



WHAT DOES THE BIBLE SAY?

All of us have opinions about money and fundraising. Plus, our families and cultures have opinions about money and fundraising. As you prepare to enter a new chapter of life to be supported by the Gospel, how will you respond to these common opinions? What Scripture will help you develop convictions about these questions?

Fundraising is similar to begging. I don't see how you can humble yourself to beg for a living.
Why don't you get a real job? You're just leeching off the people
If you're in Christian work, you're doomed to a life of poverty. You'll never have enough.
You need to be on staff with a church. You can't raise money outside the church. Too much competition. Giving should go to the local church anyway.
You should follow the model of the Apostle Paul and be a tentmaker rather than receiving support. Pay your own way.
You should follow the George Mueller model by "telling only God." Just pray the money in.
Relax! God's will done in God's way will never lack God's supply. Where He guides, He provides. Just do the ministry, and the money will flow in!


