Statement of Interests

Exposure to accurate and population-specific information is considered essential for individuals to adopt positive health behaviors. However, it is also widely accepted that information alone is insufficient to prompt and sustain behavior change. My research focuses on the predictors of information seeking, including both why and where individuals obtain information. I also examine information use, meaning whether individuals apply or act on information once they have obtained it. The results of my research can support the optimization of information delivery approaches among health care professionals.

I am currently validating a conceptual model I developed for this research, the Information Seeking and Use Model, in the context of parents' child feeding behavior. In the future, I hope to leverage this conceptual model to understand information behaviors that promote disparities in childhood obesity.
