Growing Through STEM

STEM, an acronym for science, technology, engineering and math, has become a buzzword in education circles, and with good reason. STEM careers are growing by 17%, while other occupations are growing by 9%.

TRIO Upward Bound's December after school study labs focused on hands-on STEM activities like physics, creating 3D geometric shapes and coding. Brian led the charge of learning and teaching Scratch, a coding language for gamers, to the students. Using a basic template built by Brian, students then coded to add characters, buildings and geographic landmarks.

Catherine brought STEM to the sessions with an entertaining lesson on physics, focusing on surface area and air pressure. Students were provided with containers of various sizes filled with water and ping-pong balls in the mouth of the container. When the students slowly turned the containers upside-down, over Brian's head, students were able to see how the ping-pong ball suctions to the bottle, creating a barrier for the water.

As a student, Brooke is enjoying the independence and personal responsibility college provides. "When I do well on an exam or assignment, it's because of the work I put into it," says Brooke. Her hard work shows. Brooke made the Dean's list for the fall 2017 semester in the 3.5-3.99 range.

Brooke says that the most valuable support TRIO Upward Bound gave her was assistance with scholarship applications. "Before turning in an essay for a scholarship, I would have 1-2 one-on-one meetings with a TRIO UB staff member to revise and discuss each application. These meetings are a big part of why I received the scholarships that I did."


Yes, You Khan!

If you mention the SAT to an eleventh grade student, the likely response is one of dread. No student wants to take a four-hour test, much less one that has a heavy value when it comes to college admission and financial aid.

TRIO Talent Search has been working with our partnered school systems to help students utilize the best resource for SAT preparation, Khan Academy. Khan Academy was created by Salman Khan in 2008 with the purpose of providing free education resources to students anywhere in the world. In 2016, Khan collaborated with College Board, who owns the SAT, to create the best SAT preparation tool there is.

What makes Khan Academy the leading SAT tool? Khan offers students personalized preparation based on their PSAT scores or practice tests. They provide tutorial videos, practice problems and additional assistance to help the student understand the concept.





Stay on track and continue your progress. Start now with your free, personalized recommendations waiting for you on khanacademy.org/sat.

They break down scores based on skill sets, and provide the student a list of areas they should improve on before the SAT test date. Each area is assigned a color: red, yellow or green. Green signifies college readiness for that skill. Yellow indicates the student is close to college readiness, but still needs to strengthen the skill. Finally, a skill in red signifies a need to improve this skill. TRIO TS advisors suggest students start with their red level skill and work on them until they are yellow. After they have increased all scores to the yellow-level, students should then continue to work as many skill sets into the green area as possible.

In addition to free tutorials and practice options, Khan Academy can also create a personalized practice schedule. Khan uses the amount of days until the test date and the amount of skills that need improving to create a calendar that is easy to follow.

TRIO Talent Search advisors have been busy assisting students with their SAT preparation. Through hands-on workshops, students in sixteen Western UP schools have connected their PSAT scores to their new Khan Academy accounts, and started preparing for their upcoming SAT.
