed at how long this game can go on and what a great form of mental and physical exercise this provides.

Doggil Day Cake. If your dog is dog social and you have the funds to spare, indoor play centers or doggie day care facilities provide a safe, warm environment for you dog to exercise all day while enhancing their dog socialization skills..

GROWING. A bath or a brushing session is a great way to break up the monotony of a day spent indoors. Done with love and care, grooming can provide affection and relaxation, and provide olfactory enrichment via aromatic shampoos.

Obedience Training. What better of a time to practice focus, sit, stay, leave it, coming when called, etc? Not only will this have your pup in prime form for leash walking season, it is also a great mental exercise and bonding opportunity. Add in the 'stay' command while increasing distance, and voila, we've added physical exercise when he/she is released to come to you! Oh, and don't forget the treats!

Interactive Puzzle Toys. Never underestimate the importance of mental stimulation/exercise. These toys commonly involve an incentive (treat) for mastering a challenge, and can provide hours of fun while improving cognitive function. Such toys are gaining in availability and popularity, and can be found at your local pet supply store!

Outdook Exercise. While braving the elements multiple times a day for bathroom purposes, a few minutes of additional exercise is simply a matter of preparation and staying warm. Jackets and neck warmers help to hold in body heat while booties keep paws safe, dry and warm. Always monitor your dog's behavior and head indoors immediately if you notice signs of pain or stress


