### Needles & Notions

Set 3.5mm/UK--/US4 DPNs/Circular or size needed to obtain gauge Stitch marker as necessary Tapestry needle

### Sample details

Shown in Wendy Merino Bliss DK [122yd/112m per 50g; 100% Merino]

Shown in size 18in/47.5cm on model with 18in/47.5cm circumference head

# Alternative yarns

Drops Extra Fine Merino DK [151yd/105m per 50g; 100% Merino] needles over St.St. 22 sts x 46 rows to 4in/10cm on 3.5mm needles over Garter.St

# Sizes

To fit sizes: 10 [13, 15, 18, 20] in/ 25.5 [33, 38, 45.75, 51] cm

Finished size: 8.75 [11, 13, 15.25, 17.5] in/

22.25 [28, 33, 38.75, 44.5] cm

# Skills required

Knit & purl stitches, knitting in the round, increases & decreases, eyelets

### How to

Cast on 48 [60, 72, 84, 96] sts. Join in the round, being careful not to twist sts. Place stitch marker to indicate start of round.

### Brim

Rnd 1: Purl all sts Rnd 2: Knit all sts

Starting with a Rnd 1, repeat these 2 rounds until work measures 2 [2.5, 3, 3.5, 4] in/5 [6.25, 7.5, 9, 10] ending after a Rnd 1.

### Body

Rnds 1 & 2: Knit all sts

Rnd 3: Purl all sts

Rnd 4: \*yo, k2tog; rpt from \* to end

Rnd 5: Purl all sts Rnds 6 & 7: Knit all sts

### Crown

10in size jump to Rnd 25, 13in size jump to Rnd 19, 15in size jump to Rnd 13, 18in size jump to Rnd 7 and 20in size start at Rnd 1.

Rnd 1: \*K14, ssk; rpt from \* to end [90 sts]

Rnd 2: Knit all sts Rnd 3: Knit all sts

Rnd 4: \*K13, ssk; rpt from \* to end [84 sts]

Rnd 5: Knit all sts Rnd 6: Knit all sts

Rnd 7: \*K12, ssk; rpt from \* to end [78 sts]

Rnd 8: Knit all sts Rnd 9: Knit all sts

Rnd 10: \*K11, ssk; rpt from \* to end [72 sts]

Rnd 11: Knit all sts Rnd 12: Knit all sts

Rnd 13: \*K10, ssk; rpt from \* to end [66 sts]

Rnd 14: Knit all sts Rnd 15: Knit all sts

Rnd 16: \*K9, ssk; rpt from \* to end [60 sts]

Rnd 17: Knit all sts Rnd 18: Knit all sts

Rnd 19: \*K8, ssk; rpt from \* to end [54 sts]

Rnd 20: Knit all sts Rnd 21: Knit all sts

Rnd 22: \*K7, ssk; rpt from \* to end [48 sts]

Rnd 23: Knit all sts Rnd 24: Knit all sts

Rnd 25: \*K6, ssk; rpt from \* to end [42 sts]

Rnd 26: Knit all sts Rnd 27: Knit all sts

Rnd 28: \*K5, ssk; rpt from \* to end [36 sts]

Rnd 29: Knit all sts Rnd 30: Knit all sts

Rnd 31: \*K4, ssk; rpt from \* to end [30 sts]

Rnd 32: Knit all sts Rnd 33: Knit all sts

Rnd 34: \*K3, ssk; rpt from \* to end [24 sts]

Rnd 35: Knit all sts Rnd 36: Knit all sts

Rnd 37: \*K2, ssk; rpt from \* to end [18 sts]

Rnd 38: Knit all sts Rnd 39: Knit all sts

Rnd 40: \*K1, ssk; rpt from \* to end [12 sts]

Rnd 41: Knit all sts Rnd 42: Knit all sts

Rnd 43: \*ssk; rpt from \* to end [6 sts]

Break yarn and draw through remaining 6sts, tighten to close.

# Finishing


Weave in all ends. A gentle wash and blocking is required to help the decrease lines settle and lay flat.
