70th and Cass Redevelopment (former Temple Israel)

I am very pleased to report that to the west of our neighborhood, on the site of the former Temple Israel, Bluestone and the Omaha Conservatory of Music (OCM) have come up with a nice plan for the 70th and Cass property. As most of you know, the Temple site was originally going to be demolished to accommodate a 450 unit apartment building. That plan has been scrapped – in favor of a more ideal arrangement.

Bluestone Development will build a 150 unit apartment building on 2 acres of land adjacent to Walgreens. OCM will occupy the 5 acres and existing structure on the east side of the property adjacent to Omaha Community Playhouse. The old property is going to get a nice makeover where needed while history, value, and yes – some old trees will be preserved.

I feel strongly that OCM will be a fabulous neighbor and a perfect fit for the property – not only preserving the existing temple structure but actually improving it. After conversations with Board member Paul Smith and OCM Executive Director Ruth Meints, I knew the property was in good hands. I don't have any doubt that the Bluestone apartments will bring value to OCM and the Playhouse and vice-versa. I don't have any doubt that the OCM staff and their board will keep a good eye on those apartments, parking, traffic, and any other challenges

OCM is a non-profit community music school founded in 2001 that provides private lessons in violin, cello, bass, piano, guitar, voice, winds, brass, and percussion as well as conducting, music composition, and theory. DCG has Successful Gardening Season

2014 was a year of major accomplishments for Dundee Community Garden. In the spring we installed solar panels on our tool shed (making our lawn-mowing and weed-whacking fossil-fuel free), planted a strawberry patch as an edible groundcover under our six fruit trees, planted a native prairie wild-flower area for pollinators (where native plants can send down 20 foot tap-roots, making them drought-tolerant), and built a retaining wall along the alley side of the garden.

On a wet and muddy Saturday in June, we planted our 250 sweet potato starts, which yielded over 1000 pounds of sweet potatoes when we dug them up in October.

We donated approximately 950 pounds of fresh organic produce to the Underwood Tower this year, which is more than we have ever donated in a

single year. Since our founding in 2009, we have donated 3,937 pounds of fresh produce to others.

We hosted a number of events in 2014, including our annual Ice Cream Social in June, a Watermelon Feed in July, and educational workshops including What to Plant and When, Herbs from the Garden, and Edible Weeds.

In August, we were delighted when scouts from Boy Scout Troop 42 built new compost bins for us as part of Jack McCullough's Eagle Scout Project. Jack designed the bins with removable wooden slats, making it easy to turn the compost from bin to bin. The corner posts are set in concrete, and the wooden slats are made of cedar—it is a highly functional design!

Also in August, our new entranceway, designed by sculptor Dan Newberry and Greensleeves Landscaping, was completed. With its whimsical depiction of people carrying a giant carrot, it serves as a welcoming entrance to both the community garden and the Dundee neighborhood.

DCG hosted a 5th year birthday party on Sunday Sept. 7, with a ribbon cutting at the new entranceway, and remarks from City Council President Pete Festersen and DMPA President Adam Langdon. With live music from the "Burt Street Individuals" and homemade carrot cake using carrots from the garden, it was a gala event with over 150 people attending.

In October, a bronze plaque recognizing those who donated \$150+ to our Growing Roots fundraising campaign in 2013 was installed in our 49th Street flowerbeds.

While the DCG is a relatively small garden, our compact design provides growing space for 41 members, as well as additional plots for growing produce to donate, and a "Neighbor Garden" area where anyone walking by the garden is invited to help themselves to fresh produce.

DCG is a 501(c)3 organization, and donations are fully tax deductible. Plans for 2015 include setting up drip hoses for irrigation for the sweet potato area, as well as improving the Neighbor Garden area, compost signage, and purchasing needed garden equipment. Every year we have expenses that exceed our membership fee.

Looking for an End of the Year Tax Deduction and a Way to Help Preserve an Important Part of Dundee History?

In 1934, a "subway" was constructed at 51st & Dodge St. as part of a New Deal public works project that widened Dodge Street. The subway was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 2010. It is the last remaining pedestrian tunnel in Omaha. The primary reason for the subway was to provide a safe way for school children to cross Dodge Street.

As the tunnel reaches 80 years old, it is in need of renovation. The Dundee Memorial Park Association has decided to take on a renovation and rejuvenation of this historic landmark. This is where we need your help.

The project will do the following:

Install brighter, longer lasting, energy efficient LED lighting

Install new historic signage

Install skid-resistant coating on the ramps

The overall project is estimated to cost \$30,000.



Water heaters are like relatives who overstay their welcome. They sit there for so long that OLD HOUSE MECHANIC you just sort of ignore them. All too often the only time we notice the water heater is when

it fails or worse when it starts leaking water all over the floor. When it starts leaking then it's too late to save it. It has to be replaced.

The average life span of a water heater is only about 10 years, but with a little maintenance the life of a water heater can be extended to as much as 30 years. So, now might be a good time to head to the basement and get reacquainted with your water heater.

Two things attack your water heater over time and reduce its life span: rust and sediment.

The process of heating water causes calcium carbonate to form inside the tank. This is the same limestone sediment that collects inside a well-used teapot. Calcium carbonate collects at the bottom of your tank and reduces the heater's efficiency. Luckily there is a simple way to combat this buildup: drain the tank at least once a year.

