

The Grand Organ of Holy Trinity is a true giant among instruments; taller than a house and with nearly 5000 pipes (the tallest being 32' high) it produces a fabulous range of sounds - at full blast, the building trembles!

It was built in the 1860s by the Hull firm Forster and Andrews (their factory was on George Street) although some parts of it date back to 1711 (these are sounds that would have been heard by William Wilberforce)!

Fun fact: there are only 9 buildings in Hull that are older than this organ!!!

However - the organ is now very poorly and running out of breath. It hasn't been rebuilt since 1938 (imagine driving a car that hasn't been repaired for 77 years...!) and now needs a full overhaul. Without this work this magnificent instrument will soon perish and pass into the realms of memory.
