The Maine Redevelopment Land Bank Authority was established in 2022 and the wheels are in motion to get the Authority up and running at the State level. There are many activities that municipalities can begin now, to help prepare for their own local land banks. This workshop will focus discussion of land banking as a means to prepare sites for redevelopment, evaluation of cost and benefit, and sources of funding. Participants will look at real sites and will learn skills to practice land banking in Maine. This is a hands-on workshop and a web browser is required.

TOUR: SPINNING MILL REDEVELOPMENT

Tour will depart from front entrnace of the Newspaper Building, 185 Water Street

Join us for a tour of the Spinning Mill, which last year was the vacant undeveloped site of last year's Build Maine conference. Work has begun to transform this old mill into a mill of apartments, lodging, and a location for Bigelow Brewery. Learn about the financing assembled to pull off this project and generate significant value for downtown Skowhegan. Also learn about the other challenges faced during the process

TOUR: BICYCLE TOUR OF SKOWHEGAN DOWNTOWN + RIVER TRAIL

Tour will depart from the Riverside lot behind 151 Water Street, Skowhegan

Join us for a bike ride around Skowhegan on a route envisioned as a key commuting and recreational network for residents and visitors of all ages and abilities. Help test this idea of a "Neighborhood Byway" and provide feedback on the route, which includes a mix of low traffic neighborhood streets and unpaved trails. The ride will take participants to key destinations including the downtown, historic residential areas, and dramatic river crossings over the Kennebec on Skowhegan's famed pedestrian bridges. Bring your own bike, or take your chances on the limited supply of bikes we will have available.

TOUR: MAINE GRAINS GRISTMILL TOUR

Meet at Miller's Table at Maine Grains for lunch. Tour will depart from there.

Maine Grains is housed in the historic former Somerset County Jail building, which is also the home of the Miller's Table Café, Crooked Face Creamery, Happyknits yarn shop, WXNZ community radio & the weekly Skowhegan Farmer's Market. The mill has been an engine of entrepreneurship and resides in the heart of historic downtown Skowhegan. During the tour you will learn about the unique history of Maine Grains, the process of transforming a jail into a mill, how stone milled flour is made and what they are hoping to accomplish in the years to come.

TOUR: TACTICAL URBANISM IN ACTION

Tour will depart from front entrance of The SPACE, 181 Water Steet

Join the Bicycle Coalition of Maine and MaineDOT for a walking tour to observe and learn about new quick-build traffic calming installations - all put in place by workshop participants the day before the conference. See the power of inexpensive materials - such as paint, bollards, and planters - and observe how these surgical street improvements can slow traffic and improve the experience of walking around the village. A speed gun will be on hand to measure vehicle speeds.

HOUSING WORKSHOP: DESIGNING NEIGHBORHOODS, NOT HOUSING PODS The SPACE, 181 Water Steet

A workshop for engineers, municipal officials, developers, and housing advocates to learn the basics of designing neighborhoods, including how to set up flexible blocks, lot dimensions that work for a range of buliding types, and techniques for accomodating parking in a way that creates curb appeal and great walkable places that people want to live. Also learn strategies for how to lead with urban deisgn, supported by engineering, including a deep dive into an efficient work flow between these two professions in order to prepare high quality plans and permit documents.



PUBLIC SPACE WORKSHOP: MAKING YOUR OWN POP-UP PUBLIC SPACES Newspaper Building, 185 Water Street
