
If you'd like to have your church picture updated, please meet in the Memorial Garden after Worship.

MEMBERS GET UPDATE, PROVIDE INPUT ON LANDSCAPE PLAN

A second meeting to exchange updated information and ideas regarding the proposed campus landscape plan was held July 20 following Church services and afforded the Congregation a further opportunity for input since the initial meeting in May.

The Council has hired Logan Simpson Design Landscape Architects to come up with recommendations of ways to make the campus more attractive, accessible and welcoming as well as more efficient to maintain. [Click here to see the idea boards.]

There was considerable discussion about the fairly immediate need to replace the irrigation system that was installed more than 40 years ago. While there was a desire expressed for more shade and seating on campus, the viability of adding and maintaining 40 trees as proposed by Logan Simpson was questioned.

Creation of a larger shaded plaza between the Sanctuary and Fellowship Hall as a welcoming and gathering place would be the focus of the plan.

Other elements include upgrading the playground area for the Pre-School, settling on a drop-off area, and the possibility of incorporating desert landscaping and relocating the air conditioning equipment from the north side of the Sanctuary.

Buildings & Grounds chair John Schneeman acknowledged that there are other elements on campus (such as the Sanctuary roof) that need attention and that any landscaping improvements would be integrated as part of a master plan. The project will be discussed at the Council's August retreat and that an overall campus repair and improvement plan, including cost estimates, will begin to take shape that can be presented to the Congregation in the early Fall.

MODERATOR'S MUSINGS: MY SUMMER VACATION

I just returned from a once-in-a-lifetime vacation, a safari to South Africa and Botswana. We rode in open jeeps with guides, and it was amazing how many animals that we were able to see and how close we were able to get to dangerous predators.

We learned about the wonderful eco system and all of the animals' roles in keeping a delicate balance. Nothing is wasted in this eco system.

Sadly, there are problems in this eco system, and the major ones are all human caused.

For example, in one area there were too many elephants causing a lot of destruction to the vegetation. The problem was that some of the safari camps had dammed up the delta to keep sufficient water there year round so that the animals would stay and the camps could remain open to tourists. The problem is that by keeping water around and enticing these migrating animals to stay, the vegetation was not getting a break from the animals and having a chance for regrowth. Other problems were caused by poachers.

This one-year old white rhino is lucky to be alive because his mother was killed by poachers. You

can see from the multiple scars on his sides and stomach that he has survived attacks by lions — attacks which never would have occurred if his mother were alive.



In thinking about the problems that humans cause in the African safari and elsewhere, I reflected on Pastor Patti's current sermon series on 10 Rules for Life. Pastor Patti reminds us that these rules are not just about being good Christians but good citizens. When we think about all of the damage that humans have done to the environment, is it an example of violating the "Respect God" rule? God directed us to be caretakers of the earth. Have we decided that we'll hunt or wear the fur of endangered species, or drive a gas-guzzling car because doing so makes us feel special? Is having a trophy head on the mantel or trophy car in the garage an example of paying homage to ourselves?

If we really put God first, would we make different choices?

SOUTHWEST CONFERENCE INTERDEPENDENCE ARTICLE

(An EPIC Initiative)

At Church of the Good Shepherd in Albuquerque, we recently participated in a youth pilgrimage. Our young adults, twelve through seventeen, made a trip, for the second year, to a sister church in the Southwest Conference, "Iglesia Congregacional la Trinidad," in El Paso, Texas. We returned with a new sense of connectedness, compassion, inspiration and respect for our family at Iglesia Congregacional and for our calling to be the hands and feet of Christ in the world- to do justice, love mercy, and walk humbly with God (Micah 6:8).

Our pilgrimage included repairing homes, attending community activities, and capturing historical knowledge in a documentary about the church, Saul Sustaita and the Chicano civil rights movement.

We saw, first hand, and processed in group discussions, the results of discrimination, racism, and profiling that still exist in our world. We also talked about how helping with more mundane things, like repairing a house, can take the burden and worry off of peoples shoulders so that they can focus energy and time on doing more for their families or the work of the church.

We learned from Saul Sustaita that the church was, and still is, a center for the Chamisal (border) community. In the 1960s, Iglesia Congregacion was a meeting place for the "Brown Berets" who were Chicano civil rights leaders. At one point during the height of the Chicano civil rights movement, Saul recalled during our videotaping, the city of El Paso condemned the solid rock church building for having a crack in the wall (and making too much noise about equal rights for all) and bulldozed it to the ground. The United Church of Christ rebuilt it!

