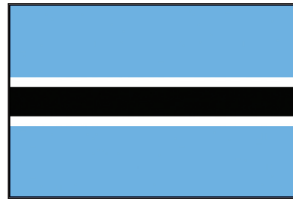

GEOGRAPHY & POPULATION

Located in south-central Africa, Botswana is a landlocked country, bordering Namibia, South Africa and Zimbabwe. The terrain is a semi-arid plateau with its lowest point at 500 m above sea level. With the Kalahari desert in the southwest and the huge marshland of the Okavango Delta in the northwest, the population is concentrated in the eastern part of the country.

- Under 15 years: 39.2%
- Growth rate: -0.89%

- Area: 600 000 km² (slightly smaller than Alberta)

- Languages: English (official), Setswana

- Religions: Indigenous beliefs: 50%
Christian: 50%

Botswana is a parliamentary republic, gaining independence from Britain on September 30, 1966. A major concern for the country, along with high unemployment, is a high prevalence of AIDS with an estimated 350 000 people living with HIV / AIDS in Botswana as of 2003.

BACKGROUND OF ASSEMBLY WORK

There are currently 6 assemblies in Botswana – as underlined on the map above. The names of Robert Moffat and David Livingstone are closely linked with the introduction of the gospel to the region. F. S. Arnot, an early assembly missionary pioneer, traveled through the area in 1882 and befriended the famous Christian chief, Khama the Great. Jim and Irene Legge from Scotland were the first assembly missionaries to settle in Botswana and since 1969 they have laboured in the village of Serowe. Clark and Hazel Logan from Northern Ireland arrived in 1982. Since 1984 they have been based in the capital, Gaborone. Currently, there are 7 commended couples and 1 sister from overseas serving the Lord in the country: Jim & Irene Legge (1969), Clark & Hazel Logan (1982), Joy Griffiths (1990), Sid & Karen Halsband (1991), Colin & Christine Raggett (1992), John & Margaret Rutter (1994), John & Onty Bandy (1999), David & Helen McKillen (2005).

GEOGRAPHY & POPULATION

By far the largest and most populous country in South America, Brazil occupies the northeastern part of the continent, bordering all but two of the remaining nations (Chile and Ecuador). Its diverse topography ranges from the Amazon basin of the northwest to the highlands of the southeast. A mainly tropical climate produces high humidity for most of the country.

BACKGROUND OF ASSEMBLY WORK

Assembly work commenced in 1950 when Mr. and Mrs. John McCann Sr. came to the state of Rio Grande do Sul, having arrived elsewhere in Brazil in 1948. They were joined by Harry Wilson in 1952 and the first very small assembly was formed in Osorio in 1955. Today, there are 17 assemblies spread across the state and another just across the border to the north. In 2004, Mrs. McCann went home to be with the Lord, while Mr. McCann is cared for in the “Faith House” home for the aged in Belfast, N. Ireland. In 1987, two missionaries who laboured in this state were taken home quite suddenly within 6 days of each other. These were Mr. Wilfred Glenn, who arrived in Brazil in 1970, and Mr. Sam Curran who had come to the work in 1958. Both had seen assemblies formed through their labours. Presently, there are 9 couples all commended from assemblies in N. Ireland along with three national workers involved in the work in the state.

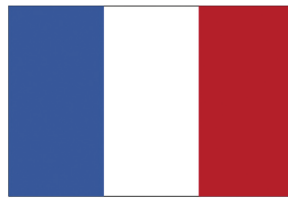

GEOGRAPHY & POPULATION

Located in western Europe, France extends from the Mediterranean to the North sea and from the Rhine river to the Atlantic ocean. Plains and rolling hills cover the north and west of the country while mountains are found in the south (Pyrenees) and the east (Alps). Most of France enjoys cool winters and mild summers though along the Mediterranean, the winters are mild and the summers hot.

Venezuela is a federal republic, gaining independence from Spain on July 5, 1811. Venezuela emerged from the collapse of Gran Colombia in 1830. Governments have been democratically elected since 1959.

Unemployment: 17%
Inflation: 31.2%
Minimum wage: \$160 / month

Major exports: petroleum, bauxite and aluminum, steel, chemicals, agricultural products, basic manufactures



BACKGROUND OF ASSEMBLY WORK

France opened up as a missionary field after World War II in the late 1940s when missionaries were starting to be commended from Britain to their “next door neighbour”. As years went on, some missionaries also arrived from Switzerland mainly to the eastern part of France and interest grew from the West as well. Ernest Green was commended from Britain in 1961 and then in 1962 from British Columbia with his wife after their marriage. They laboured in the northeast of France for over forty years until 2003 when they moved to the Montreal area. Denis O’Hare was commended from Portsmouth, England in 1967. After some years in the Paris region and in Normandy, they moved to the south of France near to the town of Perpignon, where there is an assembly today. The O’Hare’s labour mainly in this district but also make visits to Morocco, North Africa twice a year to give help to Arab saints and in the gospel a little as well, though the severe restrictions of this Moslem land make it difficult. There is also a magazine ministry in which a quarterly magazine called “La Sentinelle” is sent out to different French-speaking countries. Some of the difficulties in assembly work in France include the absence of spiritual initiative among men (i.e. males), the influence of traditional religion upon even non-practising members and materialism in a very prosperous country.

