INTRODUCING CAP LT COL JUDY HEWETT



Lt Col Judy Hewett, who answers to the name “Admin,” is the cog in the wheel here at NESAs. It’s time you got to know a little bit more about this lovely person.

Raised in Mountainside, New Jersey, she is the third of five girls born to June and Ray Fulshaw. June was the homemaker, while Ray worked as a ship’s captain. Lt Col Hewett proudly tells of her father’s background as a Merchant Marine cadet during World War II. Indeed, that is the only service branch that lost cadets during that war, she informs this interviewer. At the close of the war, each merchant ship needed to have a U.S. Naval officer in charge, so he joined the Navy Reserve as an officer in order to fulfill that requirement.

After her sophomore year of high school, Judy’s family moved to Grosse Pointe Park, Michigan. She graduated from Grosse Pointe South High School in 1970 and matriculated at Michigan State University in East Lansing. After one year of college, however, her adventurous spirit got the best of her. “When I was a kid, I always wanted to ride on the back of a motorcycle.” She headed to North Carolina and fulfilled that dream, joining a local motorcycle club.

Yearning to be near family again, Lt Col Hewett moved back to Lansing and worked in the accounting department of a utility company. While taking an Introduction to Electronics course at Lansing Community College, she met her future husband, Jim Hewett. An electrical engineer, he was the instructor of the course! “We got married on Memorial Day in May 1981 and moved to Boulder, Colorado. Jim worked for the “Bombs and Bullets” division of Honeywell, while Judy worked in the computer industry. Five years later, Jim’s job took them to Darmstadt, West Germany. Judy continued to work at in the computer industry until the birth of her first son, Jonathan, in August 1987. “I became a homemaker after Jonathan was born. Two years later, in July 1989, Jim was transferred to Switzerland.” The family moved back to Littleton, Colorado in March 1991.

Bethany Hewett was born in November 1992. For those who have been here at NESAs for some time, she is well known as a GSAR Basic student, (2006), then Basic team leader (2007-2011), and as NESAs’s Public Affairs Officer (PAO) in 2013.

In August 1993, the family moved to Elizabethton, Tennessee so that Jim could attend seminary. Their third child, Rebekah, was born there in October 1994 and was diagnosed with Trisomy 21 (Down’s Syndrome). Several years later, Jim decided to leave the seminary and returned to his electrical engineering career in 1997. Now employed by Raytheon, he was transferred to Tucson, Arizona in 1998. There, he was part of a team that worked on the Advanced Medium-Range Air-to-Air Missile (AMRAAM).

The family moved again in 2000, this time to the town of Oneonta in up state New York. Jim retired in 2007. Shortly after, Lt Col Hewett began to volunteer at the Pathfinder Village School. Her

daughter Rebekah is a day student at this facility that serves as a residential community for people with Down's syndrome. As of 2009, Judy is employed as a full time classroom aid.

When her son Jonathan joined the Binghamton Cadet Squadron in 2000, Lt Col Hewett decided to join as well. She served as the Administration and Personnel Officer for two years. In December 2002, the squadron relocated and Judy became the Commander of Oneonta Cadet Squadron. She served as Professional Development Officer for New York's South Central Group from June 2008 until October 2010. From there, she advanced to the position of New York Wing's Drug Demand Reduction (DDR) Administrator. As of October 2013, she also serves as an Assistant to the Director of Operations of CAP's Northeast Region.

Lt Col Hewett home-educated her three children, the older two through high school, and Rebekah until she started at Pathfinder Village. Now that she has some free time, Judy enjoys reading the Holy Bible, historical fiction, and Clive Cussler's adventure novels. She knits and sews, and has been known to carry her sewing machine in her automobile. This has come in handy here at NESAs more than once!

The stork delivered a baby to daughter Bethany on February 23, 2014. Granddaughter Adrian Julianna Craig-Hewett, the first grandchild, is the joy of Jim and Judy's life. ICSS COMMANDANT CAP LT COL LARRY MANGUM



Incident Command serves as the leadership behind CAP's air and ground search and rescue as well as its disaster relief missions. It coordinates the mission and assigns the tasks that are necessary for a safe and effective operation. In essence, ground teams do not get deployed and aircraft do not get launched without Incident Command and their staff.

This is Lt Col Larry Mangum's sixth year at NESAs and his first year as ICSS Commandant. Let's take the time to find out about this interesting gentleman.

Born and raised in Bay City, Texas, Lt Col Mangum is the third of seven children. "My parents got divorced when I was a young child, so I was essentially raised by a single mom. She worked in a variety of jobs, from a family-owned restaurant to a packing plant and then a cannery. I can remember when we lived on thirty-five dollars per week," states Lt Col Mangum.