Iglesia Congregacional is still commited to "justice for all". It may not be a headliner church in our Southwest Conference — not number one in tithes or membership numbers — but this small and mighty church will always hold a special place in the hearts and minds of our youth. They experienced first- hand how one small effort toward justice can have a ripple effect - that we can all make a difference no matter how big or small we are - and that leaning on each other is a great way to make it all work.



A UCC Confirmation Experience for 7th-9th Graders

Shepherd of the Hills UCC and Scottsdale Congregational UCC will be combining efforts to offer a joint Confirmation program, consisting of three Friday-Saturday retreats during the 2014-15 school year.

Stories of Faith Retreat:



WOOLGATHERING 10 RULES FOR LIFE: SUMMER SERMON SERIES

Throughout the summer months, we're using our time in Worship to focus on the "10 Rules for Life" (aka the Ten Commandments).

Stephen Prothero, author of "Religious Literacy: What Every American Needs to Know - and Doesn't" makes the point that a working knowledge of religion in America is imperative not just for people of faith (regardless of their religion of choice), but that it's imperative for every American. After all, so much of our nation's history has been influenced by the Bible and its practitioners.

To that end, we're focusing on the Decalogue (a fancy way of saying "Ten Words") and the Decalogue's relevance in the 21st Century. While we're spending a bit more time looking at the Decalogue as found in Exodus 20:1-21, we're also looking at it from the perspective of Deuteronomy 5:1-22 (the differences are small, but significant).

The Commandments can be divided into two categories. The first set deals with our relationship to/with God. The second set deals with our relationships with one another.

So far we've looked at four of the ten rules.

We began the first Sunday in July with **The Rule** of Reflection (*I, the Lord, am your God; you shall not have other gods before me*) where we were reminded to reflect on our priorities, on where we've created idols, and where God fits into the grand scheme of things.

From there we looked at **The Rule of Respect** (You shall not take the name of the Lord, your God, in vain) where we were reminded that this rule is about way more than cursing. It's about taking the power of God's name and using it unwisely (such as when we presume that God is on our side rather than us seeking to be on God's side).

Next came **The Rule to Remember the Rest** (*Remember to keep holy the Sabbath day*) where we found that the focus of this commandment in Exodus is on remembering that creation requires recreation; at that Deuteronomy's focus is on justice as the Sabbath is for *everyone* (and that the Sabbath means everyone is equal – if only for one day a week). Not only is this the only commandment that offers guidance in the ways of Worship, this commandment is the first known appearance of the concept of Sabbath in *any* culture. This is also one

of two "bridge commandments" – meaning that they apply both to our relationship with God and to our relationship with each other.

On the last Sunday in July, our focus shifted from the first set of commandments to the second set of commandments as we focused on **The Rule of Caring** (*Honor your father and your mother*). We were reminded that this rule extends beyond blood relations (think of how Ruth and Naomi took care of each other) and to any family created by love. We also were reminded that "honoring one's parent" is not the same as "obeying one's parent". This is a rule about caring for the generations (and not about being a travel agent for guilt trips).

This Sunday, we'll shift a bit more from the "Do's" – the positively worded commandments to the "Don'ts".

First up is **The Rule of Life** (*You shall not kill*).

In subsequent weeks we'll also look at **The Rule** of Commitment (You shall not commit adultery); The Rule of Sharing (You shall not steal); The Rule of Speech (You shall not bear false witness); The Rule of Self-Control (You shall not covet your neighbor's partner); and The Rule of Assurance (You shall not covet your neighbor's belongings).

Our series will conclude by looking back at the first and second rules of love (so stay tuned!).

For further reading, check out Joan Chittister's book, "The Ten Commandments: Laws of the Heart" (whose influence may be found in the naming of the "rules" during this sermon series).

OLDEST UCC CHURCH IN HAWAII



Bill Hadley, our *Shepherd Life* editor-emeritus, has become our roving ambassador, visiting UCC churches hither and yon.

In July, he attended Wai'oli Hui'ia Church in Hanalei on the north shore of the Hawaiian island of Kauai. Established in 1834 by

missionaries, it is believed to be the oldest UCC church in Hawaii. The Sanctuary seats about 100, and half of the service is conducted in Hawaiian, a language that originally came from Polynesia. The original church was a pole and thatch meetinghouse. The current shingled building was constructed in the American Gothic style in 1912 and has a belfry tower that houses a mission bell acquired in 1843.
