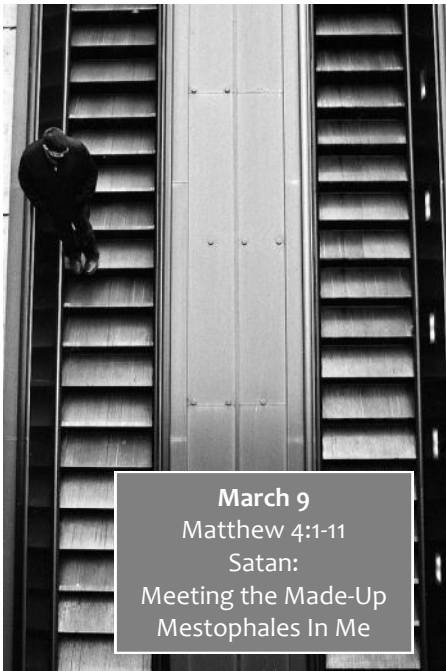
What if we met those people on the Metro?

What if Satan, the Samaritan woman, Lazarus and these others were standing next to us during rush hour?

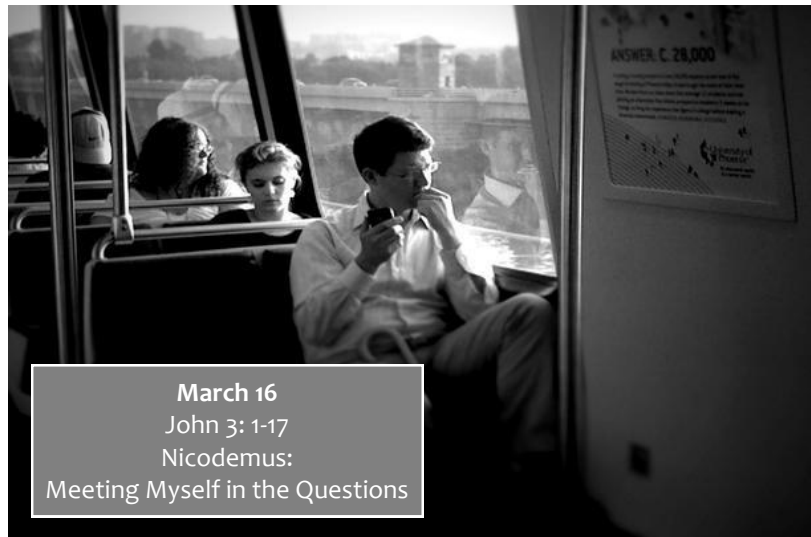
What if we met them, and they are us?

Thoughts from the Senior Minister: Seven Weeks to Be Uncomfortable



Foot-washing! I can hear you squirm or giggle or roll your eyes just reading the word. Foot-washing? Ugh!

As part of the Last Supper experience described in the gospels, Jesus offered three ideas to his friends -- Celebrate communion to remember his presence. Love one another as a sign of their faith. Wash each other's feet as a symbol of service.

We're okay with two of those. We celebrate communion regularly and we love one another (or we try to). But foot-washing? We're not so good with that.

Let's be honest. Feet are icky, intimate, maybe even a tad gross. I think Jesus knew that. I think that's why he encouraged that act. It requires intimacy and vulnerability and a little bit of dirt. Being a Christian does not take place in a self-sufficient vacuum. Being a Christian takes place in community and requires sacrifice.

So, we are going to wash each other's feet. Gulp!

And you have seven weeks to be uncomfortable about that.

Foot-washing is traditionally associated with Maundy Thursday (the Last Supper experience before Easter).

On Maundy Thursday, members of the French Protestant Church and the German Lutheran Church will join us for a meal at 7 PM and a service at 8 PM. As part of the service, we will wash each other's feet.

The ministers of those churches and I have met. We agree, foot-washing is not the tradition of any of our congregations. We will all feel equally uncomfortable.

So, be warned. On April 17, you will be invited to take off your shoes in church and have someone wash your feet. No one will be required to do this, of course. And the washing won't be very thorough—a small portion of water will be dropped into your feet and wiped gently with a towel. The act is more symbolic than full-scale pedicure. More details will follow.

As March opens, we enter into the season of Lent. Lent is about giving up, fasting, praying more, being more charitable. You could even say that Lent is designed to make us uncomfortable. So be prepared to be intimate, vulnerable, even a little icky. That's what Christianity is about.

A blessed Lenten-tide to us all.

May we be increasingly uncomfortable.

