

John's answers also apply to us.

asking might seem so simple. He was calling people to live God's holiness in their everyday lives. He was not asking them to do anything extraordinary. He did not look for something spectacular from them. Instead, he calls them to do the basic things in their lives very well. John says:

"If you have more than you need, share with those who are in need." "Do not cheat at what you do." "Do not extort someone." "Do not lie about another

person." "Be content with your wages." The answers John gives do not require heroic effort. The answers he offers just call the people to enjoy what life has given them and to treat each other with kindness. What John is explaining to the people is that their lives are already a gift from God. If they can appreciate what is a part of their lives, and show basic respect to

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To prepare for God's presence in our lives, we do not need to perform some extraordinary action. To invite God more deeply into our hearts, we need not make a huge sacrifice. Instead, we find ourselves invited to be kind and caring to people around us. We are reminded to live a life by the

basic moral code God has given us. And, we are exhorted to be aware of all the blessings that our lives do have, so we find peace in such love from God. If we cannot appreciate all the blessings we do have, we will find ourselves grasping for more. We will feel unfulfilled even if we already have so much more than many people. We will not be open to helping others because we will feel as if we are lacking in our lives.

This week, let us ask God in our prayer,

"Lord, what can I do?"

# Third Sunday of Advent

Zep 3:14-18a | Phil 4:4-7 | Lk 3:10-18

### GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

Although spontaneous outbursts of joy are not part of our liturgy, today's readings alert us that we have much reason to rejoice. Even in times of anxiety, we can rely on the words of St. Paul, who writes that we can rest assured that "the peace of God that surpasses all understanding will guard [our] hearts and minds in Christ Jesus." As we prepare for his coming during this Advent season, we don't need to leap out of our pews and make a show of our praise (but go for it, if that's your style!). However, in our hearts and in our prayer, we can follow the psalmist's lead and "cry out with joy and gladness: for among you is the great and Holy One of Israel." We can praise God in many ways, through fervent prayer, simple acts of kindness and, as John the Baptist did so well, sharing the Good News.

### **GO EVANGELIZE**

### PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

"What should we do?" The crowds asked John the Baptist a deceptively simple question many of us wrestle with today. How do we prepare for Christ's coming? How should we spend the next hour, the day, the next year, the next five? John the Baptist answers without reservation: Share what you have. Don't be greedy. Do not falsely accuse others. In other words, get it together! The Lord is coming. Advent is a wonderful time to do just that, and St. Paul reminds us that we don't have to know all the answers. "The Lord is near," he writes, "Have no anxiety at all, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, make your requests known to God." Last week, the readings encouraged us to discern what is truly valuable in our lives as Christians. Today's readings encourage us to ask the Lord: "What should we do?" Just as John the Baptist showed the people how to prepare for Christ's coming, the Lord shows us how to live out and share our faith through the Scriptures and in the silence of prayer.

**ACTIONS** Remember the last time you felt unadulterated joy? For me it was when my son smacked a game-winning goal at a hockey game. As we move through Advent, we can reawaken a sense of childlike joy as we prepare to celebrate Christ among us. As you light the Advent candle, take time to share with one another something that gave you joy within the past week.

### Queen of Mercy, watch over us

Often, we seek guidance, wondering like those around John the Baptist: What should we do? The answer's a simple one: show mercy. Our adversaries, family members, and we ourselves may be in need of such compassion. When La Virgen Morena (the Brown Virgin) appeared to Juan Diego in Mexico and left her image on his cactus-fiber cloak, her promise of mercy to all who appealed to her was sealed on the Americas. Our Lady of Guadalupe, now patroness of Mexico and empress of the Americas, extends her reign across two continents and around the globe. Respond with mercy today.

### Monday, Dec 13, 2021

MEMORIAL OF LUCY, MARTYR

### I can see clearly now

In these darkening days of December, the Scandinavian festival of light held on Saint Lucy's feast day is a cheerful sight to brighten spirits. In these countries—and wherever Scandinavians are found—girls dress as Lucy in long white gowns with wreaths of candles on their heads, carrying sweets in procession as songs are sung. Similar practices can be found in Italy and Croatia. Whether you belong to those ethnicities or not, why not incorporate the festival into your family holiday traditions? Saint Lucy is the patron and protector of eyesight—ask her to help you focus yours, to see more clearly the coming of the radiant king.

TODAY'S READINGS: Numbers 24:2-7, 15-17a; Matthew 21:23-27 (187). "By what authority are you doing these things? And who gave you this authority?"

MEMORIAL OF JOHN OF THE CROSS, PRIEST, DOCTOR OF THE CHURCH

### Carried by love

Saint John of the Cross was named a doctor of the church for his profound, poetic writings on Christian mysticism. As a spiritual phenomenon, mysticism is difficult to explain. Central ideas, though, connect love and suffering. Today, pause to remember the tragic school shooting at Sandy Hook Elementary and contemplate this meditation by John and remember to love: "I saw the river over which every soul must pass to reach the kingdom of heaven, and the name of that river was suffering. And I saw a boat which carries souls across the river, and the name of that boat was love."

TODAY'S READINGS: Zephaniah 3:1-2, 9-13; Matthew 21:28-32 (188). "Then will I remove from your midst the proud braggarts, and you shall no longer exalt yourself."

