How did a couple who is this successful and involved begin? After growing up in Brooklyn and graduating from Parsippany HS, New Jersey, Mike enrolled at Eastern Kentucky University. Sherri grew up and graduated in Centerville, and also found herself at Eastern Kentucky University. "I was a junior (1967) at EKU when Sherri arrived," Mike recalls. "My fraternity was helping move students in. We met on her first day and married in 1969." After two years of teaching in Chestertown, Maryland, the couple moved to Tipp City to raise a family, and has been here ever since.

"Tipp was a great place to raise our children," Sherri adds. "We lived in town so they could walk to school. Youth sports were a big part of their life. Adam played football and wrestled, while Andrea was a cheerleader."

Andrea now lives in Powell, Ohio and Adam lives in Van Wert. Their three grandchildren are off to college; Tyler at Life College, Hayden at The Ohio