Upon graduation from Bay City High School in 1976, Larry enlisted in the United States Air Force. Stationed at Hill Air Force Base in Utah as a member of the 388th Tactical Fighter Wing, he worked on laser, radar, infrared, and optical guidance systems for air-to-ground and air-to-air missiles. "We were the first unit to get the F-16. I was there for the naming ceremony. You know, the official name is the F-16 Fighting Falcon, but the pilots nicknamed it the Viper." He was honorably discharged in 1980 at the grade of Sergeant.

From 1980-1982, Lt Col Mangum worked in field service for an oil company based out of Denver, Colorado. His primary job was to repair the electronics on seismic graph equipment. He matriculated at Columbia Christian College in Portland, Oregon in 1982, majoring in computer science and Biblical studies. As part of his studies, he learned to speak Modern Hebrew and to read ancient Konia Greek.

Upon graduation in 1986, Larry first worked for British-based Standard Telephone and Cable in Oregon as a process engineer. In 1991, he moved to Colorado and worked in the life support systems division of Siemens Medical Solutions USA. "On the side, I wrote a program to track medical device incidents for the FDA. I was transferred to Danvers, Massachusetts in 1993 and remained with the company until 1995." After working at American Student Assistance, a student loan guarantor in Boston from 1995 to 1999, Larry went to work for Data Base Systems in Seattle (1999-2001), then for Microsoft based in Redmond, Washington.

"In 2006, I decided that I needed a life. According to my wife, I never had a day off. I just had reduced hour days on the weekends. So I took a job at Mobilisa, a defense contractor based in Port Townshend, Washington. I worked in their secure ID department until 2008." The family moved to the

San Diego area for several years, then finally settled in the town of Chelsea just outside of Birmingham, Alabama in 2010. Larry works for Ebsco Industries, a privately-owned publishing business.

Lt Col Mangum joined Beverly Composite Squadron in January 1996, following in the footsteps of his daughter Annie. He held the duty positions of Administration, Communications, Emergency Services, and Leadership Officer simultaneously. From 1998 to late 1999, he served as Assistant Supply Officer for the Massachusetts Wing. When the family moved to Washington state, Larry served in the follow duty positions: Deputy Wing Director of Communications (late 1999 to 2000), Wing Director of Emergency Services (2000-2003), Pacific Region Director of Information Technology (2003-2005), Washington Wing Chief of Staff ((2005-2008), and Pacific Region Deputy Chief of Staff for Emergency Services (2008-2010). Since 2010, Lt Col Mangum is the Commander of 117th Air National Guard Composite Squadron located in Birmingham, Alabama.

“I met [CAP] Col Jean Desmarais in 1997 during a joint Massachusetts/Rhode Island SAR evaluation in 1997. His son, [CAP Lt Col] John Desmarais and I had talked over the phone for years.” He came to NESAs for the first time in 2009, serving as safety officer and staff member for ICSS [Incident Command Staff School].” He served as an ICSS instructor in 2010, as the lead instructor for Advanced ICSS in 2011, and as the school’s Deputy Commandant in 2012 and 2013. This year is his first as ICSS Commandant.

On a personal note, Lt Col Mangum has two children by his first marriage, Annie (32) and Samuel (30). Both are former CAP cadets. He married Paula on June 18 2004, and became stepfather to six children, all of whom are members of CAP! Stepson Benjamin Shea is a C/Colonel. He attended NESAs in 2009. Stepdaughter Naomi Shea has been at NESAs from 2010 to the present. She was a Basic GSAR team leader during Session I, and will be a student in the Ground Team Leader School Session II.

Larry enjoys reading a host of genres, from political science to history to science fiction and novels “of any kind.” He loves attending symphony performances. Photography is a hobby, and Lt Col Mangum also enjoys theater productions. To celebrate ten years of marriage, this June he and his wife explored Rome, Florence, Venice, Lucerne, Paris, and London.

Oh, and let’s not forget to mention Lt Col Mangum’s first grandson, Sebastian. He is a cute little guy, full of mischief and a joy to behold. Congratulations!

CAP Maj Joe Long brings a wealth of experience to NESAS's Mission Air School, providing the capacity to offer a new and exciting course curriculum. Let's get to know this interesting man: husband, father, pilot, police officer, and a member first of the United States Air Force, then Air National Guard, and now Air Force Reserve.

Lt Col Long was born and raised in Chicago, Illinois. He is the second of four children born to Dave and Mary Lou. His father was a firefighter, while his mother was an office worker. The family did spend two years in Arizona, and Joe graduated from Arcadia High School in Phoenix in 1981. He then spent one year at Phoenix Institute of Technology studying architectural drafting and design.

Joe worked for a civil engineering firm for four years. He decided to switch career paths and joined the United States Air Force in 1986. Stationed at KI Sawyer Air Force Base (AFB) on the upper peninsula of Michigan, he became a Boeing KC-135 Stratotanker boom operator. "I had always loved aviation, but that's when the bug hit me! Every now and then, they let me drive. I attained my private pilot's license in 1993," states Maj Long. He is now an instrument-rated certified flight instructor (CFI).

