## LCDR David Hull, NSCC Deputy Director

LCDR David Hull joined the U.S. Naval Sea Cadet Corps in 1994 and attained the rank of chief petty officer at Marathon Division in Buzzard's Bay, Massachusetts. He stayed in service throughout college and graduate school, holding numerous billets in Marathon Division and Freedom Division. He served as the commanding officer of Freedom Division in Canton, Massachusetts from 2002 to 2005. Hull held various posts on Regional Staff for Region 1-2 from 2005 to 2007 and worked for the NSCC Internet Development Group from 2007 to 2011. In June 2011, he was appointed Regional Director of Region 1-3, covering Vermont, New Hampshire, and northeastern Massachusetts.



Hull has served on staff at 48 Sea Cadet trainings, including 38 as commanding officer. He created the POLA, JAG, MAA, and EMS trainings that have run at Naval Station Newport since 2002, and took over Recruit Training Command New England in 2014.

Hull is a recipient of the Chairman's Medal, the Fred D. Carl Regional Director of the Year Award, 11 Distinguished Service ribbons, nine Meritorious Recognition ribbons, and numerous other NSCC and NLCC awards.

Hull earned bachelor's and master's degrees in Criminal Justice from Northeastern University, a master's in Education from Boston College, and a law degree from Boston College Law School. During his schooling, he worked or interned for many criminal justice agencies, including the Barnstable, Massachusetts Police Department, the Boston Field Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and the U.S. Attorney's Office for the District of Massachusetts. After serving as New England's Director of Graduate Programs for The Princeton Review for several years, he pursued further graduate studies in Criminology and Criminal Justice at the University of Maryland. For the past seven years, he has worked as a professor of Criminal Justice at Saint Anselm College in Manchester, New Hampshire.

In June 2016, Hull will join the NHQ staff as deputy director. He and his wife Stephanie, a nurse practitioner, are expecting their first child and plan to reside in Manassas, Virginia.
