REDEEMER FELLOWSHIP

Overview

Until you see the evil of sin and the end of sin, your faith will be weak and your view of God will be small.

Discussion Questions

- 1. Pastor Joe described sin in many ways, including: rejecting God, daring God to do something, despising God's ways, and desiring the death of God. How is sin each of these?
- 2. In what ways has our own view of sin (namely, your own) fallen short? Which of the above ways do you tend to gravitate towards? A challenging question to ask ourselves is: "Do I hate my sin not only for what it does and where it leads but ultimately for what it is?"
- 3. In order to understand how sin is truly satanic, hash out how sin:
 - 1. Follows Satan's example
 - 2. Submits to Satan's plan
 - 3. Earns Satan's fate
- 4. While a proper understanding of sin is crucial, we also must have a proper understanding of the end of sin. (See: Hebrews 2:14-15, Colossians 2:13-15, 1 John 3:8). Why must we also understand this truth? What does the "end" of sin mean (and not mean) for us as Christians?
- 5. Why will our faith be weak and our view of God small (see overview above) if we do not see the evil of sin and end of sin?
- 6. Recap the "four things if you see the evil of sin and the end of sin." [you will run to Jesus every day; you will be moved to repentance; you will be compelled to sing; you will be encouraged to speak]. As a group, pray together that we will be a people who see the evil and end of sin and thus have lives characterized by these four things.