To drain the tank, first turn the thermostat control dial to pilot on a gas heater or turn off the power at the breaker box for an electric heater. Then shut off the inlet valve that feeds cold water into the tank. Open a hot water faucet to prevent a vacuum lock in the hot water line. Attach a length of garden hose to the valve at the bottom of the heater and put the end of the hose near a floor drain or into a bucket. Then drain all the water and sediment out of the tank. Be careful because the water is, of course, very hot. After the draining is complete, close the drain valve.

While the heater is shut off check the anode rod. This is a maintenance step that is overlooked more often than not. The anode rod is a magnesium or aluminum rod that attracts charged water molecules that cause the tank to rust. Anode rods are meant to be sacrificial, that is, the charged water molecules destroy it rather than rusting your tank. The lifespan of an anode rod is about five years. The anode rod is removed from the top of the tank.

If six or more inches of the rod's core wire is exposed it should be replaced. Replacement anode rods are available at plumbing supply shops.


After reinstalling the anode rod, turn on the cold water supply to the water heater, let the tank completely fill and then turn the control dial back to the normal operating position for a gas heater or turn on the power for an electric heater.

While you're at it, make one additional safety check. Check the pressure relief valve. This is a critically important safety precaution. The pressure relief valve prevents the water heater from exploding if pressure builds to an excessive level in the tank. If the pressure relief valve isn't working due to rust or corrosion, have a plumber replace it.

If your water heater is like your brother-in-law and has been hanging around your house for too long, consider replacing it (the heater not the brother-in-law). Water heaters consume about 15 percent of your energy, so a new model that is more energy-efficient may save you money in the long run. Also to save energy and extend the life of your heater set the water temperature to between 120 and 130 degrees.

Ever Evolving Dundee Theater



The Dundee Theater has closed many times throughout its years of operation for renovations and upgrades.

But its current closure is certainly the longest time that its doors have remained locked and its seats unoccupied. The theater closed in May 2013 for installation of a digital projector and new sound equipment and other improvements. Just about everything in

the theater is being refurbished: the lobby, concession stands, seating, and heating and air conditioning systems. The exterior brick and roof also needed repair. Owner Dennis Moran has told sources it will reopen some time in 2015.

When that day occurs, Dundee residents, preservationists, and movie lovers will breathe a sigh of relief. The theater has lived a somewhat fragile existence for the past 30 years or so, with threats both real and imagined. People have been concerned that it could be razed in favor of a drug store, fast food restaurant, or something less savory.

The Dundee Theater was reeling a bit back in the 1960s, when the Cooper Foundation owned it. For a time it had screened art films. Then Cooper installed 70-millimeter projection equipment and a Todd-A-O screen so they could show epics like "Spartacus." Not long after that, the theater closed for about eight months. When it reopened, independent film distributor Abbott Swartz was leasing the theater to show mostly foreign films. The Cooper Foundation had bigger concerns: They had just opened the Indian Hills Theater for "Cinerama" productions.

The Cooper Foundation again turned its attention to the Dundee Theater in 1965, and Julie Andrews came to their rescue. Theater owners wanted to fill the theater with "The Sound of Music," as their other theaters were booked up. They planned to sell reserved seats for the movie. Cooper executive George Gaughan thought the musical would solve the theater's profitability problems for "a year or two."

Gov. Frank Morrison attended the movie's premiere on April 7, 1965. An audience of more than 400 nuns enjoyed one screening. By the time the movie ended its run at the Dundee in July of 1967, more than 300,000 people had seen it. The 118-week run of "The Sound of Music" made it the longest-running film in Omaha's history. It was said to be second only to a theater in London.

Other big movies followed, including "Thoroughly Modern Millie," "Funny Girl," and "Hello Dolly." They did well, but by 1970, the Dundee was again experimenting with classic films and foreign affairs. The Cooper Foundation sold the theater in 1974 as multiplex theaters were starting to dot the landscape.

New owners David Frank and Edward Cohen mostly floundered as they tried to find the right niche. After initially promising family fare, "Candy Stripe Nurses" made its way onto the screen. Two years later, the Dundee screened

"Annie," an X-rated film about the sexual escapades of a young woman. There were complaints, but the movie had a fairly long run.

Shortly before he died in 1983, Frank sold the theater to Moran. A retired police officer, Moran stuck mostly to independent and art films and built a steady clientele.

The theater was designed by noted architect John McDonald and constructed in 1925. In a December 18, 1925 ad in the Omaha World-Herald, manager A.R. Hansen stated, "Our policy is to bring to this theater the best pictures obtainable anywhere, and to present them as finely as possible."

Owners including Ralph Goldberg made many upgrades to theater equipment during its first 25 years. In 1947, the Theater Guild selected the Dundee for a regional premiere of "Henry V," starring a young Laurence Olivier. The movie simultaneously premiered in San Francisco, St. Louis, Cleveland, Atlanta, New York, and Omaha. The Dundee Theater was selected because of its location in a "fine residential district," its excellent sound and projection equipment, the "class and tone" of the theater, and the likelihood of attracting a suitable audience.