Thoughts from the Associate Minister for Education

I’ll admit, I love reading advice columns. I’m always curious to read about the paths people have trouble navigating, and how advice columnists attempt to guide them out. Recently, I was shocked to read a letter from the mother of a blended family with two teenage sons; one black (10 years old) and one white (12 years old). She was writing for some advice on how to talk to her children about the deaths of Trayvon Martin and Jordan Davis, and the conversations about our justice system that have risen out of their highly publicized court cases. I remember the writer saying that she had read a lot about what these cases mean for black youth, but that she felt strange not having seen much about what these cases mean, if anything, for white youth. Her question to the advice columnist was, “Do my sons need to hear different things or is there a universal message?”

“Well,” I remember thinking, “this is certainly a doozy for someone who typically just helps people survive family functions with their in-laws!” Her advice however was courageous and provided many readers with a useful start to an intimidating conversation.

The advice columnist encouraged parents to talk with their children while they themselves are still processing the repercussions of these events. Children understand

complexity more than we often give them credit for, and will get a lot out of parents walking with them through the various layers of complexity in these cases. Interestingly enough, the one thing she emphasized that parents not do, is preach colorblindness. That’s right. There may be a temptation to minimize the role race played in these cases and in the reaction to it, but doing so in talks with our children undermines the larger significance of these cases.

I share this with you all to remind us of the tremendous opportunities for spiritual growth that can spring forth from having the “tough talks” with our children. It is wholly important to plant seeds of peace into the lives of our children by discussing this incident honestly. No one said that parenting would be easy, but there are some things that all children need to know, starting with a simple explanation of what happened and where it fits into American history.

As I was trying to decide between two spring musicals this year for our children and youth, I was describing them to a couple of parents at different times. They liked "The Land of the Lost and Found" (which is the one we are doing), because they thought that the storyline was relevant and something that the children could relate to. The musical is about a student's first day at a brand new school and he is feeling scared, insecure, and lost. Morris, the new student, finds a life size bible in a classroom and discovers the parables of the Lost Coin, the Lost Sheep, and the Prodigal Son.

Although finding a bible, especially a life size bible, in school is highly unlikely, I believe that we all can relate a little bit to Morris. Whether it's the first day of a new job, a new school year with all new classmates, or walking up to someone we don't know at church, it's common to feel nervous or scared. Taking a step outside of your comfort zone takes courage.

Personally, I think it is healthy to take risks and dive into new adventures, realizing that mistakes may happen and that it's okay. Many of our children may be stepping outside of their comfort zone by participating in this musical. Many feel shy to sing a solo or project their voices in front of a full congregation. Maybe they feel reluctant to try out for the baseball team or go to the board to complete a math problem at school. The key is to remember that no matter where you are or what you are doing, Jesus is your compass who will point you in the right direction when you are lost or feeling scared.

Thoughts from the Director of Music

I crave the season of Lent. Although at first it may seem strange for someone to crave for the season that reminds us of the darkest days of Jesus' ministry on earth, for musicians at the service of the church it is not strange at all. Lent is the season that contains some of the most beautiful, powerful, and deeply moving works in the repertoire. Just think of all the great Requiem masses that have been written by composers such as Victoria, Mozart, Berlioz, Brahms, Verdi, Fauré, and Duruflé! In addition to these and other magnificent Requiems we have such moving works as "Lux Aeterna" by Morten Lauridsen or motets such as "Ave Verum Corpus" by Mozart that year after year enrich our experience of this particular season.

At Westmoreland we will kick off Lent with a very special Ash Wednesday Service which is presented in collaboration with the French Protestant Church of Washington and the German Lutheran Church of Washington. At this service, to be held at Westmoreland on March 5 at 7:00pm, we will be singing three beautiful and moving works: "Cantique de Jean Racine" by Gabriel Fauré, "Shaffe in mir, Gott, ein rein Herz" by Johannes Brahms, and "At the River" by Aaron Copland. This event is open to the entire community and all are welcome to sing with us. We will meet on Sunday, March 2 from 12 to 1:30PM for a short rehearsal in the choir room of Westmoreland and on Wednesday, March 5 at 6:15PM in the sanctuary for a quick warmup prior to the service.

One element in particular that will enhance our Lenten season this year is our special presentation of the Lenten portion of Handel's "Messiah" (as part of our complete Messiah project) which will take place on Saturday, March 8 at 7PM. Containing some of the most powerful choruses, not only in "Messiah," but also in the history of choral writing, this special presentation is sure to prepare your soul for what I believe to be one of the most meaningful seasons of the church year.