### Wednesday, Dec 15, 2021

ADVENT WEEKDAY

### Jesus, our justice and our peace

The coming of Jesus into the world was ultimately the coming of true justice and peace. In today's psalm, these two virtues are said to have "kissed" when the Messiah arrived on Earth. What an incredible image! Every promise of God finds its yes in the One who frees us from sin and death. In the gospel reading, Jesus proves by his miraculous love that he is the long-hoped-for Messiah. Today, remember that as we anticipate Christmas, the

fulfillment of all our hopes and dreams is the justice and peace of Jesus. Perhaps not what we expected, but what we need!

TODAY'S READINGS: Isaiah 45:6c-8, 18, 21c-25; Luke 7:18b-23 (189). "Kindness and truth shall meet; justice and peace shall kiss. Truth shall spring out of the earth, and justice shall look down from heaven."

### **Thursday, Dec 16, 2021**

ADVENT WEEKDAY

### **Differently blessed**

Today's first reading refers to an idea repeated many times in the Bible: that children are a blessing from God. Catholic teaching on situations where bearing children is not possible is not the inverse, however. The church has never taught that infertility or any other limitation is a punishment or "curse" from God. To the contrary, Catholic tradition emphasizes that persons in every situation or condition deserve our full attention, respect, and caring concern. How can you practice empathy toward those whose family life has taken a less common direction?

TODAY'S READINGS: Isaiah 54:1-10; Luke 7:24-30 (190). "Among those born of women, no one is greater than John; yet the least in the Kingdom of God is greater than he."

### Friday, Dec 17, 2021

ADVENT WEEKDAY (O WISDOM)

### Make the wise choice

Today the church begins to sing the O Antiphons to accompany the Advent evening prayer of Mary's Magnificat. These short, sung phrases remind us of our need for salvation and our desire to embody the divine characteristics of our Savior. Today we pray for knowledge. This is not the knowledge that wins arguments around the dinner table, but the knowledge that shines a light on who we are, where we came from, and what we are called to do. It is the knowledge that comes with discernment and brings us peace. May wisdom be our teacher.

TODAY'S READINGS: Genesis 49:2, 8-10; Matthew 1:1-17 (193). "O Wisdom of our God Most High, guiding creation with power and love: come to teach us the path of knowledge!"

ADVENT WEEKDAY (O SACRED LORD)


### Walk each other home

The theme for this year's International Migrants Day is "Reimagining Human Mobility." U.N. Secretary-General António Guterres calls upon citizens of the world to "seize the opportunity of the recovery from the pandemic to implement safe, orderly, and regular migration and enable migrants to build more inclusive and resilient societies." Today's O Antiphon recalls the migration of Israel from Egypt to Palestine and asks God to guide the movement of peoples. 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
### **#PRAY25STBENS**



# A checklist of essentials to take with you when escaping abuse



Walking out the door and away from an abuser—or kicking an abusive partner out the door, if so inclined—is seldom as easy as it sounds. Abusers thrive on power and control, and having their victim leave them is the ultimate loss of control. Hence, abusers will often make it as difficult as possible for survivors to extricate themselves.

But, it is possible. Leaving an abuser can be the most empowering—and life-saving—decision a survivor can make for themselves and any children involved. When you're ready, the key to leaving safely is preparation, and that starts with a safety plan.

It's best to create a safety plan, customized to your unique situation, with the help of a trained domestic violence advocate. Their expertise and know-how will help you leave a dangerous situation in the most calculated and smart way possible. An advocate will help you locate resources in your area, including shelters, counseling, lay legal advice, court assistance and support groups.

### **ONLY YOU KNOW**

Creating a safety plan includes figuring out when to leave, where you're going to go, what you'll take and how to keep these details private from your abuser. These decisions are yours and yours alone to make, as the survivor. Only you can say when is the safest time to leave and only you know where you will feel safest to go to. For some women, this may be a shelter temporarily, while they secure a more permanent living situation. Some survivors leave with only the clothes on their back while others are able to pack a bag ahead of time that they can easily locate, retrieve and take with them when they're ready to escape. WomensLaw.org suggests the following things be included in that bag, but keep in mind, not all of these suggestions will be feasible for everyone and some may even put a survivor in greater danger. Do what you think is best to keep yourself and your children safe.

### **PACK LIST:**

- A spare set of car keys, your driver's license and/or passport(s)
- · Credit cards and some cash—enough for transportation, food and lodging for a few days. Your abuser may cancel your credit cards or try to track you through your credit card use.
- Work permit, green card or immigration papers (if applicable)
- Government benefits card (if you have one)
- · Phone numbers for friends, relatives, doctors, schools, taxi services and your local domestic violence organization (taking your cell phone will allow your abuser to track you)
- A few changes of clothing for yourself and your children
- Infant formula and diapers
- · Comfort items to help your children feel safe

- Pet food, leashes and vet records for any animals you're taking with you
- Any medication or vitamins you typically take
- Important documents, or copies of them, for both you and your children including birth certificates, social security cards, school records, immunizations, pay stubs, bank account information, marriage license, will, mortgage papers, lease agreement, insurance information
- Order of protection (if you are able to secure one ahead of time)
- Any evidence you've been collecting to show you've been abused (photos of injuries, police records, medical records, a journal or log)
- A few personal items you want to keep (photo albums, jewelry, etc.)

Keep your getaway bag in a place where the abuser cannot find it, such as at a trusted friend's or neighbor's house. Also, hide an extra set of car keys somewhere that you can easily access, in case the abuser takes the car keys to prevent you from leaving. If you have pets, take them with you when possible, or think about someone you trust who could take them before or when you leave. 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


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