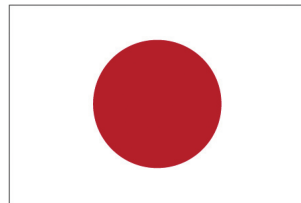
Please pray for:

- gospel tent work among villages around Perpignon – the O’Hare’s have held about 40 series of tent meetings in recent years
- Arab saints experiencing persecution in Morocco – some have been imprisoned for their faith
- the need for exercised workers in France – there are many missionaries but little conviction about separation from denominations and respect for New Testament order in the gatherings

GEOGRAPHY & POPULATION

Located in eastern Asia, Japan is a chain of islands east of the Korean peninsula. About 73% of the country is mountainous. Major cities sit on every sizable plain so hills and mountainsides are often cultivated up to the summit. The climate varies from cool temperate in the north to subtropical in the south. Because Japan sits on the edge of the "Ring of Fire" between the Pacific and Eurasian faults, it is subject to frequent seismic and volcanic activity.

Wooded marshes and swamps can be found in the north and northwest but the country consists mainly of fertile plains and plateaus. The Carpathian mountains line Ukraine's western border.

BACKGROUND OF ASSEMBLY WORK

It was in the fall of 1994 that a young 19 year-old believer Sergei Poroknavets came to live in Norway. As a result of meeting notices on the front window of Timothy & Rhoda Sloan’s home he knocked at the door. He was a total stranger to them just as they were to him. From that day forward the Sloan’s sought to teach him the truth of scripture regarding gathering to the Lord’s name. He returned to Ukraine in the summer of 1996 and his brother-in-law came to Norway for one year in 1998. Again the Sloan’s taught him scriptural principles as to gathering to the Lord’s name and he returned to Ukraine in 1999. It was not until the fall of 2001 that the Sloan’s were told that a number of believers in the town of Lutsk had the desire to be obedient to scripture and gather to the Lord’s name. It was at this time that they heard about the exercise of our sister Flo Kancir from Canada who along with a few others made her first visit to L’viv in 1995. Flo, along with others, has made a yearly visit to this city and it has pleased the Lord to bless her labours and today a few have been saved and baptized and whenever they can, they remember the Lord in the assembly in Lutsk.

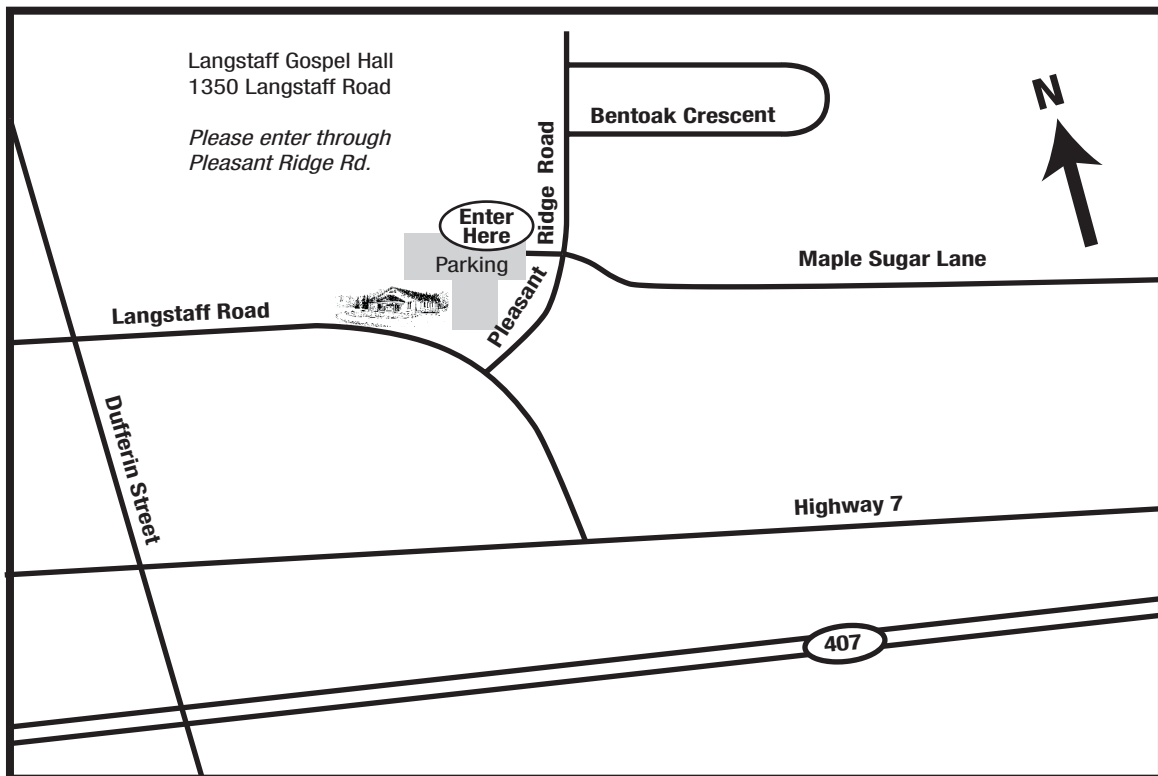
