


Synopsis

Director's Statement

THROUGHOUT THE WRITING, REHEARSAL, AND SHOOTING PROCESS I was constantly asking myself: where does the clown world intersect with our real world and how do I make choices from that place? How do we honor the Tramp's roots in silent film while telling a story that's relevant to today's hookup culture? I had to imagine a world where you could queef bubbles but still had to worry about getting pregnant.

The beauty of the camera is the way it highlights the actor's thought process, the subtle muscle changes of the face, and in doing so accentuates the character's vulnerability. Because the Tramp is silent she uses her body to communicate, but I didn't want to lose that potential for intimacy by focusing on gags and showing her only in wide shots. It wasn't that we had to lose her big gestures, we just had to internalize them. It was as important to me that she was a real person as she was funny.

Our DP came up with this idea to use an ultra-wide angle lens and to leave it on for the close ups. This created a slightly warped look that gave the footage some wonkiness with the emotional benefits of a close-up. All of this gave rise to a weird little world where the Tramp is funny not despite her body's humanness but because of it.





Writer's Statement



MY LOVE OF FILM ARRIVED ON THE SHOULDERS OF CLOWNS—Chaplin, Keaton, Marx. As a child I wanted to follow in the footsteps of stage clowns, Bill Irwin and David Shiner. As a second-generation feminist, I thought it was bizarre how "everyman" characters were always men. Silent clowns speak the universal language of movement, so why should they only tell men's stories?

The majority of women in our lives navigate sex and dating with a sense of humor, an appetite for arousal, and an eye always on the responsibilities of the next morning. While our culture is oversaturated with stories about women's bodies as sexy, motherly, or traumatized, I crave stories about bodies that are sites of pleasure and hilarity.

TRAMP is about an evening many women in my life might experience casually. While neither intensely traumatizing, or deeply romantic, a one night stand is full of the absurdities that come with having a woman's body, having sex, and trying to stay in control.

The humor and humanity of The Tramp archetype comes when he is dignified amidst debasement, hapless in his quest for love, and can walk into the sunset unbothered. This is not why women are often called tramps, but shouldn't it be?

EMELIA BENOIT-LAVELLE is an actress and director based in LA. She strives to make projects that celebrate humanity and diversity, are challenging and make people laugh.