After four years active duty, then Sergeant Long joined the 126th Air Refueling Wing of the Illinois Air National Guard based in Chicago. Nine years later, in 1999, the base was moving out of the area. Upon the advice of one of his Guard unit's Lieutenant Colonels, he became a CAP-USAF representative from 1999 to 2001. "That is when I began to learn about Civil Air Patrol firsthand."

Joe joined the United States Air Force Reserves in 2001. Assigned to the Office of Special Investigation based out of Andrews Air Force Base in Maryland, Special Agent (SA) Long works in the Chicago area.

Did I forget to mention another area of expertise for this gentleman? You see, he is also a Sergeant in the Chicago Police Department, with 17 years of experience under his belt.

CAP Capt Long joined Chicago's Palwaukee Composite Squadron in 2002, serving first as a Mission Pilot and then taking on the additional duty of Operations Officer. He became the Deputy Commander of Group 22 from 2007 to 2010, then moved up to Wing staff, serving as its Standards Evaluation Officer. Since 2012, he has served as the Wing's Director of Operations.

CAP COLONEL JEAN DESMARAIS NESA's CHIEF OF STAFF



Being Chief of Staff at CAP's National Emergency Services Academy is no easy task. Each staff member arrives with his or her own expectations. Usually, things run smoothly, but sometimes there are differences of opinion. That is when the "Wisdom of Solomon" comes into play, finding the best solution for the issue at hand.

Colonel Jean Desmarais has been NESA's Chief of Staff since 2012. His son, Lt Col John Desmarais, founded NESA in 1996 and is the academy's Provost. His wife Ruth serves on NESA's administrative staff. The purpose of this article is to provide a biographical sketch of this wonderful man.

Born in Woonsocket, Rhode Island in May 1949, Jean was the youngest of five children. He spoke only French until he was six years old, as both parents were of French Canadian origin. His father worked in Woonsocket's Florence Dye Works as boss of a dyeing crew, as his expertise was coming up with formulas to dye wool and cotton. Col Desmarais is very proud of his older siblings as well, so I will give you a small swatch of information about each in chronological order. Clovis was named after the first king of France. He spent eight years in the U.S. Naval Reserve. Pauline, after dating and

socializing like other young adults, "had the calling," per Jean. She joined the Presentation of Mary Order as a nun and was renamed Sister Marie Claire. Sister Marie Claire served as a teacher in parochial schools in Maine and Massachusetts. Albert had a difficult delivery and was intellectually challenged. He was mechanically inclined and was a gifted watch repairman. Arthur served in the U.S. Army National Guard for 26 years.

Col Desmarais attended parochial schools throughout his formative years and graduated from high school at Woonsocket's Mount St. Charles Academy in 1967. He matriculated at Providence College in Rhode Island with the intention of becoming a teacher, but had to leave due to his father's illness.

"My first full time job was at Tupperware Industries. I worked there for four years, and then took a job at the Providence Gas Company in 1972. I had a varied career, starting in the computer department as a machine operator. I advanced to managerial positions, first in the Customer Accounting Department and then as Manager of Gas Supply." He retired after 38 years.

Ruth Connealy accepted Jean's proposal of marriage, and they wed in May 1972. Their only child, John, was born in Woonsocket in 1973. The family moved to rural Pascoag, Rhode Island two years later. A homemaker until John was nine years old, Ruth then worked part-time first as a nurse's aid, then full time in clerical services. The couple has been married 42 years!

Along with a full time job, Jean became interested in firefighting. It started innocently enough when he heard about an opening for a Fire District Tax Assessor for Pascoag's Hose Company #1. He became part of a team of three who served as tax assessors for the all-volunteer Pascoag Fire Department. "One guy [on the team] worked as Captain of the snorkel truck as well as a firefighter. His #2 man on the job was a fireman as well as a tax assessor. When the alarm went off, they'd leave and I'd be left alone at the station to do the tax assessing by myself. It was very frustrating," states Col Desmarais. By 1978, Jean was immersed in firefighting training in Pascoag. Noting that there were more rescues than fire events, he went on to earn his EMT certification in 1981. Col Desmarais rose through the ranks, becoming Rescue Captain for the Pascoag Fire Department. He retired in 1992.

Following in his son's footsteps, Jean joined Rhode Island Wing's 102nd Composite Squadron in 1991. He served in a variety of roles at the squadron level: Emergency Services Officer, Senior Training Officer, Deputy Squadron Commander, and then Squadron Commander (1994-1996). Over that same time frame, he was on Rhode Island's Wing staff serving in a variety of roles: Senior Training Officer, Professional Development Officer and as Vice Commander at the same time as acting squadron commander! Col Desmarais was Rhode Island Wing's commander from 1996 to 2000. Then he went on to serve as Northeast Region's Emergency Services Officer for a brief time.

