It is said a picture is worth a thousand words, so look at these images taken by Ken Frantz, Patty Bickauskas and Lori Anne Oliwa.



















Arts and Crafts Festival


Historical Society Flea Market

They're Back!!!

The highly anticipated Ghost Tours return to the haunted Strauss Mansion for the first time since 2019. Disembodied voices. Footsteps when there is no one there. Doors slamming shut on their own. Shadowy figures in the window.

These are just a few of the experiences you will learn about during the 2021 Ghost Tours. We were unable to conduct this popular event in 2020 due to COVID restrictions. While it was very disappointing for us and the many followers of paranormal investigations, we used the time to conduct more paranormal investigations in the building and discovered new evidence which will be shared during the tours.

Participants will hear stories of chilling ghostly encounters, see actual paranormal footage captured at the Strauss Mansion, interact with Atlantic Highland Historical Society board member and local psychic Lisa Walling as she interprets what the spirits have to say, and observe a Victorian-era Wine Glass Séance appropriately held in the Mansion's parlor.

Ghosts on the Coast*, the paranormal investigating team, is composed of Atlantic Highlands Historical Society board members and volunteers Patty Bickauskas, Joanne Dellosso, Roy Dellosso, Lou Fligor, Patrick Osborn, Lisa Walling and me. The group has led these events at the Strauss Mansion since 2016, following a departure from scripted "haunted house" tours. Audiences have enthusiastically embraced the changeover to ghost stories and actual hands-on investigating during these 90-minute events. Participants have captured their



own evidence including electronic voice phenomenon (EVP) and strange anomalies in photographs. Participants are encouraged to bring cameras, recorders and any hand-held paranormal equipment they may possess.

Each tour will be divided into two groups: one will walk the upstairs floors, learn the history of the house, hear ghost stories, and see where they actually happened while the other will be downstairs viewing audio and visual evidence captured at the mansion and take part in a mini-seance which has garnered interesting results over the years. After 45 minutes, the two groups will switch places.

Some tours are more active than others. Since none of this is staged, we cannot guarantee anything will happen. The ghosts have their own agendas. Take plenty of pictures and let your smartphone's recording device run wild. You never know what you may discover when you review your recordings.

Tours are Saturday, October 23rd and Saturday, October 30th at 7:00 pm, 8:30 pm, and 10:00 pm. Space is limited and tickets at \$25/person must be purchased in advance at AHhistory.org/gift-shop. Covid protocols will be observed. We look forward to seeing you. Happy hauntings!

Blast From the Past — Atlantic Highlands Style

As a new school year is approaching, I thought that this time, instead of writing about past articles from the Atlantic Journal, I would talk about our Atlantic Highlands School. Some of you might not have been aware that our beloved grade school was once a high school. The first formal class to graduate from this school was in June of 1894 and consisted of just six students. The ceremony was held at the Women's Catholic Temperance Union Temple was located somewhere on the south side of Mount and Railroad Avenue (now Hennessey Boulevard).

In reading the article, you can see this ceremony not only contained the "chanting" of The Lord's Prayer, but also what appears to be quite a controversial political speech about the free trade tariff policy. Even back then, politics made its way into all aspects of our daily lives.

FIRST COMMENCEMENT.

THE ATLANTIC HIGHLANDS PUBLIC SCHOOL GRADUATED A CLASS OF SIX ON THURSDAY EVENING.

Prof. Enright Present.—Exercises at the Temple.—A Success.—Large and Responsive Audience.—Graduates Heartily Applauded.

The first formal graduation of a class of pupils from the Atlantic Highlands public school occurred on Thursday evening at the W. C. T. U. Temple. The class numbered six, Mr. Fran Crane, Misses Maude Edgar, R. J. iche Leonard, Alice G. Leonard an Lulu Robin Newman and Mr. Harry Vanderbilt. The curtain rose

Exercises opened by chanting the Lord's Prayer followed by an invocation by Rev. J. B. Haines. The chorus sang "Summer has come" in a way that almost convinced people even though they knew about cold weather of this week, after which Harry Vanderbilt delivered an oration about the tariff which made every man who voted for Grover Cleveland blush with shame. He showed from history how a free trade tariff policy has wrecked the country's prosperity every time it has been tried. His effort was creditable to his good sense, his ability and the school and made many a rum Democrat sigh because he had never gone to school enough to learn about the

The last year of the high school was in 1962. The size of that graduating class was 80+ students.

Thanks to the dedicated hard work of Dan Calandriello, our website not only has information of past graduating classes of the old high school, but also multiple yearbooks, class reunions, class trips, etc. There are also links on the page that show early graduates from Henry Hudson Regional High School. What Did Queen Victoria Like to Drink?



It has been assumed that Queen Victoria and Prince Albert discovered whisky when she visited the Scottish Highlands in 1842. In fact, the Royal

Household was already well acquainted with good Islay single malt.

Victoria had given her seal of approval to a pair of Scottish distilleries on the mainland. Victoria renewed the Warrant in 1838 shortly after coming to the throne, then granted a second to the celebrity Scottish sportsman and whisky maker Captain William Barclay of Glenury.

William Begg was very fortunate. In 1848, the Royal Family took possession of Balmoral Castle on the banks of the River Deenear near Begg's distillery. Begg sent a note to his new neighbors inviting them to visit and was delighted when the Queen, Prince Albert, two young princes and a princess turned up on his doorstep the next day.

The Royal parents and their infant sons enjoyed a glass of well-matured whisky. John Begg received his Royal Warrant soon after and Lochnagar became the third "Royal" distillery.



CENTURY HOUSE PROGRAM AND PLAQUE

The Atlantic Highlands Historical Society invites you to apply for your house/building to become part of our Century House program which recognizes buildings in Atlantic Highlands that are 100+ years old.

Available records indicate that more than 250 existing buildings in town have reached the century mark, though some have lost part or all of their original appearance. To date, 50 houses have received an attractive Century House plaque from the Society that records the construction date.

A building is eligible if its date of construction can be documented and its exterior as seen from the street is recognizable as original to the structure.



As part of the application process, the owner is responsible for authenticating the age of the structure. Documents acceptable as proof are available from the Society. To aid in researching the structure's history, the Society has two free guides, "Researching Older Houses and Properties in the Monmouth County Archives" and "Sources for Researching Older Houses in Atlantic Highlands." If you lack information or need assistance, members of the Century House committee are available. Leave a message at the Society's phone 732-291-1861, contact me at 732-291-4313, or contact the Society at AHhistory.org.

Upon concluding the research, submit a completed Application form with a registration fee of \$100 to the Society. The fee is returnable if the structure appears too altered from its original design as to be unrecognizable.

Application and placement of the plaque on the structure reflects your personal wish to maintain, as far as possible, the historically-appropriate external appearance of the building, at least for the portions that are visible from the street.

If the application is approved, applicant will be notified and a Century House plaque that includes the date of construction will be awarded. The structure will then be recognized as one of a select group — a Century Site of our town.

NOTE: The program and the plaque create no official or legal restrictions on the sale or disposition of the building, or on interior and exterior structural and decorative work. The plaque simply identifies your house as being one of the oldest historical structures in Atlantic Highlands.
