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Dear Librarian or Educator,

I'm the author of the new board book for young children in glasses, "Glasses," and a librarian at Carleton College in Northfield, MN.

"Glasses" is a book targeted at babies, toddlers, and preschoolers who need glasses. The book features photos of young children in glasses playing, exploring, and enjoying their world. The text is a simple poem that celebrates the role of glasses in a young child's life. The purpose of this book is to help children who need glasses, and their families, feel less alone and more comfortable with glasses. The book can also help other children learn more about why some people need to wear glasses. I wrote the book based on my experiences as a mother of a young toddler who needed glasses, and from the stories I've heard from hundreds of other parents who have shared their stories at my website, Little Four Eyes (<http://littlefoureyes.com>). There are very few other books about glasses targeted at this age group.

While young children in glasses are not common (about 1% of preschoolers wear glasses), vision issues in children that age are not rare. Around 1 in 20 preschoolers have vision issues that would be improved with glasses according to the Baltimore Pediatric Eye Disease Study¹. Vision issues that are not treated, can lead to more permanent vision loss and are associated with difficulty reading and other academic difficulties. Despite that, there is not a lot of awareness or support for families of young children with vision problems. For parents who learn their young child needs glasses, it can be overwhelming, upsetting, and difficult to find good information. And children who need glasses can have a hard time understanding why they need glasses, and why their friends and families do not.

If you know families who have children with vision issues, I hope they will find my book to be a fun and helpful way to become more comfortable with their glasses. I have also included a short list of resources that can help parents understand more about children's vision issues.