"I wanted to step back and help my son, John, with his NESA Curriculum Project. I had helped out at the Miller School in Virginia in 1996 to 1997 and wanted to see the program grow. I was Commandant of NESA's Mission Base Staff School here in Indiana in 2003 and 2004."

Ruth and Jean sold their home in Pascoag in 2009 and moved to East Montgomery, Alabama. "Our grandchildren, Will (11) and Wade (9) and their parents live six miles away, which is just perfect!" exclaims Jean. The couple volunteers part-time at CAP's National Headquarters. Col Desmarais is a National Operations Center (NOC) Augmentee and serves on the Operations staff. Ruth works in Safety and assists as needed at NHQ. He and his wife also assemble camera kits for airborne photography and will soon be assembling GIIEP kits for disaster relief photography in conjunction with the U.S. Air National Guard.

Col Desmarais and his wife, first and foremost, enjoy spending time with their grandchildren. They also enjoy traveling. Jean loves music of all types (he played the piano for sixteen years). He loves to read a variety of literature from mysteries to techno-thrillers and science fiction. An outdoorsman, he enjoys fishing and hunting. Here at NESA this summer, he has proven himself to be an accomplished chef. Most importantly for this author, he is an avid Boston Red Sox fan!

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH OF BASIC LEAD

CAP MAJ SCOTT MURPHY



CAP Maj Scott Murphy, alias “Basic Lead,” has been Basic Ground Search and Rescue (GSAR) Lead here at NESA since 2012. Prior to that, he served as a medic (2006), Basic GSAR Field Training Advisor (FTA) in 2008, and Training Officer from 2009 to 2011. He is a fixture here at Camp Atterbury.

Scott was born in Mount Auburn Hospital, Cambridge, Massachusetts in December 1978. At age four, the family moved to Miami and then three years later settled in Hopkins, Minnesota. “My mother worked hard

to keep my younger sister and I in our home after my parents divorced. She sold advertising for hotel guides and at one time worked for a catering company. She now lives in Fort Lauderdale [Florida],” states Scott.

After graduating from Hopkins High School in 1997, Scott worked at WCCO TV station, a CBS affiliate. Indeed, he was then the youngest employee of CBS. One year later, he matriculated at St. Cloud State University with the intention of studying television production. The school was not a good fit, so Scott consulted with his high school guidance counselor. “He advised me to look at Columbia College in Chicago for TV production, so I went to look at the school. I really liked it, and moved to Chicago in September 1999. I stayed at the college for three semesters but was struggling with the non-vocational aspects of college. I was already an EMT and decided to work towards paramedic certification. That was completed in 2002. I worked for Superior Ambulance Company that held 9-1-1 contracts for the Southside [of Chicago]. I delivered four babies, and cried each time. I was a paramedic for five years.”

Maj Murphy set up a profile on Monster.com advertising his Final Cut Pro editorial skills while living in Chicago. Apple™ was opening a retail store in Chicago and called Scott in for an interview. He was hired by Apple full-time in 2003 and soon was traveling across the nation as well as to Great Britain and Japan to open up retail stores. One year later, in October 2004, he left the company and joined his friend’s creative technologies consulting firm as a business partner. “I am risk adverse, and this was a huge decision for me.”

Three and one-half years later, in 2008, Scott sold his half of the business back to his partner and began work as the Director of Technology at a post-production company. The Jerry Springer and Steve Wilkos shows were among this agency’s clients. In September 2011, Maj Murphy moved to the “Big Apple” and has worked for various advertising agencies since that time. “I live on the Upper West Side and can see Lincoln Center out my window. I live close to the NYC Ballet, Julliard School of Music, and the Met [Metropolitan Opera].”

In regards to his CAP career, Scott joined Viking Composite Squadron near Hopkins, Minnesota in February 1996. He competed in two National Color Guard competitions and his unit won one at Maxwell Air Force Base. He left CAP in 1998, but rejoined Midway Composite Squadron in Chicago in March 2005, serving at its Deputy Commander of Cadets. He transferred to Palwauckee Composite Squadron in Illinois in 2007, a unit that was founded in 1942. Then, in 2010, Maj Murphy founded the Chicago Composite Squadron. The squadron works in partnership with Air Force Academy High School. "This is the only high school in the country that is affiliated with the [United States] Air Force Academy." Upon moving to NYC in 2011, Maj Murphy joined the CAP NESA NHQ Squadron.

Hurricane Katrina struck the Gulf Coast in August 2005 with devastating consequences. Maj Murphy participated in relief efforts based out of Stennis Airport in Mississippi. "We did well-being checks, going house-to-house to make sure that people had essential items such as food, clean water, and medications."


