

## WORKING TOGETHER TO MAKE A NEW LIFE FOR GLENDALE'S DOCTORS' HOUSE



"This is the sort of home, indeed, where lives and loves unfold." Jewel City Press, December 13, 1910.

In the first years of its existence, this structure at 921 East Wilson (north-west corner of Wilson Avenue and Belmont Street) was commonly referred to as the "Doctors' House," as there were at least four doctors who resided there at different times. The Doctors' House is a significant part of Glendale's past. It's historical ties to our city, architectural style and the period of it's construction substantiate its importance to the community.

The house represents the Queen-Anne, Eastlake style of architecture which gained popularity in the years 1885-1900 in southern California. These styles were characterized by an asymetrical overall design, gables, towers and extensive porches. While the early houses of this period were strongly vertical, the Doctors' House was built circa 1895 and expresses the horizontality which appeared in the later houses of the period. At present the Goode House is the only other surviving Queen Anne style house in Glendale.

The year 1895 places the house's construction within the economic recovery period of the 1890's in southern California. This period was represented by a change in the origins of settlers who came to southern California, from a New England based migration to a mid-western migration. The early occupants of the Doctors' House reflect this change in migration patterns.

The house is believed to have been built by Dr. C.V. Bogue of Chicago, Illinois. He came to Glendale seeking improved health, and was the physician to the Verdugo Family. Returning to Chicago in 1901, he sold his home and practice to Dr. D.E. Hunt. Dr. Hunt was originally from Sterling, Minnesota and became active in Glendale civic affairs. In 1902 he became the president of the Glendale Improvement Association which secured right of way for the Electric Interurban Line in to Glendale, and took steps towards the incorporation of the city in 1906. He was vice president of the city's first bank, The Bank of Glendale established in 1905, and purchased the city's first automobile. He was also active in the formation of the Glendale school system.

Dr. Hunt sold the house in 1906 to Dr. Leon H. Hurtt, first president of the Glendale Chamber of Commerce, who also built the Hurtt Block Commercial Center.

The members of the Glendale Historical Society have joined not only in the preservation of this important structure, but also in the recording of it's history. We hope that this will become the nucleus for future research, as well as the beginning of our community's awareness of it's rich past.

## THE DOCTORS' HOUSE: A LIVING HERITAGE

In 1921 Katie (Ribarich) Dzaich came from Austria to America to visit her sister in Los Angeles. Katie's father, John Ribarich, had come to the United States in 1908 in search of a new life for his family, but, while employed in a West Virginia coal mine, he was killed in a cave-in, and his wife, her four children, and a blind aunt were left in financial straits back home in Austria. In 1915, Katie's sister, Mary, came to the United States where she met and married Peter Kordich. They subsequently moved to Los Angeles and there raised their family. So it was, in 1921, that Katie, in her twenty-second year journeyed across the North Atlantic to visit her California sister. It was supposed to be but a short trip, but events changed when Katie met Joseph Dzaich, a young man who boarded with the Kordiches at their Bunker Hill home.

Katie and Joseph were married in January 1922 at St. Anthony's Church, and in September of the same year the Kordich family and Joseph and Katie moved into the Victorian home on Wilson near Belmont, Glendale's celebrated "Doctors' House". Katie remembers that the flowers were abloom, and there was a large grove of citrus trees adjacent to the house. The large oleander trees now surrounding the home site and the yellow poinsettias were soon planted. Fig trees were also set out, and they, with the large date palms in the front yard, provided shade for family gatherings during warm Sunday afternoons.

Katie recalls many neighbors, including the Reynolds who were brick contractors and possessed the only telephone on the block. The Camargo family lived on Belmont Street and Officer Joe Clarke on Everett. The Kordich family purchased the first radio on the block, and frequently the neighborhood children would gather on the front porch and listen to the Lone Ranger.

Katie Dzaich never regretted her decision to come to America. She made one return trip to Austria in 1975 in order to visit her brother who was only a baby in 1921 when she had left home. Katie has many memories of her 59 years in Glendale, recollections shared with the sheltering walls and protective roof of her Victorian home. Her history and that of her children, all of whom still live in the Glendale area, represent a romantic family chapter in the American drama of settlers from overseas building a successful new life here. The Doctors' House equally well represents the living architectural heritage which is so valuable a part of a vibrant Glendale in the changing 1980s.
