TGMS General Meeting — January 9, 2017

The General Meeting of the Tucson Gem and Mineral Society was called to order by President Mark Marikos at 7:30 p.m. Visitors and new members were welcomed to the meeting and asked to stand and introduce themselves.

ANNOUNCEMENT: Dr. Alex Schauss announced that a new bill to make wulfenite Arizona's State Mineral has been introduced to the new legislature. After the bill receives a number, he will notify the TGMS office and membership, and urged members to write or call our representatives in support of the bill.

PROGRAM: Jan Rasmussen, PhD. spoke on "Wulfenite in Arizona" based on molybdenum research she did while at the Arizona Geological Survey and at the Arizona Mining and Mineral Museum. There are 275 wulfenite localities in Arizona which can be seen on a map in Mindat.org. Wulfenite is a lead molybdate mineral occurring as flat crystals, unusual elongated dipyramids, pseudo cubes (very thick plates) or stacked pyramids. There is a correlation between structure and proximity to the source of the lead. The crystals form in the oxidized zones of hydrothermal lead deposits. Color ad structure of wulfenite found at various localities were discussed and highlighted with beautiful photographs. Publications discussing the research can be found on www.janrasmussen.com.

TGMS General Meeting — January 30, 2017

The General Meeting of the Tucson Gem and Mineral Society was called to order by President Mark Marikos at 7:30 p.m. Visitors and new members were welcomed to the meeting and asked to stand and introduce themselves.

PROGRAM: Brad Ross, PhD, PE spoke on "Lessons Learned from the Bingham Canyon Manefay Slide," which was the largest landslide in mining history. One hundred forty four million tons of material exploded out on April 10, 2013 in two occurrences, the first at 9:30 p.m. and again at 11:00 p.m. The material traveled airborne for three quarters of a mile and a total distance of one and one half miles. Haul trucks and shovels were lost when the material filled the pit. Engineers broke down the area so plans could be developed to recover from the damage. One medium sized shovel, 18 haul trucks and a crusher with a conveyor under the mountain remained undamaged. Innovative ideas were proposed including using remote controlled heavy equipment and employees in all areas assumed leadership roles. It is an amazing story told in "Rise to the Occasion" by Brad Ross.

Kerry Towe announced that the Silverbell Mine trip will be Saturday, March 4th and is open to 40 people. Sign-up sheet is on the desk.


