NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR

2020 is the 50th anniversary of Earth Day. It is an opportunity for us all to reflect on how much has been accomplished and how much further we have to go in restoring our relationship with the Earth. At our Severson Dells breakfast this past fall, I contemplated how far we have come and what we need now. Below you will find an excerpt from my remarks that speaks to where we are at today.

Now more than ever, it is imperative that people have a connection with and understanding of nature. We have difficult decisions ahead about how humans interact with the world around us. The call has grown louder for action, not words, when it comes to climate change policy. Youth are standing up and demanding that world leaders take action. We need to do our part to make sure that everyone understands the science and local impacts of climate change so they can begin to do their part to be good environmental stewards. But we also must help people develop a personal connection to the land. Baba Dioum's frequently cited quote is increasingly relevant: "In the end, we will conserve only what we love; we will love only what we understand, and we will understand only what we are taught."

I invite you to take a minute and think about your roots and your connection with nature. Where did it start and with whom? What have you done lately to reconnect your roots with nature?

How can we inspire a connection to nature so people can deepen their roots and get to know a place like they would get to know a person? What questions would they wish to ask of the land, the flora and fauna, if they could? How do we introduce people to the place so they can start their own conversations with the land and develop their own environmental ethic?

While we will never know the true lasting impact of our work, we do see parents bringing their children out to Severson Dells because that's what they

did with their parents or grandparents as a child. Their roots are nurtured by a shared love of nature within their families.

Our mission to connect people to nature through education and research is at the heart of everything we do. Beyond nurturing a relationship with nature, we desire to improve science literacy in our community. With the difficult societal decisions ahead, we are in urgent need of an electorate that understands the process of science to be informed consumers and citizens.

While it is easy to become overwhelmed and paralyzed by the challenges we face as a global community, it is those deep roots we established to the places we love that sustain us through the difficult work ahead. Our love for nature and the next generation inspires us to take action for the world we are leaving them. Hope is created through action and love. Therefore, I encourage you to take the time to reconnect with nature, whether at Severson Dells or your own backyard, and dream of the future that you want to leave our children and grandchildren: healthy creeks they can wade in to catch crayfish, expanses of golden prairie for

them to run through, and deep green forests for them to fall in love with just as you have.

Let us make 2020 a year of connection with and restoration of nature!



radicals in our bodies. At Severson Dells we embrace anything that helps people reconnect with the Earth, but sometimes going barefoot isn't practical. The good news is that simple leather moccasins allow us to have the same benefits - no insulating rubberized soles stand between you and the Earth. Come spend a day with us making your own Ojibwe-style pucker-toed moccasins that can aid you on your Grounding journey.

This class builds on what we learned in December about solstices and equinoxes. We will explore the trails looking for signs of spring and compare what we find to older records of these spring events (phenology).


Pond Life | Thursday, April 16



These wildlife observations can be used by researchers and land managers to help with conservation efforts. Severson Dells is partnering with organizations from Winnebago, Boone, DeKalb, Stephenson, and Ogle counties to engage as many

We have planted a butterfly garden and have captured and released lighting bugs. We have watched a chrysalis erupt into a butterfly. We have seen ants that we don't want to "smash" climb up and down a tree in the back yard. Thank you M.K. for allowing us to care for one of your praying mantids and watching the kids having no fear of it, even allowing it to crawl on their arms (one of the girls anyway). We experienced death of that same creature (it didn't get squished), had a burial service, and discussed what was happening. What an honor, what a privilege, what a joy it is to be in the lives of these young kids. I often wonder who really is getting the best of this deal. I know it is me and I think how lucky I am now, but also, how lucky I was to work at Severson Dells for almost thirty years and to be with thousands of kids; what an impact WE had on each other's lives. MATURAL HISTORY BOOKS MORTH A READ

FIRELINES

I was at a friend's house, and he had a copy of Firelines by Jill Metcoff, University of New Mexico Press, on his coffee table. While he was getting some wine, I began to flip through the pages of her book. I was hooked. I had to have this book. When he came back, we sat and talked about prairie burns. He has a forty-acre prairie divided into two sections, and he burns one section every year. I used to help him quite often. Those days are over, but I still love the excitement of a burn and I learned to appreciate the science and knowledge that goes into doing it just right. I also value the skill, training, equipment and even the clothes that are all necessary for a safe and successful burn.

I also learned a bit about the history of our corner of the world, northwest Illinois and southwest Wisconsin.

Native Americans burned prairies long before the Europeans came.

The book is, yes, an oversized beautiful coffee table book. It is a work of art. It's just not a collection of random pictures of burns, but a carefully laid-out series of photographs which reinforce each other to tell a compelling story. I tried to count the photos I especially liked and lost track.

Metcoff must have spent hours in the field to get these great shots, but she must have also spent hours interviewing friends in the field. She also pulled from her memory great quotes by John Muir, Aldo Leopold and eighteen others. Some of the quotes are memorable in their own right, and others add another layer of understanding to the whole process of prairie restoration.

It's a bit disconcerting to spend more than one afternoon this past month enjoying these pictures and then watching the horrific pictures from California. Perhaps if more people had known and learned about the relatively new phenomenon of prairie restoration these fires would not have been so destructive.

Then there is the completely unexpected: a series of four pictures of Mound Man, discovered by Europeans in 1859. John Muir's explanation for the absolute need for fire paints a complete picture of what happens to a prairie without fire to protect it: "Had there been no fires, these fine prairies, so marked a feature of the country, would have been covered by the heaviest forest."

Metcoff has a keen eye. In the midst of one fire she photographs an old piece of abandoned farm equipment. The title "Obsolete" says it all.

One surprise: the pictures are all black and white. My immediate reaction was "Say what?

Fire is all bright red, flaming orange, bright scarlet, dark black smoke and then pure white smoke. Black and white will never work." But after two pictures you'll never notice, and after three or four pictures you'll be hooked.

Scattered throughout the book are pictures of trees. The photos would be beautiful anyplace; the

trees themselves are wonderful. The book concludes with a chapter on burns; be sure to read it- it's richly informative. And be sure to share the book and this short essay with your burn team's newbies. Oh, and I love that a picture of a burn team shows four women and one man.

My favorite picture? I simply can't choose. But play the game. After you've read the book and closely looked at all the pictures, go back and try to choose your favorite. You'll end up looking at all of them again and then seeing all the pictures in a whole new light. And you'll never choose.
