Neighbors In Need (NIN) is the special offering for the month of September.

Neighbors in Need (NIN) is a special mission offering of the UCC that supports ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. The NIN offering goes to organizations and congregations throughout the country to address social issues including poverty, economic development, human rights, racial and economic justice, environmental concerns, and public policy.

One-third of NIN funds support the Council for American Indian Ministry (CAIM). Today there are 20 UCC congregations on reservations and one urban, multi-tribal UCC congregation in Minneapolis, Minnesota. CAIM supports these local churches and their pastors. In addition, CAIM strives to be a resource for more than 1,000 individuals from dozens of other tribes and nations who are members of other UCC congregations and to strengthen their participation in the life of the church.

Two-thirds of Neighbors in Need supports program initiatives and direct grants offered by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries. Small but essential grants are made throughout the year to congregations and organizations engaged in community organizing, public policy advocacy, and direct service. Although money is granted to address a wide range of justice priorities, a significant portion of these grants are made to address issues of hunger and poverty.

Saturday, September 24 and Sunday, September 25


Youth Programming at UCC is for those in 6th through 12th grade.
